

DAVID'S DISPATCHES

Harvest Festival is over, the days are drawing in, the weather has turned and the trees are dropping their leaves. Just like the changing seasons, and the changeable weather, many things in life are beyond our control. And maybe that's a good thing, because we wouldn't necessarily know what's best for our - or other people's - lives.

So many problems seem to be caused by people trying to have things all their own way. But in reality we have to learn to fit in with each other. The principle 'Love your neighbour as yourself' is a really good attitude - simple but balanced. Love your neighbour in the same way that you love yourself. That means caring about other people and caring for yourself too. And as we learn to love and care for other people, which isn't always easy, we can learn how to love and care for ourselves too.

When we are very young, of course, the universe seems to revolve around us. But, hopefully, as we grow up we realise that we are one person among many - in our families, in class, with our friends, at work and in our community. So our attitudes, what we say and what we do, affect other people's lives - and their attitudes and choices affect us too. The principle 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind' has several implications, one of which is to choose to live life well - the way God would have us live.

Those two principles, loving God and loving our neighbours as ourselves are the basis for moral and spiritual teaching of the Bible. Jesus said that "All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." They lead to having good relationships with God and with each other.

We can't hope to control everything, and real life isn't always easy on planet earth, but having God and people on our side really helps!

ROSE HIP SYRUP

I HAVE BEEN ENCOURAGED to see the amount of 'produce gathering' that goes on in Yorkshire. From central Bradford, where walnuts and blackberries have been processed, to our more rural spot, people all around me have been making the best of an abundant summers' produce.

This month that I am going to tell you about rose-hip syrup making. However doing anything with rosehips does come with a warning: *the little hairs inside the hip are the source of itching powder*, as many an older generation person can tell you! When cooking you MUST take care to strain these out otherwise you can have a nasty accident when you swallow them! I strain them after stewing, through 2 pillow cases at least.

For those still willing to try making rosehip syrup, you will be following in a great British tradition of using bountiful free Vitamin C that grows in our hedgerows. In the Second World War children were given it to keep them well. I used it last winter as a hot drink cordial and only got colds in May when I had had used my supply up!

You will need to be well equipped with protective clothing, gloves and scissors. This is a dangerous sport and you are likely to get scratched. However I believe the results are worth it. All roses are edible so you can pick any rosehips you see. They vary greatly in size and colour, from red to black. They need to have been 'bleated' or picked after the first frost. This makes them all gooey and sticky rather than tough and hard. You find these prolific berries down the lanes you picked blackberries in, both on moors and in town. They are found on bare, prickly rosebushes that have mainly shed their leaves. If you can recruit brave children then you can pick a good harvest. If you only pick a little at a time then freeze them, aiding their bleating and go back another day. If you succeed at this then you are the hardiest of foragers in my opinion...

Rosehip Syrup Recipe

1kg bleated rosehips to 500g sugar to 3 litres water (I calculate appropriate measurements if I don't get quite enough hips.)

Put hips into 2 litres of hot water, mash to break up, or as I do, blend with stick blender a little (safely), before quickly brining to the boiling. Immediately turn off the heat and let sit for 15 minutes.

Strain through at least 2 layers of muslin or pillowcase, suspended from a chair above a large bowl. Leave overnight.

Return the pulp to a pan and re-boil and infuse with another litre of water. Strain as before with a clean set of pillowcases.

Add all the juice you get to a pan. Simmer this down until you get a bit less than a litre of juice left. Add the sugar, stir to dissolve and bring to the boil for up to five minutes. Pour into sterilised bottles.

Top tip: As well as using the cordial as a health drink you can pour in on cakes, over ice-cream, make sorbets and anything else you can think of.

What's shaping you?

BORN BETWEEN THE LATE 1970S AND THE MID 1990S, Generation Y have a new moniker – Gen Y Protagonists & Special Yuppies, or GYPSYs. And according to a widely-cited piece in The Huffington Post, they're not very happy.

As the offspring of a generation whose prosperity is unprecedented, GYPSYs expect the same affluence as their parents – and they want it now. Brought up with the mantra of being 'special' has fuelled a strong sense of entitlement, exacerbated by the 'image crafting' flaunted in social media. So, when reality fails to match expectation, disillusionment is inevitable.

As it happens, the desire for personal fulfilment and self-entitlement is not limited to particular generations. Still, regardless of whether the analysis of the article is accurate in all its details, it does raise the significance of story and imagination in shaping us. It reminded me of the power of what philosopher Charles Taylor calls 'social imaginaries' – ways of seeing ourselves and others which shape what we value and how we live in the world.

It also challenged me to think how those of us who are parents bring up our children. How do we share 'social imaginaries' for what life is about? When we pray for our children, what do we pray for? How many of us run around making endless investments of time and energy for the sake of the GYPSY story, pursuing personal satisfaction and happiness, with the justification that we want our kids to be 'happy and fulfilled'? Is this the kind of story that centres them – and us – in an understanding of who we are in Jesus, and his calling on our lives?

Maybe Generation Y, along with their parents and grandparents, need to reimagine what true prosperity within the kingdom of God looks like, the nature of genuine fulfilment for those whose lives are shaped by the gospel of Christ.

Of course, our aspirations for our children and all those we love, reflected in our prayers for them, is not that they aren't special or can't be fulfilled. But they are most appropriately focused around who they and we are uniquely in Jesus and the redemption he brings. Surely that would be a life not centred on a wellbeing determined by economic wealth and opportunities for endless self expression, but a life measured and ordered around a satisfaction in knowing and living for Christ.

Bubbles white, gushing through the gates Water pushing golden autumn leaves to one side When up popped the Water Elf From the ripples swirling round As he takes a peep



NEWS FROM THE CANAL AND RIVER BANK

Duncan Faulkner and Steve Rawson UP TO MID-OCTOBER 2013 was a remarkably dry year. Every month the rainfall was on or below average, with the spring and early summer particularly dry. You can see from the graph that the wettest month was, surprisingly, July, when the three week heatwave was followed by a few days of downpours. The white rectangle for each month shows the historic range, with June's rainfall this year creating a new record minimum.



Total rainfall to the end of September at Bank Newton was 493mm, around 35% below average and less than half of what fell last year over the same period. The picture has been similarly dry across much of the Pennines, the east of England, Wales and northern Scotland. Water has been in short supply on the Leeds-Liverpool canal, with use of locks restricted over the summer. Now in late October it seems the dry period may be coming to an end...

EARLY EDUCATION IN GARGRAVE

THE EARLY PART OF THE NINETEENTH CENTURY saw the beginning of greater interest and provision of education for more people. Mrs Dinsdale states that there were, in addition to the Roman Catholic School in West Street, five proprietors of schools listed in a directory. However steps had already been taken to open a Church School, Matthew Wilson, Esq and John W Coulthurst Esq and others having donated the site of the Tithe Barn to be used as the site for a school. Although built slightly earlier, 1846, the log books of the school date only from 1864. The cost of the building was estimated at £620.

The number of pupils anticipated to attend is interesting - it being one hundred and sixty children, approximately eighty of either sex.

The school contained three classrooms, one each, for boys, girls and infants. There seems to have been an acknowledgement that provision for infants was essential because of the early age they were sent to work in the mills.

The first actual report of activities at the school was the decision of the then Headteacher to allow the older boys to visit Skipton to view a Diorama. In the log book this is explained as "a scenic representation consisting of a series of pictures which were viewed through an aperture by means of reflected and transmitted light." Perhaps this was the first educational visit!

Times change but some of the problems change little and the log books speak of boys being punished for various misdemeanours, among others, not learning lessons and breaking a window by throwing a stone on the way home. There is also reference to farming occupations causing irregular attendance, children being needed to help on the farm, and to mills being closed, thus reducing the average attendance of children.

Teaching in the school was mostly reading, writing, religious instruction and arithmetic. Many of the boys in Class 1 (the oldest) were in the Church choir and it is presumed that a fair amount of singing was also taught.

In 1871 the Roman Catholic School closed and a number of children were admitted to the Church School, it being the only school in the village which admitted children freely and only charged pence. We sometimes forget that early education was not free!

A SHORT HISTORY OF AIREBANK MILL

THIS MILL, APPROPRIATELY ON THE RIVER AIRE, was built in 1791 by Thomas Mason senior. He died in 1810 and his son, also Thomas, continued spinning cotton at this mill, or part of it, until about 1857. The mill buildings, spinning machinery and stock were insured for £2,000 in 1823 and for the same sum in 1831. Joseph Mason, a cousin, ran High Mill in Gargrave at the same time.

From the 1790s until well into the next century Gargrave was a mill village with three textile mills and an unknown number of people working as hand loom weavers in their own homes or out buildings. The big advantage the village had was the Leeds and Liverpool Canal. It was also between the growing Lancashire cotton towns and the West Yorkshire wool textile centres. With a good fall on the river Aire, which had been utilized by early corn mills, it was an ideal situation for the construction of the new cotton mills. Airebank Mill was unusual in that it continued to be used for textile production long after most mills in the Yorkshire Dales had stopped

In 1833 the mill was powered by a 20 horsepower wheel and employed 33 people. They, of course, worked the usual twelve hour day. At some point the mill was enlarged and part was taken by Joseph Smith for worsted spinning from about 1835 until 1842 when he was bankrupt. All his machinery was then for sale as well as all the furniture in his house as all a bankrupt's assets were sold.

References can be confusing as they rarely mention a specific mill in Gargrave. However, by 1845 it would appear that a 20hp steam engine had been added as well as a mechanic's shop, three cottages, outbuildings, a house and garden.

Thomas Mason continued spinning cotton at Airebank Mill until 1857, but Christopher Bracewell from Earby took part of the mill in 1847. Bracewell and his brothers also ran Waterloo Mill in Clitheroe and Victoria Mill in Earby. They continued as tenants here for many years as the mill was still owned by the Wilsons from Eshton Hall. Later the Bracewells ran two more mills in Barnoldswick, collieries in Ingleton as well as flour mills and quarries.

Two major fires in 1865 and 1874 destroyed large sections of the mill each time, but it was always rebuilt. Sir M A Wilson constructed a large mill on the site after the 1874 fire and this was occupied by Whittle & Brindle. In 1912 when there was another fire which destroyed most of the buildings together with their entire stock of cotton. Unfortunately they were not insured and the mill was not rebuilt.

Johnson & Johnson, a company specialising in medical supplies, had been weaving cloth in Earby, but took this site in 1932 and put up a new mill for the production of wound dressings in 1933. They also moved some of their operations from Slough. The site is now occupied by Systagenix Wound Management and is used for producing wound management systems as well as research and development.

Proposed Reductions to The Bus Service In Wharfedale Paul

Threshfield Parish Council

North Yorkshire County Council is looking to cut its funding for bus services by 25% from January 2014. It is currently undertaking a consultation in relation to proposed reductions to the bus service subsidy by £1.1m per year.

The proposals include the school services from Skipton, Embsay and Gargrave (987C) to Upper Wharfedale school being stopped.

The consultation papers include a questionnaire on the proposals, which we would encourage you to complete. This should be completed by 25th November, and can be found at the above address.

The discontinuation of the bus service to Upper Wharfedale School could lead to a reduction of the number of 'out of area' children attending the school. This would be detrimental to the long term future of the school, and also to other schools in the area.
