

ROD'S REFLECTIONS

Farther On

2011 IS NOW BEHIND US and we look forward to 2012 and what the year will bring for us.

Sometimes we can see a New Year as an opportunity for new beginnings, but I feel that is often not a helpful way to look at our lives and the lives of those around us.

One thing that the modern "celebrity culture" has brought to the fore is the accent on someone's "journey", be it the journey from first audition to X Factor finals, (and here you can substitute "Strictly come Dancing", "Big Brother", "I'm a Celebrity, get me out of here") or the physical journeys to the Arctic Circle, down the Amazon, across the Sahara that have featured recently on T.V.

There is, of course, another sort of "journey"; the spiritual journey we all make, in some form or another. Even those who reject all forms of spirituality have "arrived" at that conclusion after a "journey of exploration".

In Jesus' teaching "journey" plays an important part. The past is as important as the present and Jesus, in so many ways, gives people hope for the future, however uncertain individuals might be seeing their future.

He gives credence to the fact that we are all on a journey by the great promise he gives to his disciples at the Last Supper; that he is "going to prepare a place for them" and will return to take them there. His statement that he is "The Way" (and "The Truth and The Life") refers not to a "method of doing things" but to "The Road" to God's Kingdom; that there is always more to experience farther on that journey.

Indeed, the early followers of Christ, after his Resurrection and Ascension, were known as "followers of the Way"; people following The Road!

Can we see that we are all "journeying through life"? If so, "new beginnings" become changes of direction, which is an entirely different matter. Changes in direction acknowledge all that is in the past, whereas "new beginnings" might tempt us to try to ignore our past and "start again". That could lead to so many problems, because who we are at any time can't be divorced from our experiences up to that point.

Deciding to follow Jesus was never about a new beginning, but about bringing all that we are and we were and stepping out in a new direction with him, following the Road and allowing ourselves to experience life in a new way.

Jesus said "If any wants to save their life, take up your cross and follow me". He always meant that to be:

"Bring everything that is you, including all the things that have ever happened in your life, and come with me to a new view of life and yourselves, to a place where you know that you are loved for being You, not for someone that you think others would like you to be before you can be acceptable."

What an invitation!! I pray that we can travel that Road together, with the sure promise that there is always more to experience as we travel "farther on".

Progress is being made and NYCC have accepted the recommendations of the Executive to authorize the Officers to continue to support us in our efforts to establish a community library.

The Library Management Committee is in the process of establishing a not- for- Profit Company which will also have charitable status. We hope that this will be achieved before Christmas which will allow us to hit the New Year running, both in the recruitment of more volunteers and in the task of fund raising.

The Committee have filled most of the required roles but we are still seeking somebody with marketing experience whose main duties will be in raising the profile and activities of the Library both locally and in the wider Craven community. To improve the balance of the Committee we would also like a number of 'Community Reps' i.e. people who represent other bodies in the community such as the WI, Schools, Malhamdale and we would especially welcome a young person to make us all sit up and think.

Gargrave villagers will have received notification of the new application for a local wind farm which will offer funding for local community projects, if and when the site becomes operational. Following a meeting with EnergieKontor, Gargrave Management Committee have decided that, should such funds become available at some point in the future, they will apply for same to maintain the community library in the village. This approach does not reflect the views of members of the Committee with regard to the planning application itself. In the meantime the Committee will continue to explore other areas of fund-raising.

In support of the National Library Day in early February the WI in conjunction with the Library Committee will be holding a Coffee Morning in the Village Hall on Saturday 11th February to raise awareness and funds for the library. We look forward to your support.

WILDLIFE FROM MY WINDOWS

"I see trees of green, Clouds of white, Skies of blue And I say to myself 'What a wonderful world'."

THE DECIDUOUS TREES are bare now, but the evergreens are a joy. Holly are featured in many carols at this time. The ones I see from my windows have very few berries this year, but a stone's throw away, there is holly laden with rich red berries.

It has been a mild November here, but not unduly dry, so we are not panicking about water shortage, as in some parts of the country. Collared doves sensed Spring in the air, and indulged in flights reminiscent of their courtship, though there were no signs of them mating. In the South though, blackbirds used the exceptionally mild weather as a cue to start nesting.

The delightful little goldcrests have again been seen flitting among their favourite conifers. The rowan continues to attract tits, including the longtails, also finches and blackbirds, to its branches, where they find food.

The weather turned abruptly colder in December. In Scotland particularly, there has been heavy snow, but here we have so far had only a light dusting. Between the showers we saw those skies of blue, clouds of white and trees of green, and in the early morning magical light, the trunks of the trees looked like bronze.

A skein of geese has flown over honking their way westward. I have never seen them fly eastward, so they must fly that way by another route. There are plenty of mallard and goosander to be seen in flight.

Birds are now coming to my bird table. Their eating patterns vary. Blackbirds, robins and chaffinches alight on the table, and stay for a while, feeding. Blue, great and coat tits on the other hand, dart onto the table, grab a nut in their bill and fly to a nearby tree, where they perch with it on the branch, steadying it with their feet, and bobbing up and down, eat it a peck at a time. I have never seen the longtail tits on the bird table.

Towards the end of November, National Tree Week was the occasion to encourage us to plant more trees. The plight of the rainforests is well known. Cities too suffer. The Mayor of Kabul is very concerned about poor air quality there, and has instituted many reforms, including initiating a tree planting poicy.

We can start here. In coronation Year, the slogan "Plant a tree in '53 met with some success. How about for the coming year, "Plant a native tree for the Jubilee"?

JANUARY IS THE START OF the new gardening year. It is tempting in the cold dark days to forget the garden and stay indoors. Yet there is much to look forward to and by the end of the month there will be visible signs of spring. The first bulbs will be pushing up and the buds on trees and shrubs will start to fatten. Provided you have them in your garden, the first snowdrops will be starting to flower followed by aconites and early polyanthus and primroses. In my garden the first clump of snowdrops begin to push up in November. Provided they are not covered by a blanket of snow they will be in flower at Christmas.

Things to do in January

- Sow sweet pea seeds.
- For those who like to raise their own bedding plants at the end of the month, sow seeds of salvias, petunias, bizzy lizzy, lobelia etc. Place on a warm window sill OR...
- ...Invest in a propagator!
- Continue to look for pernicious weeds such as chickweed, groundsel, creeping buttercup and bittercress which continue to grow during winter.
- Wash outside of greenhouse windows to let in maximum light. Ventilate it on warm days. This helps to prevent mildew on pots already overwintering there. Have you moved tender plants into the greenhouse?
- Should you wish to plant a new tree, shrub or fruit bush, now is the time to do it.
- Look at seed catalogues.
- Feed the birds!

Still searching?

And lo, certain wise men spotted a strange star in the east and wondered what it didst purport. And then, verily, 2000 years later, some more wise folk did almost very possibly glimpse the mechanism that allowed everything to gain mass directly after the big bang and also did wonder, what couldst this mean?

Those intrepid scientists who keep Geneva's Large Hadron Collider shipshape might sound to some of us like overgrown Scalextric addicts, spending their days whizzing particles around a 17-mile ring in order to smash them together. Why? To uncover a cosmic-sized mystery at the heart of the universe.

If my meagre brain serves me right it's something like this. A big bang produces lots of particles and lots of energy, with particles zipping about all over the place at nearly light speed. So how did some of the particles actually stop moving about and combine in order to make the building blocks of the universe? What force glued them together?

Enter the Higgs boson particle stage left. The physicist Peter Higgs and his gang came up with this theory in the 1960s as a way of explaining why particles have mass. Mass, as the BBC website helpfully points out, is 'quite simply, a measure of how much stuff an object - a particle, a molecule, or a Yorkshire terrier - contains'. The Higgs boson is understood as an invisible energy field through which other particles pass and pick up mass, without which particles would zip through space at the speed of light, unable to bind together.

Now it's not certain that the elusive HB has been spotted in the LHC (go on, impress your next dinner guests with the acronyms); scientists are reluctant to call it a 'discovery' until it can be verified. Even so, this might be the most important science clue of the past 100 years - one more piece in the jigsaw that is our cosmos.

Amazing. In an age of constant movement and constant information overload, some days we need to pause long enough to be able to say 'Wow!' Like magi amazed at portents in the east, like David in Psalm 19 marvelling at the heavens.

But, thanaws, t'tale o' t' kettle I'n't ower yet! Ar lass fun' t' kettle I't garden, an' she giv' it ter me, an' ah polished it up ageean, an' naa it's on a shelf in aar 'aas. Ah'll shaw thee it if tha pops raand! T'oil is still theer, an' yer can sea weer it ewsed ter be black breet. But t'fireoil's gooan, an' nub'dy 'ull ivver mak tea wi'watter in that theer na moor, tha knaws!

The Copper Kettle and the Precursor of the Electronic Chip!

You have heard from me previously about my father. He was a masterpiece of DIY. Before people had radios – TV had not been invented, and not many even had radios – my father made for himself a very primitive radio using what was known as a cat's whisker. There were no transistors, and one had to use headphones. He felt that was unsatisfactory, so he used his ingenuity and made a loudspeaker out of brown paper and varnish etc. I am afraid that is the limit of my knowledge – but there may have been wires in addition.

Remember, at that time, few people had electricity; many had gas light, but there were still those who had to use candles. Since there was no three pin plug for his radio, it was necessary to use an accumulator, which was a square glass jar containing acid and lead plates, and two screws to which one attached the

wires. It was a kind of battery, you will understand; when it ran down, one needed to take it to the shop in order to have it recharged.

As a child, my father's Saturday task was to polish the copper kettle. Perhaps this was a prerequisite to his receiving any pocket money. The kettle spent most of its time on the fire, always available to make cups of tea. As a result, it was always covered in soot, and it must have taken a lot of effort to make it shine. Ultimately, the kettle developed a leak as a result of this continued exposure to the fire, so it was disposed of. Thus it became available, and buried in the garden, made a very good quality earth for the radio.

However, the story continues! My sister discovered the kettle in the garden, gave it to me, and I did the polishing this time, and now it stands on a shelf at my home. The hole is still visible, as is the scarring resulting from the fire. But the fireplace has gone, and nobody will ever make tea from that kettle again!

Cross those legs, you may want to avoid this if you are a gent of a nervous disposition. Time to discuss castration.

Recommended age of dog castration varies between practices, from the RSPCA neutering from around 6 months, to a more standard 12 months. This varies depending on circumstances and breed, with the larger slower maturing breeds castrated at an older age. There is no upper age limit, although for some older animals with medical issues we consider chemical castration using injections or implants.

Sometimes testicles do not drop into the correct position as pups; they may be retained either in the groin or inside the abdomen. As a large percentage of these become cancerous, castration with removal of the elusive testicle/s is always recommended. Breeding from these individuals is never advised as it is a heritable trait.

The operation is much more straightforward than a bitch spay; to start with the essential bits are visible so any abnormalities/enlargements/missing bits are immediately noted! The testicles are usually removed though one incision, leaving an empty sack which may look a little bruised for a day or 2 but soon shrinks away. Home the same day, with restricted exercise for a week or so and as a favourite lickable area, a collar is often recommended!

I find my female clients more open in discussing castration of their male pets. Lots of their male owners like to crack a joke about it, but sometimes you can feel the underlying tension and nervousness in talks surrounding the op. A few even would not consider it, as if having a neutered male dog somehow casts aspersions on their own masculinity!

Sometimes there is the concern that it will change their personalities after neutering. The main disadvantage is the same as with bitches after neutering-weight gain. So if your dog puts an amount of weight on, they probably will change, becoming less active and alert. So less is needed in the food bowl afterwards.

But there are many benefits to a neutered male. Not going to run off for a night of passion with the floozy poodle in season down the road, so less likely to wander, get lost or have an accident. Some aggressive behaviours, especially if directed towards other entire male dogs, are appeased. No chance of testicular tumours. In entire dogs, certain other tumours are testosterone fuelled, as are some hernias. Hormone-dependent prostate enlargement is also fairly common, causing problems with toileting and the waterworks.

So, gents, if your nocturnal trips to the bathroom are getting more frequent, maybe a trip to the local vets for a quick op involving two bricks is the answer....OUCH!!

You may ask, two bricks- doesn't that hurt ??

Only if I get my thumbs in the way!!.... (the old ones are the best).

'Every Child Counts; Every Child Contributes'

All the pupils performed fantastically at The Christmas Recipe; they enjoyed themselves and we enjoyed watching it and seeing their confidence grow.

The nativity in St Andrew's Church reminded us about the meaning of Christmas through story and carols, the youngest children creating a picture of the scene in Bethlehem. The musicians performed a wide range of instruments.

This term the learning moves to a favourite theme for the children: our natural world. We shall be exploring different places, the geography, including the natural disasters that occur and the effect on people.

History of Gargrave School

Siyam Ali, Class 4

Gargrave School was built in 1873 on Skipton Road. Our new school was built in 1976 in Neville Road.

Children left school much earlier in those days. For example, in 1893 pupils left aged 11 years, in 1899 they left a year later at age 12. In 1947, this increased to 15 years and in 1968, they left at 16 years.

Punishments are very different today – early records show children were caned. The Punishment Book showed in 1901 that Harry received two strokes of the cane for blotting his work, and Sarah Howard received two strokes of the cane for passing a note to another pupil!

Recently, Mr Robinson visited our school. He had been a head teacher at this school and was able to tell us a lot of information and stories about his time there. He told us that he was listening to a girl read and that he had fallen asleep! The girl fetched another teacher who had to wake him up!

Mr Robinson carved the Gargrave school badge, which can be seen just outside the main entrance doors to the school.

The school has records covering the past years which are interesting to read. They include an early Register of Pupils, a Punishment Book, a School Diary, a Manager and Visitors Book, a Parent/Teacher Fellowship Book and a P.T.A. Minute Book for 1957.

In 1904, the school had a bank account with Craven Bank, Skipton – their balance was £13 6s 6d!

I would have wanted to go to school in 1893 because the pupils left school at 11 years old! On the other hand, I wouldn't like to be caned as a punishment!

East Barnby Report
