

ROD'S REFLECTIONS

D.I.Y. S.O.S: The Big Build!!

I DON'T KNOW HOW MANY of you watch "D.I.Y.S.O.S. The Big Build" on BBC TV. It is one of my favourite programmes. A team consisting of a project manager, builders, electricians, plumbers and designers join local craftspeople and often unskilled volunteers to overhaul property of people who, through no fault of their own, have found themselves in difficulties from which there seems no way out. This gives them the start they need to change their lives.

It's a great concept and one of the strengths of the programme is the way the initially small team involve so many locals in the project at hand.

I'll bet you can see where this is going, can't you??

For a long time, God worked with and through many skilled and unskilled people. Builders such as Noah and Solomon; joiners (or at least "joiners-in"), such as David and Samuel and many others who showed people God's designs for a better world, such as the prophets Isaiah, Jeremiah and Micah.

Somehow, it didn't quite catch on, the message of God's love for the whole of his creation and the part we humans could play in it was rejected so many times that in the end it really was a case for a "Do It Yourself Save Our Souls: The Big Build"!

In modern terms, God decided to be the hands-on "project manager" that had been missing. He came up with the great plan of being born as a human being, in an out-of-the-way place, which was experiencing persecution and foreign dominance. He also had to be born to an ordinary family, like yours and mine.

He knew that he needed the experience that such a life could bring in order that he could lead by example and involve as many people as possible in the great refurbishment of his creation, human beings in particular, that he was offering. Building a new way of living and looking at each other and our place within creation.

So he was born as a baby in a far outpost of the Roman Empire. God sent his messengers, his angels, to let the locals know that he had been born in Bethlehem, but to make absolutely sure that even the "bottom tier" of society knew, the angels were sent to shepherds, ordinary working men and boys who were not best regarded in the society of the time.

So began the great working together of God and humanity through Jesus and the Holy Spirit. offering of an opportunity to work in the building of a better world than we could ever have dreamed of, a new life with God.

The opportunity is still here with us and we are reminded of it as we once more celebrate, at Christmas, the birth of God's Son, over 2000 years ago, yet also here in our lives, if we want to let Him in.

New healthy walks for Gargrave and Hellifield

New regular walks are starting in Gargrave and Hellifield in the New Year under the North Craven Strollers "Walking for Health" programme which provides regular free and gentle walks.

Initially the walks will be monthly, meeting on Thursdays at 10 am but it is hoped to increase them to fortnightly or weekly in the future. The first will be in Gargrave on Thursday 5th January when the group will meet at the Summer Seat at 10 am and walk for about an hour finishing up with refreshments at the Dalesman. The next walk will be on 2nd February at Hellifield with another scheduled for 1st March at Gargrave.

Typical walkers include people who were getting over heart surgery and recovering from cancer, as well as carers having chance for an afternoon off and people who had just moved into the area. They are open to all and walkers only need a pair of good walking shoes or boots and weather protection.

Jean Maxwell of Gargrave and Jeff Perris of Hellifield have been trained under the scheme to lead the new walks. Jean said: "The walks make a massive difference to the physical and social health of everyone, and it is very rewarding to see people improve their fitness and well-being over the weeks".

North Craven Strollers already runs weekly walks in Settle. It is run by volunteers under the auspices of Natural England nationally which has over 60,000 registered walkers in more than 5000 groups. Locally, an incentive scheme encourages regular walkers with discount in the two outdoor equipment suppliers in Settle, and walks are often organised to finish at a local tea shop or pub!

As well as the Settle walks meeting at 1.30pm on Wednesdays at the Millennium Garden near Booths car park, other Walking for Health walks in

Craven take place in High Bentham on Monday and Tuesday mornings - contact 015242 62672 - and in Cross Hills and Skipton.

A villager tells us that she went on one of these walks from Settle, and as she is not a regular "walker" found it very pleasant, good company and not overtiring. Everyone went at their own pace and the group waited for everyone to "catch up" and have a little chat. It lasted about an hour and was "just right" for easy unhurried bit of exercise. It will be good to be able to start from the village without one's car.

WI news Janet Sturgess

NOVEMBER WAS ANOTHER BUSY MONTH for Gargrave WI with outings to the ballet to see 'The Nutcracker' and a social lunch at Halls Tea Rooms, which included a mince pie competition.

The Speaker in November, Terry Frazier, addressed the meeting on 'Housekeeping and Conservation in the National Trust'. Following a brief history of the National Trust, Terry described how causes of decay, prevention and intervention are the areas of focus for its annual cleaning programme.

His talk included many insights. Each room in a National Trust property is assessed for optimum light levels. Blinds are adjusted as required to minimise light damage to fabrics and water colours. 'Conservation heating' is provided with humidity between 50-60% since large variations in temperature have an

adverse impact on furniture. This is a computerised process and one of several utilised by the National Trust. Items of furniture each have labelled, numbered covers. The National Trust rotates their use to preserve upholstery. Furniture is even X-rayed to establish its structure and possible levels of infestation.

Many traditional processes however are still used. Bristle brushes and very fine nozzles are used to clean intricate items. Volunteers remove jewellery, watches and wear gloves and to avoid damage. Some items are too valuable and/or heavy to move so they are cleaned in situ with staff working from portable scaffolds.

He pointed out that National Trust properties experience more wear from visitors than in the past when they were private residences. To reduce this many strategies have been deployed. Three metres of matting at an entrance will eliminate most dirt and grit from visitors' shoes. Placing items 1.5 metres from visitors reduces dust by half.

With regard to preservation every National Trust property has a 'Bits and Pieces' box used by conservators to repair damage. Terry stressed that all conservation is reversible. Though visible to experts, members of the public rarely 'see the joins'. The National Trust now wants the public to see such work in progress and visitors are able to speak to the conservators.

The most impressive information for members was the relative infrequency of some cleaning processes! Wooden floors are cleaned two or three times a year. Ceramics every five to six years; chandeliers every ten years. Are there implications here for our own housekeeping?

The competition was for a tip for cleaning a household item. This was won by Joan Lawrence for her tip for cleaning ovens.

WILDLIFE FROM MY WINDOWS

IT'S TIME TO SLOW DOWN. The summer visitors have all migrated, and we hope they have weathered the guns of the Mediterranean on their journeys south. Some mammals have gone into hibernation or semi-hibernation. Most deciduous trees are almost bare, and where they have not been mutilated, their lovely natural shapes are easier to appreciate than in summer, when they are clothed with leaves. The occasional remaining gold leaf is beautiful in the sunshine. The early hoar frost of November picked out the sculptural shapes so well and they were stunning in the early morning sunlight.

It is therefore easier to see our resident birds. There are plenty of blackbirds and I am noticing more robins; finches are much in evidence.

Tits, blue, great and coal abound, and one day among their party, there was a treecreeper climbing up the trunk of a tall hawthorn; then they all flew into the conifers, where he or she climbed up the trunk. I have not seen one for years, so this is a small item of good news in a world where there are daily reports on the World Service and Radio 4 of extinctions, or creatures on the verge of it.

Goldcrests, those enchanting little birds have again explored the conifers. Collared doves, often in pairs, grace the roof tops and lamp posts, and mallard and goosander fly across the skyline. An occasional magpie flies among the trees. These birds have an undeservedly bad reputation, but do very little harm if there are only a few of them.

The rowan, now bare of leaves, attracts birds to its branches. On its tips are small well formed buds, and we must wait patiently for them to burst into leaf next year.

THE DECEMBER GARDEN

AND DECEMBER IS A GOOD TIME to do it if you can lay your hands on some good compost, home made and including leaf mould or well rotted farmyard manure. Spread it over herbaceous beds and vegetable plots and the cold winter weather will do the rest for you. In spring it will be easy to fork in lightly if necessary.

It is tempting to think December is a time to be indoors. In some winters the weather is often not bad at all - 2009 and 2010 being the dramatic

exception. Walk around your garden on fine days. How much winter colour do you have?

There are some wonderful shrubs which will provide winter colour. Mahonias have bright yellow flowers as does winter flowering jasmine. Elaeagnus x ebbingei has wonderful shiny dark green leaves edged with yellow. Then there are the Cotoneasters, with their red and yellow berries which will eventually be eaten by the birds. Pyracanthas too produce huge crops of brilliant berries, golden yellow or rich orange red.

Less popular these days, the winter flowering heathers are very colourful and many do not require acid soil and grow happily in most gardens in shades of pink, mauve, purple and white. In addition they provide good ground cover.

Jobs to do in December

- Half prune roses to prevent them rocking around in the wind. Other tall-stemmed shrubs may need a little pruning.
- As soon as their leaves have fallen, deciduous trees can be pruned and shaped and their size reduced if necessary, in small gardens.
- Plant lily bulbs for next year. Put grit, gravel or broken crocks at the bottom of each 8" pot and cover with 2-3" of soil based compost. Place 3 or 5 bulbs according to size and fill pot almost to the brim with compost and protect from frost by overwintering in greenhouse or cold frame.
- Treat your greenhouse to a thorough clean.

The Cold-War hidden history of Gargrave

I HAVE RECENTLY BEEN taking part in the 20th anniversary of the commemoration of the disbandonment of the Royal Observer Corps (ROC) who were stood down in the September of 1991. The ROC role in WWII was to observe the skies looking for enemy aircraft and when the UK moved into the Cold-War they then took on the role of monitoring the threat of nuclear war. This is where the hidden history of Gargrave comes in.

On the summit of Butterhaugh Hill lies the site of the Gargrave ROC monitoring post No.43 in the York cluster. The underground bunker was opened in the May of 1962 and closed in Sept 1991. The bunker was then filled in during 1998 and the cellphone repeater mast built upon it.

I have been using my amateur radio station in October 2011 as part of a nationwide commemoration of the 20th anniversary by making contact with other amateur radio stations in the UK who were also activating other ROC bunker locations. It was an amazing month with 120 ROC bunkers on the air by over 45 amateur radio operators. A fantastic commemoration of our hidden history. Find more information at www.rocbunkers.co.uk

The cut-away depicted shows the inside of a monitoring post and the Gargrave post would have been the same.

The Gargrave ROC monitoring post No.43 was controlled from the York HQ Group 20 at Acomb. This HQ bunker is now a museum owned by English Heritage and looks as it was at stand down in 1991. It is also the most modern museum that English Heritage own.

I have certainly been educated by reading all about the ROC on the internet and it has a fascinating history. A new book has just been published in time for the 20th anniversary, 'ROC Underground Monitoring Posts' by Mark Dalton. It looks like it will be an interesting read.

Have any of you who are reading this been involved with the Gargrave ROC post as an observer or any of your family? If so I would be interested to read any information that you may have such as stories, leaflets, books, photographs or even the building of the post.

I have one further request. Looking back to WWII, do any of you have any information regarding the searchlight battery that was located in the field across the A65 from the Anchor Inn. It was on the 1945 aerial photographs and I have failed to find out anything further.

I hope that you have enjoyed reading about part of our history that is often overlooked. I for one have found it truly fascinating learning about Gargrave and its role in the Cold-War.

Christmas is on the Cards

Will it be a LeapPad, a Lightsaber or a Lego Fire Temple? All 'must have' toys for this Christmas. Despite rapidly rising prices for basics like food, energy and petrol, the season of shopping on credit cards is with us again - leaving debts that will contribute to a national day of gloom in January when the statements come through.

Personal debt, excluding mortgages, now averages around £9,000 per household in Britain. It's frightening and makes people feel trapped, driven and despairing. To escape from debt we must honestly face up to it and make some tough choices.

I'm not talking about people whose life situations put them on, or even below, the breadline, with agonizing decisions to make every day. Such people deserve our support and the help and advice of charities like Christians Against Poverty. No, I'm talking about the majority of us who are in a position to make some simpler choices about what we spend.

My mobile is looking old, the battery is not what it was, but to change it I would have to move to a more expensive contract. I want a new one, but I don't need it. I would love to give my kids some big presents, but if I'm really honest they don't need them either. The pressure is coming from a culture which says 'I am what I have', and perhaps from my own covetousness and insecurity.

In Scripture we read, 'I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation' (Philippians 4:12). Yes, contentment! A mighty weapon in the fight against covetousness and materialism! This may well be the battle to be fought in many a heart and mind in the lead up to Christmas. If we can learn to be content with less 'stuff', we may discover an increased freedom to make work and lifestyle changes and adapt to reduced income.

Far be it from me to stifle generosity - especially as giving can be a language of love. But Scripture also says that 'if the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what one does not have' (2 Corinthians 8:12). In the midst of our giving let's hold on to the freedom of a low debt lifestyle.

'Let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to love one another' (Romans 13:8).

We're not that close to them but would like to see them a bit more, particularly as we now have a baby and would like him to see his grandparents. Can you help?

Dear Clive.

Often people don't want to see the inlaws, but perhaps they don't want to see you? Have you annoyed them, or upset them? Perhaps they don't feel able to explain what has gone wrong. Perhaps they don't want to be a babysitting service. Some gentle probing might reveal the cause of their reticence. Meeting somewhere other than your homes - a neutral venue - might help. If that doesn't work you need to confront them: ask what the issue is and sort it out! But it does appear that you won't be seeing much of them until you have got to the root of the problem and addressed it. You can't force people to be friends.


Dear Clive.

Gently gently would be my thought: it may all just feel too much for them. They may be the same with other people. Even normal life feels a challenge, as you get older: you and a baby may be way too much. Try being kind to them from a distance: send them post cards, a thoughtful present from holiday, a nice phone call. Take an interest in what they are doing. Don't give up if it often doesn't work out: keep on trying to meet up. God loves us a bit like that: he doesn't force his affection on us. The famous picture 'The Light of the World' by Holman Hunt is based upon a verse in the Bible where Jesus says: 'Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with him and he with me.' But it is up to us to open the door for ourselves. You could try applying the oil of kindness to your inlaws and see if that helps the door open. Persistent knocking may also help.

'E lived wi' mi Great Aunt Everella (she wor sister ter mi grandmother, thasees), and wi' 'im 'at ah called Uncle Willie. Ah reckon 'at 'e worn't mi real uncle, thanaws; ah reckon 'at they wor livin' ower t' brush! But nub'd'y ivver telled me owt abaat that – ah wor too young to knaw abaat these 'eer things!

wintredge. It wor easy I' them days – noa buttons ter press ner nowt – mangles nivver brok daan! 'Appen ther'd 'ev sooar 'ands, thoa!

Ah've just thowt on. Ther 'ed a big kitchen table wi' polished fancy legs, an' ivvery leg 'ed an owd sock on it. They reckon 'at this 'ere wor a throwback ter't Victorian times, when it wor not seemly for lasses to show bits o' leg; an' this cum ter meean 'at onny soort o' leg 'ed ter be covered up. 'Appen soa – burr, ageean, 'appen ther wor nobbut theer cos ther thowt 'at socks o' t' table leg 'ud stop 'em gerrin' scratched.

It wor a posh 'ouse – ther 'ed gas leets. Sum on yer 'ull 'appen remember 'at ye 'ed ter 'ev a mantle for ivvery leet, an' these 'eer mantles wor reight flimsy – if yer touched 'em, ther'd fall ter bits. Well, one day, ah wor theer, an' they got ter be fratchin' among thersens. One on em' let weng wi' a dish claat, burr it missed, an' hit t' mantle i'steead! Ther wor 'ell ter pay, ah can tell ther!

Ah reckon that's enew thru' me fer naa. God bless!

GAS LIGHT AND THE INSTALLED CAULDRON

When I was a youngster, I went with father to visit his cousin Jack. He lived with my great—aunt Everella (she was grandmother's sister), and with him whom I referred as Uncle Willie. It occurred to me subsequently that to call him "uncle" was something of a misnomer; I believe they were living in sin! But I was kept in ignorance of such things — I was considered too young!

They lived in a one up, one down, with a small extra bedroom. A door closed off the bottom of the staircase, with a curtain over the outside door in order to prevent the ingress of cold air. In the corner there was a sink made of stone, and a cold water tap (they used very little hot water) – but there was a range which required regular polishing with graphite solution, and they would put the kettle on the fire for cups of tea and so forth. It seems to me that they didn't need baths in that era – not like Queen Elizabeth, who had a bath every year, whether she needed it or not. Oh – just in case of any misunderstanding, I must make it clear that I am not referring to our own Queen Elizabeth II (God bless her) – it is a reasonable assumption to make that she takes a bath weekly.

They had in the cellar an installed cauldron; they would fill it with water using buckets on washing day, and under it they would light a fire. Afterwards, they would transfer the hot water by means of an enamelled half-gallon container into a washing tub. They had a rubbing board on which garments were vigorously scrubbed in order to remove soiling. They also had a posser, which is similar in shape to a very large potato masher. After a further rinse, they would have to pass them through the wringing machine, before hanging them out to dry. Oh yes – and if it was raining, they would have to hang them round the fire on a clothes drier (Etymological note: winterhedge – instead of hanging clothes on a garden hedge as they would in summer, in winter, they used a "winterhedge"). Things were easy in those days – no buttons to press, or anything. Wringers never broke down! Perhaps they would have sore hands, though!

I've just remembered. They had a big kitchen table with polished intricately carved legs, and every leg had on it an old sock. This is supposed to have originated in Victorian times, when it was not done for young ladies to expose their lower limbs, and the outcome of this was that any sort of leg must be covered. Perhaps – but again, but it may be that the socks on the table leg were there to prevent it becoming scratched.

It was a sophisticated dwelling – illumination was by way of gas lights. Some of you will remember that it was that every light required a mantle, and that these mantles were extremely fragile – if they were touched, they collapsed. Well, one day when I was present, they started arguing. One person threw a dishcloth across the room, which missed, and hit the mantle. Strong words were to be heard!

In my opinion, that is quite sufficient from me. God bless!







Monthly meeting, 7 November 2011

Apologies were received from Clls. Turner, Smales, Thomas, Perls. Dist. Counc. Myers was also unable to attend. Cll. Perls has tended his resignation due to family reasons.

Four members of the Library Support Committee attended to report on the current situation in the fight to save Gargrave Library. The group is waiting to hear if the proposals for the community to manage the library will be accepted by NYCC Executive but there is serious concern that volunteers to go on the Management Committee or to provide assistance in the library itself have not

been forthcoming. The cost of providing an RFID system to self-issue items will be £1,700 and the group will also have to fund the costs of CRB checks for all volunteers. Thanks were offered to the Parish Council for their financial assistance and to members of Gargrave WI who are hoping to organise a "Friends" scheme. Members are due to address the school PTA next week.

The Parish Council website should be up and running soon – details will be placed in the Parish Magazine and the Craven Herald village news.

New lights are to be placed on the village Christmas tree this year at a cost of £1,985 but these will remain there throughout the year and should not need replacing for at least 3 years. Concern was expressed about the planted beds at the village's entry and exit which need trimming and tidying.

The ROSPA inspection of the playground has taken place and the contract to service St Andrews clock was approved. A resident has expressed concern about the condition of the tow path between Higherlands and the Anchor locks. The possibility of acquiring land for allotments is to be discussed at next month's meeting. Council is still waiting for signage to the doctor's surgery. Planning applications were considered for Paget Hall which includes walls, gates and a horse walking area. The missing stones on the greens are to be replaced and the plans for the Memorial Garden path are to be marked out.

The non-emergency telephone number for the police is to be changed from December 12th to 101 instead of the current 0845 60 60 247.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 5th December at 7.15 pm.
