

#### **ROD'S REFLECTIONS**

# The wind of the spirit

On the 12th June, the Christian Church celebrates Pentecost. Pentecost is the time when the Holy Spirit came to the last remaining followers of Jesus, all 120 of them, and filled them with the power and the courage to stand up in public and tell everyone around them about Jesus and the Kingdom; about the salvation that had come to all of creation through the life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus.

The fact that those around them were from almost every nation in the eastern Roman Empire and beyond illustrates the many gifts that these men and women were given.

Looking back on this event, from a few years distance, St. Paul writes to Christians that he was in contact with to remind them that the same Holy Spirit has filled them with the gifts to "spread the word" and to work in ways in which others will see God's Kingdom active in their lives.

It is the same Holy Spirit who is at work in the world today.

Now, I know that there are many who find this difficult or even a load of rubbish, as has been said to me a few times. Admittedly, Holy Spirit is difficult to describe, because each person who has experienced the presence of the Spirit has a different experience, though many can have one that appears to be similar.

St. Luke, who wrote "The Acts of the Apostles", described it as seeming like tongues of flame, heralded by the sound, but not the effect, of a great wind; others a burning sensation; others a "heart-warming" sensation,

Whatever the sensation, there is no doubt that the presence of the Holy Spirit does bring about changes in people's lives.

Now I want to go back a few lines, to the fact that some people, including some Christians, find this "difficult" and some find it "a load of rubbish".

These were some of the reactions of the crowd on that first Spirit-filled Pentecost, but some realised that the people talking to them, in their own languages, were mainly from Galilee and that many had been in hiding because their "leader" had been killed.

It wasn't the SENSATION of the coming of the Spirit that the crowds could see, but the EFFECT the Spirit had on those who had been filled. They couldn't doubt their own ears or eyes; these men and women had been changed in a dramatic way.

Not everyone who experiences Holy Spirit has that dramatic experience in public, indeed, I would imagine an exceptionally small number do, but literally millions of people throughout the world have an experience of the Spirit in their lives every day.

That experience is life-changing and it isn't a one-off either. The Holy Spirit is always present, God's way of ensuring that you are not alone, that you are helped in making the choices you need for a fuller life, a life that Christians are in no doubt as being in the presence of Jesus always.

Luke wrote about ordinary men and women whose lives had been so changed that everyone around them could see the difference; even if they didn't stand up like those at Pentecost, something wonderful had happened to change them. We have called them "apostles", but the original word is better translated as emissaries, those who are sent with a message to pass on to others. That's what all Christians are called to do, and filled with the Spirit to help them in every way.

# Gargrave Library Support Group update

The GLSG are still awaiting the outcome of the NYCC consultation on proposed library closures. Until then we are playing a "waiting game".

However members of the group have met regularly since the well-attended public meeting in January and have received the full support of the Parish Council and the Village Hall Management in their endeavours. Various ways of retaining the library in Gargrave have been explored with retaining the "status quo" (ie with a professional librarian behind the counter) being the main objective. All our discussions have been hampered by the lack of correct statistics from NYCC.

To clarify matters, three members of the group travelled to Northallerton for a meeting with NYCC officers at which they explored a number of legal and financial matters. North Yorkshire CC themselves are currently revising their situation as a result of the public consultation, the results of which will be made

known in June. They appear to have taken on board the need for more fairness across the library system and we await the announcement with interest.

Our community saved the library before and we can do it again!

**April meeting:** Cat Kilner, a ranger from the Yorkshire Dales National Park described the impact of visitor numbers on Dales 'Honeypots' such as Malham – where the resident population of 150 people receive more than 80,000 visitors a year. A significant part of her work is to ensure that the environment is maintained and enhanced. This includes the maintenance of paths and rights

of way as well as planting native species of plants. Such activities are very labour intensive and Cat described her involvement with volunteer groups who give freely of both their time and effort to ensure that the Yorkshire Dales National Park continues to be a place which everyone can enjoy. The competition, for a photograph of a Dales scene, was won by Jan Sturgess and Sylvia Humphreys.

May meeting Sarah Fishwick spoke about 'The Mystery of Magnets'. The focus of her talk was the therapeutic benefits of wearing magnetic bracelets by humans and magnetic collars by dogs and horses to reduce the aches and pains caused by arthritis. The competition was for a fridge magnet. This was won by Jennifer Heselton, whose magnet displayed the message 'I try to lose weight......but it keeps finding me!'

**June Outing**: Instead of our monthly meeting, we will be visiting the Hawes Creamery on Wednesday  $8^{th}$  June. We shall see a demonstration of cheese making. This will be followed by a meal.

**Group Show:** This was held at Kettlewell Village Hall on 9 April and attracted a large number of WI members and visitors. **My most awkward moment:** I went to a small village Church near Market Harborough. As I was on my own, and a stranger, the wardens thought I was the Bishop's wife - he was due on a 'clergy visit' - and was being given VIP treatment when I arrived.

**Back in time** - no thank you! Life seems to have been very hard for most, especially for women. Even if rich, life was full of intrigue and uncertainties, and no NHS.

**The person I admire most** is Winston Churchill for his ability to keep the moral of the nation high during the War, and his brilliant way with words.

**My activities** are reading, birdwatching and trying to come to terms with my computer equipment which can open up a new world.

**Another animal in this life:** I think I would like to be a grey seal basking on the rocks and swimming in the seas around Holy Island.

#### The Filter Bubble

*THE* INTERNET IS DEAD.. Welcome, instead, to *your* internet ... the online experience created solely for *you*.

Personalisation is the current vogue amongst Internet giants such as Facebook and Google, with each plowing vast sums into creating systems that will generate web pages uniquely customised to individual users. Ultimately, they want to figure out who you are, what you want, and then give it to you. This is the Filter Bubble.

Sounds great, doesn't it? Yet in his forthcoming new book, Eli Pariser warns that, as a consequence, 'the Internet is showing us what we want to see, but not necessarily what we need to see'. Invisible, algorithmic editing of the web means we may not be exposed to information that can challenge or broaden our worldview, because, as Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg put it, 'A squirrel dying in your front yard may be more relevant to your interests right now than people dying in Africa.'

Such words should wake us to the fact that - without great wisdom and ethical commitment in regard to our use of it - the Internet, rather than providing the promised window out on the world, may come to be a mirror for gazing ever more intensely at ourselves. A technology that, unbeknown to us, entrenches us far deeper in the illusion that we live in a world created for one is positively dangerous.

Realistically, of course, the Filter Bubble may not be anything new. Each of us erect Filter Bubbles around us all our lives, and are adept at insulating ourselves from the things that have the capacity to trouble or disturb us. By automating this process, perhaps the internet simply saves us time and energy.

Yet, as disciples of the crucified Christ, we intuitively know that Filter Bubbles - erected either by ourselves or others - are illusions we cannot afford. We must necessarily acknowledge that, what I perceive to be relevant or important does not necessarily reflect what is most relevant or important. Bursting the Bubble, allowing the world as it is to press in on us, will prove a far from easy or painless business, for it means denying ourselves the choice of deciding how much of the world, its problems and its brokenness, as well as its joys and aspirations, we are exposed to.

Bursting the Bubble means recognising our vulnerability and fragile capacity to cope. Despite this, in so doing, we choose to regard the world as

Christ did and does; not with anxiety and despair, but with liberation and salvation in mind.

#### WILDLIFE FROM MY WINDOWS

WELL IT'S BEEN AND GONE, but did we care? Not enough, I suspect.

There are songs and rhymes aplenty about April Showers, but this year has not been typical. The weather has been unduly mild, indeed hot at times, and it has been dry and sunny here, and in most of the country. This has caused a wonderful irruption of Spring colour, but has raised doubts about drought in many other areas.

The season of both vivid sap greens with a variety of other greens has been shorter than usual, and settled into a more uniform summer green. The flowers similarly have bloomed earlier than usual, and almost all at once, and the sun has made their lives short-lived. We have enjoyed the end of the March daffodils, followed by Solomon's seal, lady's smock, bluebells, and already the lovely yellow Welsh poppy and the lilies of the valley are in bloom. The sun has brought out the butterflies, mainly white ones, but the attractive orange tip is doing much better than in recent years. Bees are buzzing about among the flowers.

Trees are shedding their blossom, leaving a carpet of petals. The rowan, elder and hawthorn are adorned with their white or cream flowers, which attract insects and therefore birds, and will soon offer their berries.

The nights have often been chilly and the skies midnight blue, rather than the charcoal of winter and the moon golden, rather than silver. Just before daybreak, bats have flown around, as the songthrush heralds in the dawn. Others soon join the throng, and indeed the birds are singing on and off all day long. The swallows have returned, and I have seen a willow warbler and heard its beautiful song – a falling cadence. In common with others, I haven't heard a cuckoo for years. Tits, finches, thrushes, nuthatches and collared doves are all nesting, resulting in females not being seen so often, and there are blackbirds with bills full of food for their young. There are female mallard and ducklings on the river, and their drakes and goosander are flying around in twos and threes. There are occasional geese flying overhead. Oystercatcher have returned from the coast but I haven't seen many.

In other words, it's all happening, but all at once and too quickly.

Water is essential for life, and rain is much needed in parts of the country, this is particularly so where fires have broken out in forests and heaths and wildlife suffers. The ground there is parched hard, and heavy rain could cause

flooding. Here, we are more fortunate. Early Spring has been squeezed, but welcome "April Showers" have come in early May this year; too late for some wilting flowers, but a joy for the birds which love gentle rain, and with the ground soft enough to absorb it. This is a boon to the landscape, restoring "England's green and pleasant land".

#### A translation of "Summat Else"

Perhaps you read in the Parish Magazine about my childhood days. Here is some more information.

Afterwards, I remembered other events from former times. During quiet times, my father occupied the time by constructing new factory buildings using recycled stone and timber. There was very little equipment, only primitive bench tools, you will understand.

If he realised that you were making only limited progress, he would say: "Please pass the workpiece to me, and allow me to do it instead". At this point, one relinquished the work so that he could do it better. Perhaps he would then ask if you would kindly allow him to have a little more illumination on the workpiece. (Etymological note: "Pit 'ee" is literally "pit eye" and refers to the daylight coming into the pit from the top of the shaft)

A youth came daily with milk to our back door. The milk was contained in a canister, fitted with ladles inside. He would pour in a ladlefull, and pretend to give you additional measure from another ladle. Anyway, one day I ran to the door with a jug, tripped, fell, broke the jug and cut my hand, resulting in a mixture of blood and milk. They exclaimed "Never mind, sonny, you will be in a satisfactory condition shortly".

There were places to which we were denied access, such as the railway crossing, and the sewage works. If one did, and one was found out, one was in severe trouble, and was sent upstairs without a meal. You will understand, of course, that we had our own ideas for adventure, such as walking on bridge parapets, or round walls at the top of old mine shafts. Good Lord – what would they have said to that?

## **ALL CREATURES (MOSTLY SMALL)**

Helen Pratt B.V.Sc., M.R.C.V.S., G.P Cert (Small Animal Medicine)

WE UNFORTUNATELY HAVE a fairly large throughput of un-owned animals at the Stanley House Colne branch, a consequence I suppose of being a large town practice.

A most satisfying occurrence is when we can rapidly reunite a lost pet with its worried owner, by scanning for a microchip that has a unique number from which we can access details of the registered keeper.

June 2011 is National Microchipping Month to raise awareness and try to increase the number of chipped animals. Horses, dogs, cats; even birds and tortoises - all can be chipped these days. Cats I think are especially important to have chipped, due to their outdoor lifestyle and the distances they may travel, often in a vehicle that isn't their own!

Microchipping can be done at any age, though I like to avoid doing with the first vaccination - I think one needle is enough at our first meeting! The chip is implanted under the skin between the shoulder blades and, although a relatively large bore needle (it has to house the chip which is the size of a grain of rice) is used, a quick squeak is generally all you get as long as well restrained. White dogs always bleed... (I'm sure others do too, but you don't notice).

The chip can occasionally migrate, so it's worth periodically asking your vet to check that it's still where you think it should be. A recognised scanning pattern we always use picks up these migrators anyway.

For less than £20 you get lifelong registration of your pet at that address. But don't forget - if you move, CHANGE YOUR CONTACT DETAILS!!!! Very frustrating otherwise for all concerned.

I had one owner contact me asking to locate their dog that was chipped - they thought we had some sort of GPS tracking device - unfortunately we're not that technological yet...

## INTO THE DISTANT PAST

AFTER THE ROMANISATION of Britain we were invaded by the Saxons whose evidence is always scant as they didn't build in stone, therefore only their metal/pottery artefacts are those generally found.

With regard to Gargrave, Saxon material has only been found at one site and that is at Old Hall Croft during the archaeological excavation in 1998 prior to house building. A small bronze Saxon buckle with zoomorphic terminals

was found. Zoomorphic means animal representation. The only other item found after the excavation was a silver penny of Aethelred the II dating from the period 978-1016 A.D. This penny was of the first small cross type and was minted in Eoforwic (York) by the moneyer Issulf. We know Aethelred II as 'The

Unready', from UNREDE, meaning 'without counsel', i.e. he was without good advice.

After the Saxons came the Vikings. Again very little has been found in the area, however a Viking sword pommel has been found by a metal detectorist and this resides in Craven Museum. In the church there are some Anglo-Scandanavian cross fragments which indicates an early church in Gargrave presumably where the present church sits. It often happened that once church sites were set-up they remained in constant use, many to the present day.

It would seem that the Old Hall Croft site is a multi-period site which has been occupied for many centuries since the Romans and this site then progresses forward in time to the Mediaeval period, along with another in Gargrave. I will cover these sites in a future article.


hoping that the new Bishop will be able to join us. We shall give the date next month's magazine, it will be sometime in July.


**Endangered Animals** We have had a whole school topic learning about endangered animals. Here's some research and pictures from class 2:
