DAVID'S DISPATCHES

IT'S A BIT OF A COME-DOWN when Christmas is over isn't it? All the excitement of Christmas, carol singing, presents and parties is replaced by the prospect of the deep winter and an uncertain year ahead. What will happen to us and our world in 2016?

As we go through life we eventually learn that there are no guarantees in this world. There is always much to be thankful for (though the temptation is to take those things for granted) and there are always things that go wrong – which we have to cope with if we don't want to let them spoil life for us. That's the reality of living in a world like ours.. neither our world, nor ourselves, are "as we should be" all the time.

What's more, God doesn't solve all our problems for us. He doesn't make our world perfect, and He doesn't make us perfect, in this life. As we remembered at Christmas, even when Jesus came in to the world, things were bad: his country was oppressed by the Roman Empire; secular and religious leaders were more interested in power than truth; and the ordinary people were at best fickle. Even for Jesus, who was always loving, caring and good, this world wasn't always a nice place to be ... and people weren't always caring and aood to Him.

So what did Jesus do, and what can we do? How does it help having God in our life if He doesn't solve all our problems? Well, Jesus was able to go through even terrible difficulties positively because He knew God's love with Him and that God wins in the end.

And it's the same for us: as we grow as people, and grow spiritually,

we can learn to see the difficulties of our life more from God's perspective, and learn to go through them together with Him.

Langcliffe Singers' Christmas Concert - Review

Singers, instrumentalists and audience battled through rain, wind and floods to reach St Andrew's, Gargrave, on December 5th, for an evening of English Christmas music, with a German cello solo to add some spice.

Although some of the Langcliffe Singers and the pupils from Skipton Music Centre were unable to make the journey, the audience were transfixed from the haunting opening notes of Owain Smith's cello solo in Vaughan William's Fantasia on Christmas Carols. Richard Williams introduced each carol with a rich mellow baritone solo, before the choir responded with a lively elaboration, accompanied by Paul Fisher on piano.

Owain starred in the next piece too, Kol Nidrei by Max Bruch. The applause that erupted, after this young cellist's final note faded into silence, seemed like it would never stop. Following this, the five girls from Skipton Music Centre sang confidently a lively carol, Tell out the news by Jan Holdstock.

After a couple of more conventional Christmas pieces, the second half consisted of a Christmas cantata by Vaughan Williams, Hodie (Today). The performance of this challenging work was an impressive blend of talent: amateur and professional, young and old. The Langcliffe Singers were centre stage, with the girls from the Music Centre in the choir stalls interspersing segments of narration from the Gospel stories. These five young singers navigated the tricky melody with its awkward intervals skilfully, with only occasional difficulty. Personally I found it was this melody that continued to play on in my head for several days afterwards. Three soloists from the Royal Northern College of Music provided operatic solos, one highlight being when all three soloists gently took the audience through the opening sentences of John's gospel, dramatically concluded by the full choir's fortissimo "Emmanuel". Paul Fisher handled the marathon piano accompaniment with the skill and sensitivity that audiences have come to expect from this talented local musician and composer.

All the performers are to be congratulated for a memorable evening of music. Perhaps for a future concert in similar weather conditions they could consider Benjamin Britten's opera, Noye's Fludde?

TREAD LIGHTLY UPON THE EARTH

IN OCTOBER, the water levels at the local reservoirs looked remarkably low. When I walked around Grimwith the water's edge was often out of sight owing to the lack of water but also due to the low cloud that swathed the moor. Instead of that glorious, black, peat stained water, the red mud and rock of the reservoir bed were revealed, a Martian landscape eerily silenced by the cloud. I took the dogs down to the water's edge to swim but by the time we had returned to the track they were clarted up with sticky sludge and my boots were mud shod.

Then November came. I recall at primary school being tasked to draw a calendar with drawings of each month's typical weather – November was easy; wet and windy. And it certainly lived up to its reputation this year with several lengthy deluges, so much so that beyond the tarmacked stretch of Mark House Lane a torrent of water turned the path into a stream. And the moors that had previously been dry and easy to walk across turned into giant saturated sponges sucking each footfall down into the mossy peat. The moorland grass had become bleached by the wind and the rain, and the rabbits had taken a battering, their sodden remains still piquing the interest of the dogs despite all life force having been wrung out of them.

And all this you can experience when you venture out in poor weather, seeing the drama in the ebb and flow of the elements and the battles won and lost by the plants, trees and animals. After all, for us humans '*there's no such thing as bad weather, only unsuitable clothing*'.

FARMING ON SCALEBER HILL

John Hall

NOVEMBER AND EARLY DECEMBER were very wet, with our cattle all inside and not a lot to report on. The sheep are settled in their groups, with grass still available at the moment. Hand feeding not necessary at present – a quiet period as regards the sheep.

As I am often asked about the history of Scaleber, it may be an opportunity to reflect on the past. As I understand, Scaleber was originally an "out barn", a "shippon" (cow barn) for twelve cows. It had a central "fudden" (passage) with six cows each side and "baulks" over for hay storage, along with a barn door for horse and cart and a "hay moo" on the side.

Following this, the farmhouse was built onto the barn around 1700. I use my words carefully as regards *building on*. They didn't remove the slates of the barn, but built *on* to the slates. To this day the slates remain in the house wall. At some stage later, a lean-to building was added, comprising a double horse stable and a seven cow shippon.

A yard was built around the shippon, where a water spring was made into a water trough, to water the cattle. They were let out to drink twice a day. I have never known this spring run dry, even in the drought of 1979. Neither have I known it ever freeze in 1947 or 1963, The spring water is still there and clear as crystal.

The house had no running water and was watered by a well under the cellar, serviced by a hand pump. The only heating was by means of a fire range with an oven and boiler. The pump was used to fill a bucket to fill the boiler.

My parents came to Scaleber in 1930 from Roeburndale above Hornby, Lancashire. The cattle, horses and sheep came by train from Hornby to Gargrave Station. Machinery consisted of a float, cart with shelvings for hay leading, a mowing machine, two horses, 12 cows, 200 sheep and 3 trios of breeding geese.

Life was very tough in my youth as farming in the 1930s was in the doldrums. The house had no electricity or running water, flag floors with

pegged rug in the front of the fire. My mother was an expert butter maker. This proved to be the main income at this time.

Light was by a paraffin lamp or candle. The farm was more or less self-sufficient with vegetables, and two pigs for our own use provided bacon and lard for baking. Tuesday was always baking day I can still see 12 loaves set out to rise on the fender for baking. The treat was often an apple pie for tea.

Shopping was once a month by horse and float. On the list would be: a sack of flour, oat meal, and a block of salt. Salt of course was used to preserve meat and bacon as hens those days did not lay during the winter. When eggs were plentiful in summer "water glass" was used to preserve in large tubs. How many readers remember them?

Farming during the 1930s was a physically hard and frugal living. However changes were on the way: thoughts of a milk marketing board- a story of its own for another day.

(Water glass: a solution of sodium or potassium silicate.

It solidifies on exposure to air and is used to make silica gel and for preserving eggs and hardening artificial stone.)

Also 40 years ago:- on 21st Jan 1976 that the supersonic airliner Concorde went into commercial service in Britain and France.

Also 30 years ago:- on 28th Jan 1986 that the Space Shuttle Challenger disaster took place. The Challenger exploded shortly after lift-off from Cape Canaveral, killing all 7 astronauts.
