

DAVID'S DISPATCHES

Rev David Houlton

BREXIT! Just two weeks before we were all celebrating the Queen's 90th birthday and thinking about her faithfulness, her sense of duty and service, and her long, stable reign. And then came the Brexit vote..

Whether we voted to leave or to remain, few of us expected the political fallout: David Cameron resigned; Theresa May was catapulted into Number 10; George Osborne was sacked; a Brexit cabinet was assembled; and Jeremy Corbyn was fighting a "palace coup". And all sorts of worries arose: What about economy? What about house prices? What about our children's future? Will the EU punish us?!

It's in these sorts of circumstances, or more personal shocks like losing your job, moving home, and especially losing a loved one, that we find out how strong our faith is. When the normal and familiar, if not ideal, has been kicked way. When we have to face an uncertain future. That's when we meet a reality beyond the normal day-to-day life; a reality that can go unnoticed because of the busyness of normal life.

That's what I discovered when I went abroad for a work placement at the age of nineteen. As someone who had been raised as a churchgoer but hadn't paid much attention to God in my teenage years, it was quite a shock. Five months away from everything familiar, everything I had relied on. And it was an even bigger shock (a good one) when I finally got round to reading the Bible and praying, and discovered that God really is there. And that discovery changed everything, as I learned to put my faith in God rather than my circumstances: through thick and thin; in my 30 years in the Chemical Engineering industry; in the UK and abroad; single and married; and even as a vicar. Day-to-day life took on another enriching dimension. And difficult circumstances became an opportunity to put my trust in God and see what He would do!

I guess most of us will remember learning the story Jesus taught about the wise man who built his house upon the rock. He used it to teach us what, or rather who, to put our faith in: *to build our house on the rock, not the sand.* We need to learn to *not* put our faith in the sand, our changing circumstances, but to put our faith in the Rock, God, who is above and beyond our circumstances.

Whatever our circumstances, personally and as a nation, let's us put our faith in the God who doesn't change. Life's challenges won't go away but, because God is behind them, we can embrace them rather than fear them.



Delayed Talk - A tale of Two Manors - 9 Sept

Don Slaven Heritage Group talk "Gargrave Divided – A tale of Two Manors", will be on Friday September 9th at 7.30pm, St Andrew's Church, see advert and below.

"Five hundred and sixty four years ago to the day, on 9 September 1452, Laurence Catterall of Little Mitton was attending a church service in St. Andrew's, Gargrave, when he was suddenly seized, roughly dragged out of church and imprisoned by Sir Richard Percy.

Laurence Catterall was Neville retainer and supported the Yorkists, the Percy family members were Lancastrians; on opposing sides in the bloody thirty year civil war that became known as the Wars of the Roses.

On 9 September 2016, Gillian Waters will explore the local tensions between Percy and Neville supporters that led to the outbreak of war in 1455 and the impact of those wars on the two manors of Gargrave."

Hello everyone. It's been a busy time lately and many of us in the group have been snowed under with work, and school stuff as it's that time where some of our children are going up to primary school this September. Exciting but daunting times, as many of you will well know. And in amongst this we are still working hard with the playground project.

A few months back, we presented to the Parish council the playground plans with the drainage addressed as part of the project. Thanks to Stephanie Wheelhouse, who chairs the CVS and now also works for SCAD, and presented brilliantly the importance of playgrounds and how it can benefit our community in so many different ways. It was a very positive evening, and thank you to everyone who came (on count there was 24 of us from the village).

Following this the Parish Council have thought carefully and are now fully supporting the plans, and our fund raising for it. It's taken time as the Parish Council are legally responsible for the up keep and safety of the grounds, and careful consideration has to be made in regards to keeping the project achievable, realistic, and ensure that the maintenance following installation is easily manageable. Mainly by ensuring that the Parish Council have the funds available annually for up keep and other future projects to help the playground be the best it can be. We have made a promise that all ideas and decisions are put to the parish Council first and to work as a team.

At this point it's still a slow process, and we have a few meetings coming up with the group and members of the CVS to look at any new funding opportunities. We also have the promise from the Co-op that if we need anyone to help with "hard graft" then we can always call on the team there.

The planting in the playground is on hold, and we need to mark all the plants donated that we want to move in the autumn ready for the ground works. Gargrave Heritage Group

Would anybody be interested in joining our group? Our aims are to investigate and share our knowledge about the heritage of the village, its churches and its people, but we also work towards improving the facilities and fabric of St Andrew's. We are currently running a series of illustrated talks about Gargrave and its place in history and also events about the involvement of our lads who fought in the First World War. Other projects that are nearing completion are the on-line searchable database of the graveyard and the cleaning and reinstating of the historic Bishops' chairs into the church. At the moment, we are looking into sources of funding to buy lights that could be used in church for events, exhibitions and the Nativity and Passion plays.

In the longer term, we are compiling information about the Gargrave lads who served in WW1 with the aim of producing a booklet in 2018. We know a fair amount about those who died in the conflict, but less about the survivors. If anyone has any photos or stories that they could share with us, we'd be interested to hear about them. There may be soldiers who should be added to the war memorial – this is another matter that we're investigating.

Eventually, we would like to collect together the old stone cross fragments and other artefacts from the older church buildings and display them properly,

with information boards, in a similar way to what has been done at Burnsall church. We answer quite a few queries on our website for people who are tracing their Gargrave ancestors, so another aim is to have a heritage research centre and meeting room at church. Many people actually visit Gargrave in search of their roots.

Some of our members, who have the relevant expertise, are assisting the PCC in identifying repairs to the tower, roof and windows and are putting together a bid to obtain Heritage Lottery funding.

Currently, we meet in church at 10am on Tuesday mornings, but would consider moving to a different time to suit more people. If you are interested in joining us, please contact Sue on 749636 or have a word with Norma.

KIRK SINK VILLA

In a series of fascinating articles in previous editions of the Magazine, Kevin Jackson outlined the history of ancient Gargrave. Naturally he made mention of Kirk Sink Roman Villa which lies on private land to the south side of the river and which is perhaps the village's most noteworthy archaeological feature. So much so that it is Scheduled under the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979 as being of national importance. The Villa is not just one building but consists of a complex of dwellings and agricultural buildings ranging from the late Iron or early Roman Age, to the Third Century AD. It is more than likely that the site was occupied over the whole of that period, not by Romans, but by native Britons who became Romanised as the years went by.

Over the period of its occupation Kirk Sink developed many of the features of a typical Roman Villa. Its later development had stone built buildings with corridors and separate rooms for the various functions of the household. Its roof was tiled in the Roman manner and it is suggested that a large square block with a covered way leading to it from the nearest dwelling was an office dedicated to administration of the estate. Sufficient fragments of tessellated paving have been found to lead to the conclusion that there was chequered mosaic work on the floor.

In one respect, however, Kirk Sink differs from the majority of Roman Villas in Britain in that it is built in an area where such structures are few and far between. Gargrave lay within the realm of the Brigante tribe which had an uneasy relationship with the Romans and it is tempting to wonder how that was reflected in the relationship between the owners of the Villa and the local residents. Was it strained enough for the Villa to be fortified? Apart from the two rows of ditches surrounding it there is as yet no evidence to show that it was. However Mr Harry Gill in his highly informative work on "The History of Gargrave" points out that a field adjacent to the site is known as Cardales, a translation of which is "the cultivated strips or plots attached to the fort". As the field shows evidence of having been divided into rectangular cultivation plots the existence of some form of fortified structure is a possibility.

Excavations have been sporadic over time, the latest being carried out by a team led by Brian Hartley of the University of Leeds over various periods between 1968 to 1975. Each of Mr Hartley's "digs" were subject to a very tight time constraint, which, in one respect, seems entirely fitting. The Romans, or Roman Britons, who settled here must have been fully aware of the importance of agriculture and would have been sympathetic with restrictions limiting disruptive work on the site to just over one month after the economically essential hay crop had been gathered in.

The full extent of the site of the Villa is now established thanks to a drought in 1933 which enabled the Recorder of the Craven Museum, Mr Gill and my late uncle, Mr J.H. Weatherill, to detect the foundations of long forgotten buildings from the pattern of irregular growth of surface vegetation. It is not yet clear, however, how much land was farmed with the buildings, nor what crops were produced. The land round the site is very fertile, as evidenced by the large quantities of grain from this area supplied to Sawley Abbey during the Middle Ages, so arable farming is almost certain. However, as well as arable farming, large quantities of pig bones have been found suggesting that animal husbandry was included. The markets for the Villa's produce were probably the nearby forts of Ilkley, Long Preston and Elslack.

It remains to be determined why the site ceased to be occupied after the fourth century. No evidence of later occupation has been found, either by the Romans or the Saxons and Normans who succeeded them. Why was such a substantial site so fully vacated with no sign of even squatters taking up residence? The story of the Villa's demise remains to be explored as also does the history of its siting and development, although in the absence of written records answers might be difficult to come by.

Why the name Kirk Sink? A very early examination of the site revealed a cruciform building with an apse at one end. This gave rise to the supposition - almost certainly wrong - that a Christian Church had been built there and had sunk into the ground. The site's connection with Gargrave Church is probably also fictitious although it is strongly rumoured that the Church's distinctive reddish brown stonework used on its reconstruction in the nineteenth century was taken from the Kirk Sink ruin. Fictitious or not, such rumours can only emphasise how important Gargrave is in the history of this area.

School's Out

My two children finish school today. We're breathing an enormous sigh of relief as the summer term finally comes to a halt and we can finally kick back and relax for six full weeks. Or can we? If you're a carer of young or school-age children, those weeks can feel like a sentence of 24/7 childcare if you're at home, or Olympic-style juggling if you're at work.

It's taken a while, but after eight years of school holidays I've come to treasure this time of year. Why? Because it's the start of what my family so desperately needs after 10 months of unrelenting schedules: no agenda, space to 'be', to muck about, create, to daydream even. The clock is put in a metaphorical cupboard and told not to show its face unless absolutely necessary.

The clock is what governs our lives most of the year, but it certainly isn't something that children naturally respect; any parent will know all too well the exhausting business of cajoling their reluctant children to get ready in time for just about anything! Children prefer to move organically through time, to go with the flow.

In recent years, scientists are increasingly realising the cognitive and health benefits of this way of being: daydreaming or 'mind wandering' are noted as being essential for nurturing creativity, brain development and problem-solving in both adults and children. This is why play is so important for child development and, indeed, comes naturally to them. As Christians we know that 'time to be' is essential, too, for our souls. It's something deeply akin to, and necessary for, connecting with God's Spirit.

And so it grieves me deeply that children and teens have this precious type of time squeezed out of their normal days, perhaps due to an increasingly competitive school culture. Understanding of the detrimental impact of this, amongst other factors, on their mental health is deepening. As Jay Griffiths says in her book, **Pip Pip: A Sideways look at Time**, 'The clock, for all its precision in measurement, is a blunt instrument for the psyche and for society'.

And so, as we stand on the edge of this new timezone, whether minding children or not, let's embrace this child-like, clock-free time as a precious God moment – even if it does stretch us to the limit at times.

One last point. For such an attractive village with acres of public greens it has always been a mystery to me that the old street names were so prosaic; North, South, East and West streets and Church street. Not an unusual name anywhere! I wonder why ?

Oh, yes, and England won the World Cup and it was the year of the Abervan Disaster !

I will surely have missed some important points but I have no doubt you will let me know.
