

DAVID'S DISPATCHES

Rev David Houlton

WHEN THE SUN BEATS DOWN (let's hope it will!) it's easy to feel happy and optimistic. It's great to see the flowers blooming, the lambs and calves growing, the hills and trees in full leaf. The summer warmth means we can relax outdoors and it feels like the whole of nature is on our side. Even many of the difficult things in life seem easier to bear. It is like a sign that God loves us and that life is good.

One of the questions that people often ask is why, if God loves us, life sometimes seems so hard and unfair? Why do tragedies happen to us and those we love? Why are there horrible diseases and natural disasters?

Why doesn't God just stop the wars, oppression and unfair discrimination that people inflict on each other? There is no simple answer, as we saw last month, but we can know that God loves us, and here are three ways:

Firstly, when Jesus came into this world He too lived a normal life with its ups and downs, joys and sorrows. And He too suffered hostility, injustice and even the death penalty. He came to join us in this world where there is right and wrong, good and evil, choices and consequences.

God's answer to suffering was to come to be with us in it... and He still wants to be with us in our lives today, spiritually. Having God with us doesn't stop the problems but it does give life a spiritual, eternal dimension that puts even terrible tragedies into context.

Secondly, in our hearts we know that things shouldn't be like this - despite the fact that, as ancient human remains show, people have always fought and killed, died of horrible diseases and been killed by natural disasters. Despite that reality, we know deep in our hearts that something is wrong, that "things shouldn't be like this"! That is because we are not just natural physical beings, destined to die and return to the earth from which we came. We are spiritual beings too - we are "made in the image of God" - we are not just the product of purposeless chance.

Finally, it's natural, in this world, that our lives have phases of health and sickness, strength and weakness, youth and old age - just like it's natural that there is day and night, sun and rain, summer and winter.

When we can't see the sun at night, or when there are heavy clouds, or when it's winter, we just have to have faith in what we know to be true – that this will pass and we will feel the sun's its warmth again. The sun hasn't stopped shining!

The same goes for God's constant love for us.

WW News

In April we welcomed Melanie Fryer who told us about her special interest in Biodynamic Gardening. She is the local representative of a nationwide organisation which exists to promote this in the interest of protection of the environment and provision of sustainable food supplies.

The movement disapproves the use of artificial fertilisers and pesticides and works to preserve the fertility of the soil by conscientious composting of all organic waste for mulching. To supplement this our speaker advised the use of well-rotted farmyard manure and small amounts of finely ground rock containing essential minerals. The organisation is strongly opposed to the introduction of genetic modifications in any organisms and, beside caring for the soil, does everything possible to support natural processes such as pollination by insects, especially bees. Essentially their recommended methods are those traditionally practiced but, in addition, they have worked out a calendar for all annual activities in the garden, including dates for sowing, transplanting etc.,

adjusted for climate and species, following which, it is claimed, ensure the best possible results. It was a thought-provoking talk which was followed by a series of questions; with some determined resolutions to get out in the garden now the weather is picking up.

Our President went to a national meeting held in York to discuss WI matters, in particular how our annual resolutions are followed up. She also went to the Federation Spring Council with Judith Douglas who was acting as our Gargrave representative this year. The usual business was followed by a talk from Sue Hart MBE who spent ten years in Tanzania and set up a craft centre under the auspices of the Church Missionary Society. The idea was to provide women with work to support themselves and their families, It has been very successful and the Federation has agreed to help by collecting craft goods and any haberdashery, EXCEPT WOOL, to send to the centre.. Should you happen to have items to spare, please give them to any member of our local WI and they will send them on.

Next month our speaker will talk about legal matters on **Wednesday 14 May** at 7pm for 7.30pm in the village hall annex; as usual visitors will be welcome. In June we will be going on our annual outing; this year to see the M & S archive in Leeds.

ROGATION DAY - MAY 26

Parish Pump

ROGATION MEANS an asking of God - for blessing on the seed and land for the year ahead. It is appropriate in any emergency, war, plague, drought or foul weather.

The practice began with the Romans, who invoked the help of the gods Terminus and Ambarvalia. In those days a crowd moved in procession around the cornfields, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals, and driving away Winter with sticks. They wanted to rid the cornfields of evil.

About 465 the Western world was suffering from earthquake, storm and epidemic. So Mamertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the popular pagan custom, ordered that prayers should be said in the ruined or neglected fields on the days leading up to Ascension. With his decision, 'beating the bounds' became a Christian ceremonial.

Rogation-tide arrived in England early in the eighth century, and became a fixed and perennial asking for help of the Christian God. On Rogation-tide, a little party would set out to trace the boundaries of the parish. At the head marched the bishop or the priest, with a minor official bearing a Cross, and after them the people of the parish, with schoolboys and their master trailing along. Most of them held slender wands of willow.

At certain points along the route - at well-known landmarks like a bridge or stile or ancient tree, the Cross halted, the party gathered about the priest, and a litany or rogation is said, imploring God to send seasonable wealth, keep the corn and roots and boughs in good health, and bring them to an ample harvest. At one point beer and cheese would be waiting.

In the days when maps were neither common nor accurate, there was much to be said for 'beating the bounds' - still very common as late as the reign of Queen Victoria. Certainly parish boundaries rarely came into dispute, for everyone knew them. (Do you know yours today?)

FARMING ON SCALEBER HILL

DURING AND POST WAR many residents of Gargrave had lives which revolved or had connections with agriculture, some worked on farms. There were two corn mills, two saw mills, three butchers shops, three milk rounds, a blacksmith and a saddler to mention a few.

As most able bodied men were called into the forces there was a shortage of staff to produce desperately needed food. Thanks to Aldolf blockading the seas, cattle food also became very scarce. In this situation the government decided **all** farms must plough a percentage of their land: food for the public and for the cattle must be grown.

Craven is noted for growing grass, but not for growing crops, as we seldom have good weather at harvest. However, needs must, the only way cattle cold be fed was to grow potatoes, turnips, mangolds or kale.

At that time most was done by hand - due to the shortage of hands the Women's Land Army came into being. I know at least two of the valiant group who came to the rescue, still living in Gargrave: Lucy Taylforth and Doreen Lambert. They milked the cows, helped with haytime and all the chores of farming.

The War Agricultural Society was formed and a fleet of Standard Fordson tractors came into the area and was based at "New Brighton" in buildings where previously tennis rackets were made. These were a great help with ploughing and cultivating as ploughing with horses in the hills is slow and a hard work. Spare a thought or the girls driving the tractors on cold wet winter mornings (there were no heated cabs in those days).

On our farm, potatoes, turnips, mangolds, oats and kale were grown. As for the oats, a threshing machine was taken round the farms I turn, with every farmer helping his neighbour due to the lack of buildings. My father used the house sitting room as the oat room. My task as a lad was to shovel the oats to the back of the room and keep the window clear to allow the oats to be tipped in through

the window. During winter, the oats were bagged and taken to one of the corn mills to be ground or rolled.

Potatoes, turnips and mangolds were carted into pies!!! This meant they were carted and placed in piles to be covered with straw and then covered with soil to protect from frost and stored for winter.

As I write this on the first of April, the TV early news visited a poultry farm live. They introduced a new breed of hen which lays **square** eggs. They take less space when packing!!

The lambing is going very well and I'm listening for the cuckoo.

EVACUATION TO GARGRAVE - PART 4

THE GARGRAVE LIBRARY was open on Wednesday evenings when large wooden boxes were opened and the books put on display. The aptly named George Reeder asked me to help and paid me two shillings an evening for checking books in and out. To arrive on time I had to leave the farm before milking was finished. Periodically the books went back to the county and a new set was provided. Mr Reeder selected a few which he kept back and offered to certain ladies saying "There's a warm un".

A meeting about forming a youth club in the village was held in the Methodist Chapel. Although Pommer, who was there, saw me afterwards and advised me not to get too involved, I became the secretary of the committee. I was the only evacuee, or 'red cap' as we were called, to belong to the club. Miss Townson, a village schoolmistress, was in charge.

At the end of the summer term 1943 we returned to Brighton for there was no provision here for teaching beyond School Certificate. We had not missed seeing the preparations for D Day or experiencing the V1 flying bombs.

As to my experiences of Gargrave and the Dales – after retiring from working in Kent and London, we now live here.

We'd like to heartily thank Ray for providing us with his series of anecdotes from his evacuee days.

HEDGEHOGS IN MAY

IT'S HEDGEHOG AWARENESS WEEK this month (4 - 10th May) and the British Hedgehog Preservation Society is asking everyone make a promise to do one extra thing to help hedgehogs during the week. You could make a 5" square hole in a boundary fence to allow easy access for 'hogs, put out suitable food and water, display an information poster from BHPS, make a log pile, the list is endless and most tasks will only take a few minutes, so please do get involved. See www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk for more information.

It is difficult to know when the first litters of hoglets will be born. In most years it is late May to June that the first litters appear but this year the weather has been milder and the adults may have come out of hibernation that much earlier.

Do bear this is mind when gardening. Under a shed is an ideal place for a female hedgehog to make her nursery nest. However, every year we get calls about sheds being demolished and gardeners then find a nest with mother and hoglets under the flooring. If there has not been too much disturbance and the mother is still around she may well move her hoglets to a new nest. However if she does not return overnight then the hoglets may need to be rescued. If you do disturb a nest give the BHPS a call ASAP for more detailed advice on how the help the family stay together.

Any hoglets found out in the day will need to be rescued and remember they do not come in ones so search for other "orphans". Listen for a high pitched squeak, this is their distress call. Also watch out for both domestic and wild creatures that are interested in a certain spot in the garden, they may have spotted a potential meal in an abandoned hoglet.

If a pile of leaves appears overnight in the garden this may also be an indication of a new nest. Sometimes female hedgehogs move their nursery nest at the last moment and can be seen gathering nesting material and making a new nest. This can even be seen in the daytime. However the hedgehog will be moving with a purpose, and unlike most hedgehogs seen out in the day, will not need to be rescued. Watch the area and with luck around 4 weeks later the hoglets may be seen venturing out of the nest for the first time.

Try to make your garden safer for hedgehogs. See the BHPS's leaflet on "Gardening with Hedgehogs" which gives lots of ideas on helping your local hedgehogs stay safe. If in doubt about whether a hedgehog needs to be rescued give the BHPS a call, it is better safe than sorry and the sooner one is rescued the more chance it has of surviving.

If you are concerned about any hedgehog that you see contact the British Hedgehog Preservation Society on 01584 890801 (if you can weigh the hedgehog first that is always helpful). For more information about hedgehogs and how to help them visit the BHPS web site at www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk



EARLY EDUCATION: DISCIPLINE

ENTRIES IN THE LOG BOOKS of both Wesleyan and Church Schools in the 1880's highlight that discipline could be a concern. The Church School log books include an entry which points out that "This morning Rev M came into school and called out the choir-boys in order to make an investigation respecting a notice paper taken down in the Vestry and on finding out the offender, opened my desk to search for the cane and on finding it caned the boy five times on his hand." Later in the same month another entry states "Vicar returned and I informed him of the occurrence recorded and received from him a confirmation of my authority over the school."

The Wesleyan Head Master also was concerned to establish that any corporal punishment inflicted on his pupils should be given by him and no-one else. This entry states that he "had a complaint about Miss W... striking a child. Requested that no child should receive any corporal punishment whatever, especially children in the infant's room." In June 1885 he "Tried to do without 'stick' for a fortnight but could not say that it was a success, but perhaps that is owing to the staff, Miss C....not being as energetic as usual while Tom (his pupil teacher) as yet scarcely understands his duties."



He was Chairman of the Men's section of the Village Hall, introducing the speakers and thanking them afterwards - always trying to find something amusing or interesting to say - apart from helping make a "good" cup of tea!

He served on the Parish Council for a number of years and would always listen to people with worries.

Over the last twenty plus years he has been Verger at most Weddings and Funerals. For some forty years he took part in both the Nativity and Passion Plays in Church, being promoted to the dizzy height of Chief Shepherd and being one of the non-running disciples in the Passion Play.

Taking early retirement in his fifties he was able to do the things he most enjoyed - helping his friend re-build a boat in his back garden and fettling numerous mowers, Hoovers and other objects. He took great pride in returning "useless" articles in working order!

Acting Chairman Cllr. David Syms introduced Kathryn Ashby as our new Clerk

Police report: The report for March and April had been received by e-mail:






