

Groundhog Day

(For those of you who have seen the film, don't worry; I won't do this again......)

In the United States, Groundhog Day falls on February 2nd, which on this side of the pond we call Candlemas. You may be familiar with the old folklore:

"If Candlemas Day is clear and bright,

Winter will have another bite.

If Candlemas Day brings cloud and rain, Winter is gone and will not come again."

Groundhog Day has similar associations;

Last Tuesday, the 2nd, was Candlemas day, the day on which, according to the Germans, the Groundhog peeps out of his winter quarters and if he sees his shadow he pops back for another six weeks nap, but if the day be cloudy he remains out, as the weather is to be moderate.

4 Feb 1841 - from Pennsylvania storekeeper James Morris' diary

All of these 'weather divinations' seem to have their origin in Imbolc, the pagan festival that celebrates the stirring of Spring. Imbolc is February 1st, which is St Brigit's Day; variants include Brigid, Bridget, Bridgit, Bríd and Bride which is hardly surprising as Imbolc was a celebration in honour of the Gaelic goddess - Brigid - of poetry, healing and smithcraft. Both St Brigit and Brigid are also associated with sacred flames.

Candlemas, in the Christian calendar, represents the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, which needed to be 40 days after his birth according to the Law of Moses, and is the trigger for Simeon's and Anna's prayers and praise (Luke 2:v22 – 38). We use the name Candle-mass because traditionally this is the day when all the candles to be burned in church during the year are blessed.

Old custom (and indeed still followed in the Vatican) is for green decorations from Christmas to be removed on Candlemas.

Down with the rosemary, and so Down with the bays and mistletoe; Down with the holly, ivy, all, Wherewith ye dress'd the Christmas Hall

Robert Herrick (1591–1674), "Ceremony upon Candlemas Eve"

Whether we think that Candlemas, or indeed St Brigid's Day, have their origins in pagan rites, or whether there is just a serendipitous circumstance, isn't really important. Festivals and Feast Days are part of the Christian calendar that help to give us a sense of rhythm and movement through the year. Every day is different; some days are full of joy, or sunshine; some days are sad or dreary days. But every day God is with us.

May we all sense His presence, whatever the season, whatever our circumstance, and give thanks for His great love.

Cheese Specialist Settles for North Yorkshire

SETTLE'S GOT A SMELLY FUTURE - in The Courtvard, just outside Settle, North Yorkshire, after years working in the cheese industry I'm setting up and settling down. l embarked from Appleby at an early age to find the finest cheese available. After obtaining a first-class honours degree Sheffield Hallam from



University in 'Culinary Arts and Hospitality' I worked for Paxton and Whitfield – Britain's oldest cheesemonger. This led to an award from the Queen Elizabeth Scholarship Trust, enabling me to complete an apprenticeship on ageing cheese in France with Hervé Mons.

Returning to England to work for The Fine Cheese Co., I took up responsibility for cheese quality and for personally selecting cheese from the farm.

But I always wanted to return back North to set-up my own specialist cheese shop: I want to get people to taste and enjoy the best cheeses and charcuterie available in Europe. The cheeses include a range of goats', cows' and sheep's milk: from soft and supple to stinky and spicy - there is something to suit every taste.

They're so good that the locals just want to hold onto them; that's why I often have to go there to collect them myself!

We aim for The Courtyard Dairy to become a real destination shop for the best in fine unpasteurised farmhouse cheese.

So next time you're driving up the A65 past Settle, open the window and please enjoy the scents emanating from The Courtyard Dairy. My partner, Kathy, and I would love to see you inside and taste some cheese with you.

WE HAVE RECENTLY ACQUIRED two guinea pigs, Nutty and Treacle, for our girls. I am astounded by the joy these two little fur-balls have brought! They have been here for three months now and their appeal shows no sign of abating. Morning and night they are out, being cuddled, petted and sang to. They really are most tolerant pets.

I think we were rather nonchalant about pets, with all the access to stock the girls have, without realising the amount of enthusiasm unleashed by having their own responsibility, which they are relishing.

They came from a neighbour's house, after a Sunday morning walk, that lead to a cup of tea, then an offer of guinea pigs – still happy and much cared for, though now not really wanted pets. I suspect many children's pets are not quite so lucky to continue to have such TLC after the excitement has waned.

They came complete with hutch and accessories so that was a much easier bargaining tool for the children to use against us once they knew that getting them was a possibility. However a contract (downloaded from the internet) had to be signed by both children before the deal was done, promising to love, cherish and look after their new pets FOREVER, and although it has not been needed yet, I would highly recommend one to any parent to wave in front of the reluctant child owner some cold winter's night.

I feel personally it has given me a new insight into the small and furry subpopulation of pets that we see, and how much they mean to their owners. Some of those we see at the surgery are related to husbandry – e.g. overgrown nails with too little exercise on rougher surfaces, dental issues that may be related to an incorrect diet and too much reliance on concentrate feeding, rather than fresh hay/fibre, veg and gnawing blocks. We also get a relatively high proportion of mites and other skin diseases, some related to a lack of vitamin C.

One important factor is that they are not solitary animals, they love company of their own kind (just like rabbits love other rabbits not g pigs...). So I would recommend considering guineapigrehome.org.uk, the RSPCA or similar rescue centres for a couple of older pigs for a 1st pet, or to get a pal for a lonely older pet if you're unlucky enough to lose one.

What more can I say- the ideal children's pet.



GOING GREEN IN GARGRAVE

Going Green goes to the Green

I WAS TALKING TO MY SISTER over Christmas about one of her neighbours. She lives on the edge of Brentwood in Essex, just round the corner from a gravel path that leads along a line of trees by a meadow, into a bluebell wood. We have walked along there dozens of times as it's a useful shortcut to a railway station. Heather reckoned that this neighbour had never walked along the path; never seen the bluebells; never smelt the autumn leaves.

It got me thinking. Many people I know in Gargrave are truly appreciative of living in such a beautiful area and try to make the most of it. Walk down Marton Road to the canal on a sunny Sunday afternoon and you will probably meet someone you know. The Pennine Way is popular with walkers and our roads are full of cyclists at the weekends. But I wonder if there are some people who, while physically capable, just don't venture out into the countryside, like my sister's neighbour.

Even those of us who do enjoy the outdoors lead lives that are far more isolated from nature than our ancestors did. In his first "Letter from the Countryside" in this magazine, six years ago, Jeremy Taylor from Small House Farm wrote that "we all lead 'urbanised' lives nowadays, whether we live in the heart of a town, or the next-door-neighbour is half-a-mile away".

A book I have been reading recently⁽¹⁾ put it this way:

"We may not realise the extent to which we have gradually isolated ourselves from the rest of nature. Double glazing shuts out the dawn chorus, and few of us rise early enough to hear it clearly. We charge through the countryside in cars, rather than walk or cycle at a speed that allows us to see the flowers we are passing. Very few of us now work outdoors in the fields and lanes or on the mountains and lakes, and those of us that do so are typically cocooned in noisy machines".

What are the consequences of this disconnection? There has been plenty of worry in the media recently about the effects on children of a lifestyle where worried parents confine their children indoors to be entertained by screens rather than face the perceived dangers lurking outside the front door. There are fairly obvious effects on health for all ages from avoiding fresh air and exercise.

I think the problems go further than this though. By isolating ourselves from God's creation we are losing our ability to care about it. In the words of the Eden

 $Project^{(2)}$, who have allowed us to use their excellent cartoons for this series,

"People can't care about what they don't understand and don't have some sense of connection to. So we need to get out and down in that dirt lest we forget how it keeps us alive. Play together, learn, explore and have adventures".



It's a tall order to expect someone to change their lifestyle in order to avoid harm to the rainforest if they barely even notice the trees on the greens in Gargrave. Our world view is strongly influenced by our everyday experiences: what we see from our windows, what we hear (birdsong or iPod), how we get around.

Getting out into the countryside or the garden has been shown to have other advantages too. Recent studies⁽³⁾ have shown that being exposed to greenery has widespread benefits for our ability to pay attention, to remember, to interact socially and to delay gratification. The health effects are such that it has been suggested that a recommended daily allowance for exposure to greenery is introduced (20 minutes).

We need the restorative effects of contact with nature more than ever these days. Many people spend more and more time responding to external distractions. The information-processing demands of everyday life – traffic, phones, texts, emails, TV, conversations, problems at work, consumer choices and associated decisions – take their toll on our intellectual and emotional resources. How often have you been speaking to someone who has broken off mid-sentence to respond to the latest demand of their iPhone? Our economy and our culture encourage us to pay attention to more than one thing at a time. "Contact with greenery seems to provide some form of neurological respite from deliberately misspending our attention all day through too much screen time"⁽³⁾.

There are encouraging signs that things are changing. Gargrave Pre-School, in line with the Early Years Foundation Stage, has a policy that children should spend half their time outdoors. Gargrave Primary School has been running outdoor Forest School sessions and has a thriving gardening club. Children at the newly opened Cherry Tree Farm day nursery between Gargrave and Broughton are taken out to play at making dens in six acres of woodland, yes even in the snow last week. Adults need to catch up!

I admit that it can be hard to find the motivation and the opportunity to get outside on a cold, wet, dark February day. Our houses and cars isolate us from discomforts and dangers as well as the benefits of nature. But many of us do need to get out more.

Do You Hear the People Sing?

I WEPT. Two nights ago, in an Odeon cinema in Kingston town, I wept. Nothing to do with the singing or facial contortions of Hugh Jackman and Russell Crowe. Rather, it was the visualisation of God's kingdom that first captured my heart nine years ago, evoked so beautifully in Tom Hooper's Oscar-nominated adaptation of **Les Misérables**, that broke me.

As other reviews and posts attest, Valjean's tale is one of life- (and world-) changing grace – that reaches out to all, redeeming and transforming. Yet the motivations behind each of the plot lines tell of a bigger story. Fantine's fall into poverty to pay the debt of supporting her daughter, the revolutionary students' belief in a nation of equality even, ultimately, at the expense of their own lives, and Valjean's rescue of Cosette, Javert and Marius all speak of the other-centred life – where there is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends (John 15:13), even those unknown to us.

Of course, violent revolution is not the model by which our Prince of Peace directs **his** kingdom. Still, my hope remains that despite a time where the church has been said to be 'out of touch' and 'not with the programme', those who see this film may see a beauty – something of the presence of the kingdom – in lives poured out for others, where not our will is done but **his**, with God enlivening believers and stirring belief in the hearts of those lost and without hope. As Herbert Kretzmer's lyrics express it:

Do you hear the people sing Lost in the valley of the night? It is the music of a people Who are climbing to the light. For the wretched of the earth There is a flame that never dies. Even the darkest night will end And the sun will rise.

They will live again in freedom In the garden of the Lord. They will walk behind the ploughshare; They will put away the sword. The chain will be broken And all men will have their reward.

Will you join in our crusade? Who will be strong and stand with me? Somewhere beyond the barricade Is there a world you long to see? Do you hear the people sing? Say, do you hear the distant drums? It is the future that they bring When tomorrow comes... Tomorrow comes!
