

DAVID'S DISPATCHES

Rev David Houlton

OUR 21ST CENTURY WORLD tends to focus us on our possessions, our achievements, and on ourselves, rather than on God and other people. But nothing lasts forever: our possessions are out of date in a few years; the prestige of our achievements fades fast; and we have a sell-by date too! Only God lives forever. So it's important to know Him and His presence with us now, and forever. The question is how?

My own story is of a typical Yorkshire lad, brought up to attend church but not really knowing God in my life. As a student in the 1970s, I overdid the partying so by the end of my first year at university I felt so lost that I cried out to God: "If you are there, help!" Somehow my student room suddenly seemed brighter, and I felt calm. I didn't know what to make of it, but a few months later I went away to work on a student placement. Shortly after arriving there I started going to church and after a few weeks someone asked if I'd like to go to an event where there were talks about Jesus and a "New Life For You". I really enjoyed it (what I could understand). But it was when I started reading the Bible and trying to pray that I found out that God was really there. It was as if the God I didn't know, but who had done something when I cried out for help, was now leading me to get to know Him.

Now, you and I are not the same and everyone's life is different. But God is the same, so we can learn from each other's experience of Him. One important way to get to know God better is to read the "Gospels" about Jesus in the Bible (the modern "GNB" or "NIV" translations are best for this). Jesus is like God would be if He became human, because Jesus was God as a man. So reading about Jesus helps us understand what God is like:- Jesus was kind and caring, welcoming everyone to come to Him - just as we are - but He also pointed out that we need to say sorry for the things we have done wrong, and that we need to change for the better. And of course, it was Jesus himself who had to pay the ultimate price so that we could be forgiven, be changed spiritually, and be with God forever.

Learning to pray is important too – especially how to listen for what God might be saying to us. And it's much easier to pray when you know what God is like. So is learning to express our thanks and praise to God. To some extent, prayer and thanks comes naturally to a lot of people – many more than those of us who go to church services. But learning about Jesus, learning to pray and thank God, and learning to live a good life, are what taking part in Church services at St Andrews are all about.



Our new bishop is our old bishop

From the Diocese of Bradford website

On 4 February Downing Street announced that the Rt Revd Nick Baines, the Bishop of Bradford, will be the first Church of England Bishop of Leeds for the new Diocese of West Yorkshire & the Dales.

The diocese, which comes into being on Easter Sunday (20 April), will replace the current dioceses of Bradford, Ripon & Leeds and Wakefield and will be the largest geographically in the country. It will be known formally as The Diocese of Leeds but will be referred to as the Diocese of West Yorkshire & the Dales.

Nick Baines has been Bishop of Bradford for three years, and before that was Bishop of Croydon (in the Diocese of Southwark). He read German and French at Bradford University and, before ordination, worked for four years as a Russian linguist at GCHQ.

Nick has a particular expertise and passion for communication and is known for his engagement with the media. He has 8,000 followers on Twitter and his blog – 'Musings of a restless bishop' – has attracted over 1.6 million hits. He's frequently asked to comment nationally on topical issues and is regularly heard on the Chris Evans Show on

Radio 2 (and recently on Thought for the Day on Radio 4). The extent of his writing includes comment pieces for broadsheet newspapers, popular books on Christian faith (he's written six) and contributions to academic journals.

He says "I'm passionate about Christian engagement in the big wide world – not on our own terms, but on the basis that we get stuck in wherever we can; committed to the world in all its pain and glory."

Families normally took responsibility for the own members if they could, but in the turmoil of the industrial revolution, the growth of cities and dreadful epidemics, social care became essential. Formerly, the tax levied for the purpose since Elizabethan times had been distributed by the Parish Councils to those in need and so our rating system began. The people inside workhouses endured harsh conditions; they had to work at monotonous tasks all day, and were provided with a meagre diet mainly gruel (watery porridge) with some vegetables and a little meat once a week. The main complaint was that families were split up. Husbands and wives were parted and children, who were separated from their mothers at an early age, were overseen by frail women who couldn't manage the standard work, so there was virtually no education or health care. With advances in medical understanding and knowledge of dietary and personal needs, there were improvements.

We were surprised to learn that the experiences in workhouses led ,eventually, to the establishment of the NHS. The last workhouse closed in 1930 and some of the buildings, which were often handsome enough on the outside, became hospitals. In Skipton, Raikeswood hospital, now a block of comfortable flats, is an example. After answering a number of questions Mr Higginbotham left us with the salutary awareness of our own good fortune in living in less straightened times. There is a report that a workhouse existed in Gargrave but Mr Higginbotham had no knowledge of it. If you do know where it was and any other details, please tell us and we will pass the information onto him.

Next we look forward to a crafty evening with Jean Maxwell and Kate Darley who will show us some of their own creations and explain how they have coped with difficulties in making them. As usual we will welcome visitors at the village hall annex on Wednesday. In March we will hear a talk about the very original pottery of Clarice Cliff.

EVACUATION TO GARGRAVE - PART 2

A SCHOOL BUS TOOK US to and from Ermysted's Grammar School in Skipton where we were joined by others from our school who were billeted in other villages. Apart from two ladies who worked part-time, our teachers were from Varndean. Lunches, which I usually enjoyed, were provided in a room near the present cinema, one of three that were then in Skipton, Mr Whiting, the master in charge at Gargrave, was a tall middle-aged man who lived with his wife in Skipton Road. He was known as Pommer, pommer being the name of a small whiting, and taught maths and geography. Sometimes we sang in the bus on the way home but not if, as hoped, we stopped to pick up the grammar school girls. As Pommer did not like us singing in the village, someone made up a finale to sing as we approached. It went to the tune of "For He's a jolly Good Fellow", replaced the title with "We're back to civilisation" and "And so say all of us" with "And so we've got to stop".

Mr Lye, (Coddy) was our headmaster but woodwork was the only subject I remember him teaching us. For School Certificate there was a practical test and a theory paper which he went through before we started, giving hints! For example there was a question on making a wooden top for an old fashioned copper wash boiler. While not actually giving us the answer he suggested that steel screws would rust! Jimmy Foster was a younger man who took us for PE, games and science. There was also a ponderous man, Mr Gasper, who took history. The two local teachers were Mrs Bland for English and Miss Phare for French, the only language available, which I then had to start from scratch. A gormless looking boy with a blank face, with the appropriate name of Moon, was rather a wag. When the French teacher told us to make fair copies of some work, he asked "Please Miss, how do you spell fair?"

An incident from a chemistry class:

Scene: Chemistry lab, the demonstration bench having a lot of complicated glassware on it, Geoff Moon sitting in the front row.

Moon, in a stage whisper: It looks as if there is plenty of room for a mistake this morning.

Jimmy Foster ignores the remark and goes ahead with the experiment which fulfils Moon's prediction.

Moon: It looks as though the mistake has arrived.

Master: That's probably what your mother said when you appeared on the scene.

Sometimes on a Monday morning we passed Moon driving cattle to the Skipton auction for the farmer, Mr Gifford, he was billeted with. He looked the part.

Probably it was through his foster father, the mill manager, that Philip had the chance of visiting a farm and working there during haytime. He asked me to go with him. So began my connection with the Taylforths and Priestholme Farm where clocks were always kept half an hour fast. When Philip found there was to be no pay he lost interest.

FARMING ON SCALEBER HILL

HAVING BEEN APPROACHED by a family out for a walk with a request to write an article about local farming, and having been born and lived all my life at Scaleber, I found it difficult to refuse.

As I live at Scaleber, born and reared, which is on Mosber Lane and the Pennine Way, I can claim to be a local.

My first recollections of farming were hand milking

and taking milk churns to the station with horse and float which was always a dash in the early morning. I remember horses and floats coming in all directions.

During my school days Gargrave was a farming village, with at least seven farms in the village having barns in which milk cows were housed for winter. In summer there was a procession of milk cows walking the streets to pasture and return for milking every day.

If you wander through the streets the barns are now houses. Many have retained the archways where horse and cart led the hay into the barn for winter fodder.

As I write it is January. What is happening on the farm? The cattle are inside on winter rations. As we calve there is always some new task awaiting. As regards the sheep, the grass has stopped growing, the sheep are more hungry and are needing extra feed as lambing time approaches. If you are to have a good year the ewes need to be strong.

All the rain does the sheep no good at all. We just put on our coats and wellies and keep smiling, and give the sheep a good supply of food (if you feed the mother, she feeds the lamb).

On the question of food we like to feed the wildlife, also, during winter, all the garden birds, not forgetting the five resident pheasants. But just hang on, Spring is coming.

HEDGEHOGS IN MARCH

Well it has been a funny old year for the hedgehogs. On the one hand the weather has been mild and has given many smaller hedgehogs a chance to fatten up and hibernate. On the other hand it has been very wet, this can mean that many hedgehogs will have used wet bedding to make their nests which is not ideal. In addition of course there has been lots of flooding and this may have had a dramatic effect on the hedgehogs living in or near those flooded areas.

If there are any mild spells at this time of year the male hedgehogs might be encouraged out of hibernation – the males seem to awake a little earlier than the females, although nothing is set in stone. If you are tempted into the garden in warmer weather do take care when tidying or moving piles of leaves etc. especially if you know there have been hedgehogs in the garden in 2013.

Hedgehogs coming out of hibernation will be very thirsty – having not had a chance to drink for several months, and they will also be hungry and in a poor condition. Give them a helping hand by putting out food and water for them. Keep ponds topped up too although many will be full anyway following the rain. If you are not sure whether there are hedgehogs visiting, rather than waste the food, you can put out dry biscuits for them (hedgehog or cat biscuits would be

fine), this can be left out for some time before it needs to be thrown away, rather than the wet foods that go off quickly.

If you have a hedgehog house you could place a small piece of screwed up paper in the entrance – this will be brushed aside as the hedgehog comes out of the box so you will know it is awake. Also if you know your box is empty you can use the paper to tell whether someone has started to use it.

If you are concerned about any hedgehog that you see contact the British Hedgehog Preservation Society on 01584 890801 (if you can weigh the hedgehog first that is always helpful). Out of hours you will be directed to other numbers but whatever the time, with patience, you should be able to speak to a real person. Happy Tenth Birthday Facebook

I can remember exactly where I was when I first heard about Facebook: "It's AMAZING", she said, "It's so addictive, but so useful – you just HAVE to get it!"

Back in those early days, Facebook modelled itself on the annual university yearbook – the original book of faces. Fast forward ten years and now one in every twelve people on the planet has a profile page. If Facebook were a country it would have the third highest population in the world. As a daily Facebook user, the site has become my address book, birthday book, photo album, email account (almost), a source of news, a forum for debate, a tool for organising, campaigning and rallying.

Whether or not we use Facebook personally, it remains a staggering cultural phenomenon that we cannot ignore. We must ask ourselves what it means to use this technology well – what it means to love God and love neighbour in this space. As an experiment, I thought it apt to throw the question open to Facebook, and so put up a post asking, 'What is the biggest discipleship challenge you face when using Facebook?' It was only minutes before the replies started coming in.

How do I comment constructively when someone posts something I disagree with? How do I stop myself falling into pride when people affirm me through their 'likes'? How do I help a fourteen-year-old girl create an attractive profile in which her sexuality is not the primary thing on display? How do I keep my identity fixed in God and trust in his plans for me when profile browsing makes it so easy to compare myself to others? How do I discipline my personal usage without feeling the need to publicly broadcast my pietism ('Dear all, I am going on a Facebook fast...')? How do I grow in confidence in speaking about God online as well as offline? How do I use Facebook to enhance face-to-face relationships rather than slip into using it as a poor substitute?

Ten years of Facebook have showcased humanity in its complexity – at times creative, joy-filled and humorous, and at other times dark, selfish and ugly. So as cultural commentators across the globe speculate over the future of Facebook, let's not be quick to dismiss this cultural giant. We may have had a decade of 'likes' and 'pokes', but we are still learning how to live well in this new space.
















GARGRAVE PARISH COUNCIL

Monthly meeting, Mon 3 February 2014

Apologies: The Clerk, Helen Carruthers, Cty. Cllr. Shelagh Marshall.

Public participation: Members of the public voiced complaints about the lack of sweeping of roads and paths throughout the village by Craven DC.

A parishioner asked for information about the availability of allotments and agreed to be added to the list of those interested.

A school PTA parent gave a brief presentation about the proposal to install an additional defibrillator accessible "24/7" in the village. There is one at the doctor's surgery and at the dentist's surgery but they are only available during working hours. The matter has been included in the agenda for the March meeting of the Parish Council. Members of the group of parents interested in developing parts of the village playground provided an update on their progress.

Public participation: The response of residents of Smithy Croft to the circular letter to them from the Parish Council has been sufficient for the PC to pass the replies to North Yorkshire CC which owns the area in question with a covering letter to ask for its ideas and comments.

SHLAA: It was reported that the Parish Council had sent a response to Craven DC before the deadline of 27 January. As a separate matter the Neighbourhood Planning Group's application to create a Village Plan has been accepted by Craven DC. The Group has been awarded grant funding to help with the potentially costly process so that the village secures, hopefully, more control of the shape of its development than would otherwise be the case. The next meeting of the Group is on Wednesday 26 February in the Village Hall.

Grass cutting contract: This year's contract has been amended slightly to include additional areas.

Dog waste: Dog waste and waste bags are being dumped around the village. NOTE – all public waste bins in the village, black or red, can be used to deposit dog waste, preferable in bags.

Next meeting: The meeting closed at 9-30 p.m. The next meeting will be on Monday 3 March at 7-15 pm in the Village Hall.
