

DAVID'S DISPATCHES

Rev David Houlton

IT TOOK JUST OVER A YEAR but now Heather and I are no longer the only ones living in the vicarage, and walking round the village, wearing dog collars. Sandy is a racing greyhound who was pensioned off after Easter.

The life of a racing dog is not that of a family pet! Sandy did not live in a family – canine or human. He was kept in kennels or cages and just let out to train, or to race.

His was the life of a professional. Racing greyhounds are trained to focus on racing... they don't get much affection, don't get to play with other dogs and, in the end, if a dog can't win it has to go! So, despite being a retiree, Sandy still needed to be house trained; he was highly strung – jumping at any sudden noise or sudden movement, and he stayed aloof from other dogs.

It's taken a while for him to be house trained, to feel relaxed around us and the many visitors to the vicarage, to start sniffing around on walks, to work out who to beg for biscuits on Low Green, and to want to play with the other dogs that run around together. But he is now well down the track to becoming a balanced, emotionally healthy dog who can relate well to humans and to other dogs.

In some ways Sandy's experience is an allegory for how life can treat us, and how we sometimes need help to get off the treadmills of life. The pressures of 21st century life can so easily keep us from living in the bigger reality that beckons to us from beyond "working hard and playing hard". Like Sandy, we need good healthy relationships with our own kind – humankind - and we need to learn how to relate to the Person who rules the place we live in – God.

I was in Chemical Engineering for 30 years, and learned a few things about the professional rat race: 1. in the end everyone gets beaten and, 2. when you are winning, it is a bit too easy to be a rat! But walking with God through life was a counterbalance to the dangers of the rat race. It also helped me when the time came to leave a successful career, return to college and study to become a vicar!

It has been quite an adventure, and never boring, following Jesus in my previous profession and now as vicar of Gargrave and Coniston Cold. But knowing God's presence and blessing on my home and in my professional life, and having good relationships with family and friends, has helped me live a happier, healthier life - and to know the purpose of my life. I can't recommend it more highly!

The **co-operative** - home to Community Defibrillator

The Co-operative Food store on the High Street in Gargrave has been fitted with a defibrillator for the local community to use in medical emergencies. The defibrillator is accessible 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. It is released to any member of the public through a code provided on a 999 call to the ambulance service.

Yorkshire Ambulance Service NHS Trust has installed the life-saving equipment at the front of the store, which it identified as the most central, and prominent, location in the village.

Gill White, Store Manager, said: "Our store operates in the heart of the local community so it's an ideal location for a defibrillator to be kept. The availability of a defibrillator can be the difference between life and death, so we hope



it's reassuring for people to know that this facility is now available in the centre of Gargrave. I feel that it is of paramount importance that local residents are aware of the defibrillator location and how it can assist with medical emergencies prior to an ambulance arriving in the village".

The defibrillator, which is one of 100 being fitted in rural locations across Yorkshire by the Ambulance Service, is a machine that gives the heart an electric shock in some cases of cardiac arrest. They can help save lives, as for every minute that passes without defibrillation, chances of survival decrease by 7 - 10 per cent.

Dave Jones, Community Defibrillation Officer at Yorkshire Ambulance Service, added: "Time is of the essence in many medical emergencies and the first few minutes are critical and, if effective treatment can be provided as early on as possible, then lives can be saved and disability reduced. Therefore, as part of our initiative to site defibrillators at rural locations across the county, the Co-operative Food store in Gargrave was the perfect place as it is in the centre of the local community."

Yorkshire Ambulance Service NHS Trust covers almost 6,000 square miles of varied terrain from isolated moors and dales to urban areas, coastline and inner cities and provides 24-hour emergency and healthcare services to a population of more than five million people. The organisation receives an average of 2,180 emergency and urgent calls per day and employs over 4,600 staff.

More than 270,000 people suffer a heart attack in the UK each year, about a third of whom die due to cardiac arrest before reaching hospital. A cardiac arrest most often occurs as a result of a heart attack, when the heart is starved of oxygen. Cardiac arrests cause the heart either to quiver, known as fibrillation, or stop beating altogether. Defibrillators work by delivering a controlled electric shock through the chest wall to the heart to restore a normal heartbeat after a cardiac arrest. The faster this treatment is delivered, the better the outcome for the patient.

What is the Home Library and Information Service?

Bringing the library service to you!

Would you like to have books delivered to your home?

North Yorkshire County Council's Home Library and Information Service provides a free home delivery service for people who, perhaps because of ill health or disability, find it difficult to get to the library or to carry books. The service is for people of all ages, and we offer access to books, large print, audio books, DVDs, CDs, children's books and information.

It's easy to join, just phone or email us, or contact your local library. We'll ask about your reading interests, and then choose books especially to suit you. You can also request your favourite books and authors - and it's all free!

Raleidh Volunteering in Tanzania

In the April edition of the Parish Magazine I told you about my forthcoming volunteering expedition to Tanzania with

Raleigh International. I returned from my 5 week expedition recently, and I thought that you might be interested to hear how I got on.

During my 5 week trip I gained a lot of knowledge, not just about myself but also about Tanzanian life and culture. I spent the majority of the trip on a project in Mangula with 14 other volunteers creating beehives which prevent elephants from entering the village. whilst also producing honey for the community. Although we had some problems initially we made huge progress. Raleigh's aim is to hand over the operation of the beehives to the local farmers within 3 to 5 years. We also spent time in the local schools where we taught the children about the beehive project, held sports days and delivered hygiene lessons.

In the final week I spent 6 days trekking in the Iringa region covering 10-15km a day using a GPS and compass to get to the next destination. In the first two days we stayed with two tribes, the Mangatti and Massai, which was a wonderful experience and something which I'll remember forever. The tribes were incredibly welcoming, and it was great to experience their culture which was something completely different to the way rural Tanzanians live.

There are so many things that I can take away from the experience of volunteering with Raleigh International, but I think that I am more confident and I've had the opportunity to further develop my leadership skills. Most of all I understand that you really don't need to have many possessions to be happy – the people of Tanzania have so little, yet they enjoy every day and are always smiling.

The fell races at Gargrave Show are going from strength to strength with competitor numbers increasing each year. There were 92 entries in the Senior section and 160 in total when all the Junior numbers were added together. The race features one of the best multi terrain courses in the North of England and is suited to runners of all abilities.

Richard Mellor, a veteran runner, had travelled from High Peak in Derbyshire especially for the race and 57-year-old Brian Davey, a member of the Southport Waterloo running club, had made the journey from his North West coastal town. Emma Craig had made a long trip from North of the Border and the Commonwealth games City of Glasgow. She joined her brother Jimmy Craig, who lives more locally at Hellifield, on the start line.

Twenty four year old Jimmy is a member of Barlick fell runners, is enjoying an excellent season and he dominated the race from start to finish - his diminutive frame seemingly carrying an exceptional lung capacity! Jimmy was awarded the Silentnight trophy for his endeavours, which has been held in the past by the fell running legends of yesteryear: Reeves, Sedgewick, Stuart and Hawkins to name just a few.

Second place went to 22-year-old Duncan Birtwhistle of Bishop Monkton, a member of the University of Bristol Orienteering club and a former member of the British Junior world Orienteering team. Third position went to Julian Hood a Barlick fell runner who lives in Skipton.

First home for the ladies was a former English junior fell running champion, Wharfedale Harrier Emma Hopkinson, who was in overall seventeenth position. First local was William Beckwith of Gargrave in a very impressive ninth position overall.

The Junior section even had competitors from Colorado in the USA, so Gargrave show fell race can now officially say it attracts runners from all over the World!

Horwich RMI Harriers had included the Gargrave show fell races in their Junior fell running championship points race calendar. The Bolton based club was established back in 1924 by a group of enthusiastic workers from Horwich Railway Mechanic Institute. Seemingly, the clubs links with the railway were so strong that the club's running colours were taken from the red of the engine and the black of the wheel trims, hence the black and red running vests of today. Many of the Junior runners from Horwich also had their parents running in the Senior race, which seemed to be a strong feature throughout the event. Pleasing to know that the races have a strong family ethic.

Brother and sister, Will and Katie Atkinson of Gargrave, are both members of Keighley and Craven Athletics Club and they both won trophies in the local race section. Katie is a pupil at Skipton Girls' High school and is a North Yorkshire Cross Country running champion; she has also tasted success in the 800 metre event at the Yorkshire track and field championships. Katie was the first girl in the under fourteens race but nearby neighbour 10-year-old Charlotte Barrett was first girl in the under twelves race, therefore the Weatherill trophy for the highest placed local female was presented to both girls. Charlotte is a member of the Wharfedale Harriers and is currently enjoying a successful season on the BOFRA fell running circuit. She can look forward to taking part in school athletics competitions now that she has moved to secondary school.

Kate's brother Will is beginning to put increased pressure on his fellow competitors, and he was second in the under twelves race so he was awarded the Donald McKell trophy for the highest placed local male from any age group.

Members of the local running clubs took top honours in most of the Junior sections (Keighley & Craven, Wharfedale Harriers and Barlick Fell runners).

Well done to all the Gargrave residents who took part, from children in the under nines age group through to the adults in the Senior race.

We had an interesting and amusing talk from a former Health Inspector who was able to give us some idea of the work he had done most of his life. He was always anxious to help people to understand the regulations rather than to work towards a prosecution. This approach did not please some of his colleagues but he felt it was the fairest way to go, even though he sometimes found himself in embarrassing situations, often arising from misunderstandings or ignorance rather than wilful folly. Since his retirement he has spent his time writing and giving talks about his experiences.

We were also lucky to have a very informative & unusual talk in August about the cheeses, now on sale locally in "The Courtyard Dairy". Our speaker was Andy Swinscoe whose shop is in this complex on the road to Settle. He assured us that the place was dark, cold and damp, the ideal conditions for keeping cheese, but patrons are offered a cup of hot coffee while they decide what to choose. All his cheeses are made by farmers who have herds of modest size and cannot hope to supply the quantities needed by supermarkets. They use time-honoured recipes with their own unpasteurised milk, and mature the cheese in cellars in the traditional way. As a result the products have delicious and highly distinctive flavours and are now increasingly sought by buyers for high-class restaurants.

Andy told us about the history of cheese, and his own career both here and in France. He was obviously enthusiastic and delighted to be able to make a living selling a product which is so much better than the ordinary mass-produced stuff, and to help the local economy as well as keeping traditions alive. He had brought three different cheeses for us to taste and a selection for sale.

After this we were in the mood to discuss the arrangements for our display at Gargrave Show. This year we had a number of entries from the Group Show which attracted notice and stewards were kept busy answering questions.

We always hope to gain some new members and anyone is welcome to come as a visitor to our meetings on the second Wednesday in each month at 7.30 pm in the village hall annex. In October we have a social evening after the Annual Meeting at which we must elect a new President and other officers; in November the talk is about North American beadwork.

THE AUTUMN JUVENILE SEASON is upon us. There is only one thing on every hedgehog's mind and that is to eat, eat, eat and get fatter and fatter and fatter. Thin underweight hedgehogs will not be able to survive hibernation so often they do not try to hibernate. However as their natural food supply disappears, as it will as the weather gets colder, they will slowly starve to death.

Hedgehogs seen "hibernating" in the open (or even just in plain sight)

will most likely be dying of hypothermia. Hedgehogs that are not in a ball, e.g. lying on one side will not be hibernating and again they are likely to be hypothermic (cold).

Small hedgehogs seen out in the day and mobile usually need help too. Those that are hyper-active and rushing about can actually be in greater peril than those that move about at a steady pace looking for food. Look at the BHPS's leaflet on Autumn Juveniles as this gives you far more information about these juveniles than I can give in a short article. Check out www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk.

Providing food can attract both those that are desperately searching for food as well as your regular visitors. Regular visitors are less likely to need rescuing as whilst they need feeding up they are less stressed because they know of a regular supply of food and will doubtless have a nest near to that food source.

Regular visitors to your garden can be monitored more easily. Mark them with some coloured nail varnish or quick drying emulsion paint (not red or it can be mistaken for blood and the hedgehog 'rescued' unnecessarily). Just mark a few prickles towards their back end and do not get it on their skin. If the smaller ones can be weighed regularly, you can monitor their weight gains, and those with a steady weight can usually be left in the wild. Those not putting on much weight, or worse still, losing weight, even when adequate food is provided will need extra care. Even if you cannot weigh them you should be able to tell whether they are thin (pinched in at the back end) or thriving (nicely rounded at the back end). The thin ones and the hyperactive ones need to be rescued. The sooner you can establish that they need help the sooner they can rescued and the greater their chances of survival. However, if in doubt, it is better to rescue than to leave them.

If you are concerned about any hedgehog, or you see one out in the day, contact the British Hedgehog Preservation Society on 01584 890801 (if you can weigh the hedgehog first that is always helpful, but do use gloves when you handle them). GOING GREEN IN GARGRAVE

AUTUMN IS MY FAVOURITE SEASON. The mists enveloped Gargrave even before August was out this year and our pear and plum trees nearly collapsed under the load of their mellow fruitfulness. Even the darker nights for me evoke the possibility of new beginnings. However, as the sun's rays weaken we need to turn to other sources of light and heat.

In 2012, I wrote a Going Green article on energy use and the quest for more renewable sources. Now, two years on, the proposal for wind turbines at Brightenber Hill has been finally turned down – again. So are there any non-windy prospects for local clean energy, or will we need to keep relying on other parts of the country – or the world – to keep our lights on and our houses warm? I can think of three main possibilities: solar power, hydro electricity and generation of both electricity and heat from biomass.

Solar power

Ultimately much of our energy is derived from the sun, which was shining even back in Carboniferous times to grow all the plants and marine life that now provide most of our power in the form of coal, oil and gas. Gargrave isn't the sunniest part of the country, but solar power is still a viable option. It can be used either to heat water or to generate electricity, via photovoltaic (PV) panels. We installed PV panels three years ago and they have provided an average of 6 kWh per day, more than our long-term average electricity consumption – although of course nothing at all during those long winter evenings.

If it were not for Feed-in Tariff payments from the government, solar PV would be a relatively expensive renewable energy source. There are much cheaper ways of reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Large-scale solar generation is more likely to be worthwhile in sunnier areas of the world, and anyone who has been to the south of England recently may have seen fields full of solar panels.

Hydro-electric

Falling-water powered mills in Gargrave and Bell Busk for centuries, as we have seen in George Ingle's series of articles in this magazine. I'm not aware of any water power being used now locally, although there are examples of hydroelectric schemes at Settle and Linton Falls. These are fairly small sources of electricity: Settle Hydro was expected to provide enough electricity for around 50 houses and Linton Falls for around 90.

We still have weirs across the river in Gargrave, and former mill races like the Damside. A realistic expectation for the Aire through Gargrave might be for an average power output of 3-4kW, i.e. similar to the demand from one kettle permanently switched on.

So local hydro-power has some potential but it would only ever be a small proportion of our energy needs.

Biomass

Wood is the original biofuel. Unlike fossil fuels, it can be renewed a rate

similar to that at which it is burnt. Plenty of households around Gargrave use wood to provide some heating in stoves or open fires.

Other biofuels include crops and farm or food waste that can be converted to heat and electricity using an anaerobic digester. Local proposals for farm digester projects have not got off the ground. A drawback of any biomass power scheme is that it can compete with land used for growing crops. Where else will our food come from? If this results in more of our food being grown overseas on land cleared from rainforests then the net result is likely to be far more release of greenhouse gases.

In the words of the physicist David MacKay⁽¹⁾, "biofuels made from plants...can deliver so little power, I think they are barely worth talking about".

So what's the answer?

This doesn't sound very encouraging. Solar is effective but pricey – even if it's the government who pays. Local hydro is possible but tiny. Large-scale biomass use could unintentionally increase global warming. And wind... best not to mention it! "People love renewable energy, unless it is bigger than a figleaf". (2)

There are some actions we can take. One is to switch to an electricity company that buys only from renewable sources. Another is to reduce consumption through more efficient energy use, insulation or changes in lifestyle.

Gus Speth, a US academic and policy advisor, said recently⁽³⁾: "I used to think that the top global environmental problems were biodiversity loss, ecosystem collapse and climate change. I thought that with thirty years of good science we could address those problems, but I was wrong. The top environmental problems are selfishness, greed and apathy – and to deal with these we need a spiritual and cultural transformation and we scientists don't know how to do that".

A brave statement from a scientist, I thought. Perhaps the first step we need to take is to find a source of hope.

"Blessed are those whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the Lord their God.

He is the Maker of heaven and earth, the sea, and everything in them—
he remains faithful forever."

Tea, cake and the inevitable

A FEW WEEKENDS AGO I was sitting in a marquee talking to strangers. There was no small talk: we got straight down to business. Around a table, with people of all ages, we were discussing everyone's favourite taboo subject: death.

We were at a Death Café at the Greenbelt Festival, run by the Moot Community. At a Death Café you get to talk death. With tea. And cake. The noise of animated conversations, and the amount of laughter, was surprising. It was something of a miracle. British people – talking about death!

Death Cafés are a growing phenomenon. As I write, 1,077 Death Cafés have been held around the world, from London to Tokyo. A Death Café can be run in a real café, or in a temporary venue, like a festival or a church hall. Anyone can set one up; there are guidelines available to follow. A Death Café isn't a counselling or a grief support session, nor is it for profit. It has no agenda but giving people the chance to talk about death.

Only one in 10 people in the UK have talked about their own death with someone else, according to the campaigning organisation Dying Matters. Death has been medicalised in our society, which has relieved much suffering. But around 60% of people in the UK die in hospital: death has been largely removed from our homes and communities. A hundred years ago, this wasn't the case, and death was seen as much more a part of life.

No wonder it's hard to talk about. If we're honest, contemplating the inevitable is not very pleasant. But not talking about it can make dying more difficult for everyone involved.

Are Christians any better at talking about death? I think we're good at talking about hope and resurrection, but perhaps not so good on the process of dying, or grief. Once, a dear friend of mine died. Because she was a Christian, someone said, 'There'll be a party for her in heaven!' with a beaming smile. 'Sure. But I'll miss her too', was my response. We 'rejoice with those who rejoice', but also 'mourn with those who mourn' (Romans 12:15).

I enjoyed the Death Café. I left the tent feeling a lot lighter, somehow, a lot more alive. A lot more grateful. And wondering how my life – and death – would look if I really took the hope of resurrection seriously.

Monthly meeting, I September

YOUR PARISH COUNCIL hopes that you have had a pleasant summer in the sunshine.

The Parish Council has a new member in its ranks, Mr. Alan Robinson, who is also a member of the village Heritage Group who organised the outstanding event on 4 August to mark the centenary of the start of World War 1.

The Parish Council also thanks the village for its response to the questionnaire regarding land and housing development. We received almost 200 replies.

During the summer, NYCC has informed us that in 2015 they will cease to cut any grass which does not pose a possible road accident site if left untrimmed. For Gargrave this means that the verges along the A65 and on Marton Road, Eshton Road, Swire Croft and Smithy Croft will no longer be cut.

We have residents who would like to form a group to look after the public horticultural aspects of Gargrave, such as the raised beds along Hellifield Road, the seating area outside the Co-op and the area around the War Memorial. They might convert the areas no longer to be mown by NYCC into wild flower areas, but they would welcome other ideas. If anyone is interested in participating please contact Martin Harrison on 748870 or Lesley Woodhouse on 749421.

Due partly to the fine weather the goit on High Green has filled with reeds and other water plants. It was agreed to look at clearing out a channel along its length to help the flow of water. It was also agreed to erect signs at each end to warn passers-by of the potentially deep mud in the goit.

The village street lighting engineer attended the meeting and gave an update about the use of LED bulbs for the church floodlights, repairs to the swan necked lamp on Church Street, and possible age-related replacements of street lamps in various locations. He also reported on the co-operative venture between the Village Hall and the Parish Council to put new lights outside the entrance to the Village Hall.

In correspondence, the Clerk was able to report that a cheque for £50 had been received from the Merseyside & West Cheshire Area Ramblers "who have recently visited Gargrave and made use of the WCs there". She has thanked them on our behalf. These donations and the coins (and sometimes notes) in the collection boxes in the toilets certainly help to fund the upkeep of the toilets (always remembering to wash hands after counting the pennies!)

The next meetings is at 7.15pm on Monday 6 October at the Village Hall. Before then, we may have seen you at the Village Event on Saturday 20 September regarding the Neighbourhood Plan for Gargrave.
