

DAVID'S DISPATCHES

ABOUT 400 VICARS from Leeds Diocese (aka West Yorkshire and the Dales) got together in early September for the **HOPE 16** conference - to think, pray and worship God together.

One of the main events was a debate between *Professor Brian Cox* (of TV fame), who is a Fellow of the Royal Society and has a doctorate in High Energy Particle Physics, and *Professor David Wilkinson*, who is a Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society and has two doctorates - one of which is in the study of star formation, the chemical evolution of galaxies and terrestrial mass extinctions like the one the wiped out the dinosaurs.


The main difference between them was that Brian Cox is not a believer and David Wilkinson is. In fact David's second PhD is in Systematic Theology and Christian Eschatology and he is now Professor and Principal of St. John's College, University of Durham – where he oversee the training of vicars.

They both gave talks about the formation and development of the universe, and both were in many ways very similar. People often argue that science and religion are in conflict, but not these two top scientists. They were both happy to admit that, as we discover more about this universe, we are discovering how much more there still is to discover!

However, Brian tried to interpret what we know about the formation of the universe in a way that avoids the need for there to be a God. This involves multiple universes created by some mega-energy source. Where the mega-energy source came from was the next obvious question! David, on the other hand, was interested in the amazing improbability that life could exist at all - given we now know that the conditions have to be **exactly** right for life to exist.

What both did agree on was that life of any sort is a very rare thing in this universe. Human beings could well be the only sentient life in the whole universe — despite there being something like ten thousand million million stars in it. [So, not only are there no little green men on Mars but if any do exist they are "in a galaxy far far away"].

Why we are here at all is much more like a *miracle* than we are sometimes led to believe.

resource Granting Carers' Wishes

Carers across Bradford District are being urged to apply for a share of a £215,000 pot of grants to help recharge their batteries.

The Carer's Wellbeing Grant is specifically for carers and encourages them to request up to £200 to give them a much-needed break from the challenges of looking after a loved one.

Co-ordinated by Carers' Resource, the district's integrated carers' service, the money can be spent on a personal treat such as a short break, enjoying a hobby or leisure activity, an educational course or membership.

It is funded by Bradford Council with additional support from the three local NHS Clinical Commissioning Groups (Bradford District, Bradford City, and Airedale, Wharfedale and Craven).

Applications are now open and will close on 16 December. They can be made by a carer or someone representing them, and are not means tested. As there is limited funding for this grant it may be necessary to close the application process early.

Chris Whiley, Director of Shipley-based charity Carer's Resource, said: "This is a great opportunity for carers to think of having something just for them – maybe it's a new gym membership, or having their hair done, or even a weekend away – whatever they need to help them feel energised again.

"Each application will be considered individually and it may be that in some cases we will be able to support the applicant by finding an alternative pocket of funding, or help them find a specific item at a cheaper price.

"The aim is to make the scheme as fair as possible and help carers have a positive and enriched experience of caring."

Coun Val Slater, Bradford Council's Deputy Leader, said: "We know that this grant can really benefit carers. It often allows them to continue in their caring role but also ensures that they look after their own health and wellbeing. This is one of the many ways that we provide high quality support and respite for carers."

Last year 1,414 carers received the grant, totalling £273,221.78. More than half were for short breaks or pamper treatments; requests for fitness or IT equipment or computers were also popular.

Some used it for: a course of yoga sessions; an acoustic guitar; a trip to the theatre; having their hair and nails done. It is not awarded for daily expenses, rent, clothing, utility bills, driving lessons, household items, or aids for the person looked after.

Applications can be from anyone in the Bradford district - including Airedale, Wharfedale and Craven - who cares, unpaid, for a family member, friend, or neighbour who has a physical or mental health condition, drug or alcohol addiction, or is frail due to old age, also living within these areas.

Priority will be given to new applicants - carers who received a Carer's Wellbeing Grant in the last year are unlikely to be considered. The application form is available on email from cwbgrant@carersresource.org. ESHTON HALL

There can be few villages the size of Gargrave with so many mansion houses surrounding it so closely, with perhaps the most striking in appearance being. Eshton Hall. In its present form this building displays the Tudor or Elizabethan Revival style of architecture, but prior to that it was pure eighteenth century Palladian. Even before that there were older buildings going back in one form or another to the Conquest when the "De Essheton" family were granted the Manor of Eshton. What their Manor House was like is unknown, although it is said there are clues hidden away in the cellar of the Hall. It is also said that in that cellar is the bricked up entrance to a tunnel leading to Flasby.

At some point the manor came into the hands of the Clifford family who in 1597 or 1598 mortgaged it to Robert Bindloss. On non-payment of the mortgage debt Bindloss foreclosed and in 1646 the Hall, estate and manor were sold to Mathew Wilson of Kendal, the ancestor of the Wilson family who owned the Hall until 1960 when it became a school. It was a Mathew Wilson who in the period 1825 – 1827 had the Hall redesigned in its present form by George Webster the Kendal architect. Webster had cornered the architectural market in Cumbria but his commissions had also spread to North Lancashire and North Yorkshire. In his early years he specialised in Neo-Classical design but he then went on to become a pioneer in the use of the Tudor Revival style. Examples of his work outside Cumbria are Settle Town Hall, The Falcon Hotel in Settle, Cliffe Castle Keighley, the re-modelling of a part of Downham Hall in Lancashire, the addition of a portecochere and clock tower at Broughton Hall, and Eshton Hall.

The most famous occupant of the Hall was Sir Mathew Wilson, 1st baronet 1802 – 1891. He was a great power in the area. He began his career as MP for Clitheroe which, at that time, was a Rotten Borough with rotten practices to prove it. He was twice unseated in 1842 and 1853 on petitions to Parliament, one of which alleged bribery, but not by Sir Mathew. From 1875 to 1885 he was Liberal M.P for the West Riding of Yorkshire (North) seat and thereafter in 1885, when that seat was abolished, he became Skipton's first MP until his defeat by the Conservatives in 1886. The West Riding (North) constituency returned two representatives and for a short period he had held the seat jointly with Lord Frederick Cavendish who was murdered in 1882 in Phoenix Park Dublin by an Irish Nationalist group. There is a Memorial Fountain in his memory at Bolton Abbey.

As well as a long serving MP Sir Mathew held the position of JP for many years and was one of those who read The Riot Act in Skipton during the Plug Pulling Riot of 1842, although he did not go as far as Cooper Preston of Flasby Hall who wanted the military to shoot the rioters.

When he lost the Skipton seat in 1886 his supporters in the Liberal Party pressed for a statue of him to be erected in the town and a site was chosen where the Cenotaph now stands. This was not without controversy, however. The people of Skipton did not see why they should have to pay for a statue of the man they had just rejected as their MP, and it was only in 1888 when outside finance had been obtained that the work could begin. It is said that Sir Mathew was one of the small number of men who had attended the unveiling of a statue to

themselves. Statues usually came after death and not before. However he had died before 1922 so did not see the removal of his statue to its present position in the High Street to make way for the Cenotaph.

For a time Sir Mathew shared the occupation of the Hall with his half-sister, Mary Frances Richardson Currer whose name is thought to be the inspiration for Charlotte Bronte's pseudonym of Currer Bell.. Mary is regarded as England's earliest female bibliophile and her library filled two large rooms at the Hall. She loved books and wanted to keep her collection together by giving it to Sir Mathew. He lost no time in disposing of it on her death in 1861, however.

A family home, a library of valuable books, a school, an old persons home and now flats, long may Eshton Hall survive to remind us of Gargrave's fascinating past.

Cherishing our Heritage

The railway station at the village of Gargrave in the Yorkshire Dales is quietly unpretentious. There is a platform and a carpark that's little more than the size of a postage stamp, and there is no-one in sight. A brief walk takes you past the venerable natural stone structure of St. Andrew's parish church, across a hump backed bridge over the river Aire and into the village.

This is a small place with a distinctive rustic feel to it and, almost at once, you sense its relaxed atmosphere. We are in the territory of Postman Pat and his black and white cat. I can almost imagine dear old Mrs Goggins popping up behind the gate at River Cottage. Everything about this place tells of a small and closely knit community — alongside it Carryduff would appear diverse and enormously large.

The village is built around staggered cross roads and its two most striking features are the Dalesman Café and the parish church. Both come across as

steeped in tradition. You cannot fail to recognise that these are places where heritage is nurtured and celebrated. It is the notice board outside the church that most attracts my attention. It reveals that there is a Sung Eucharist as the main morning service on the first and third Sunday of the month. In a village as small as Gargrave that is a mightily impressive expression of our Anglican heritage.

I recall many occasions — even in the recent past — when our parish choir provided a full sung Communion service. I always appreciated taking part in it and still greatly value this part of our heritage. For me it remains an uplifting experience and an important part of the passing on of our faith story. The language — drawn from the Book of Common Prayer — and the truthful message it proclaims is purposeful and clear when sung out; and I would go so far as to claim that it nurtured a life in those who sang it and, perhaps, in at least some of those who heard it. It is our misfortune — or so I would argue — that we now live in a time that is less careful with truth and language, less in tune with our heritage.

The Dalesman Café further enhanced my appreciation of the significance of heritage in Gargrave. Almost unbelievably it offers a great many varieties of old fashioned sweets, sold out of glass or earthenware jars. Besides that, a "Dalesman Lunch" comes in the form of Wensleydale cheese, ham and chutney and homemade cakes. Then, for those with more time to spare, the afternoon tea experience would be Yorkshire Tea and scones (with rhubarb not too far away). It is worth noting that rhubarb chutney embodies the very life and soul of the Yorkshire Dales. What a rich heritage all this represents. There are no burgers and chips here.

Gargrave was the starting point for a two day trek across part of the Pennine Way with my son. Leaving the village we entered a world of riverside paths, dry stone walls, willow trees and cows leaning over gates. It was much tougher on our second day as we tackled upland moors and the steep ascent of Pen-y-ghent before descending into Horton-in-Ribblesdale —another of those homely villages with its own railway platform.

From there it was a simple matter of catching the train back to Gargrave and its tiny station car park. But before we set off home I couldn't resist a further glance at the notice board outside St. Andrew's church — Sung Eucharist — with its understated reminder of the wealth of our heritage.

"What are you up to?"

"The farmer put up a fence there to keep the cows out of the river – they were disturbing the sea trout – and the bank's a lot less open than it was, so make sure you get out in plenty of time. We get lots of visitors here, mostly walkers on the Pennine Way, who don't know what they're doing. Where are you from?"

"And where are you going?"

"Back towards Leeds – as far as I can get."

Then she asked for my full name (including surname) and repeated it carefully, as if she might need to recall it in some future discourse, possibly with the emergency services or the local media.

"Well now I know your name, it's only fair that you know mine. I'm

"Nice to meet you." I was quite impressed; this was almost like meeting a tribal elder in Africa.

The conversation flowed onwards to Janet's birthplace, Castleford – an industrial town many miles further down the River Aire. She dreamt of returning there on the river after death, like in a Japanese funeral where they cast little boats out to sea. Sadly, she couldn't swim.

"Perhaps I'll get a boat!" she said, her face brightening.

"Good idea." I tied my painter to the raft's nose and squeezed the side tubes. The air pressure was good. All my knots were tight. I was ready to go.

"Have you got a mobile phone with you?"

"Yes." and a drysuit, throw rope, buoyancy aid and even a satellite tracker, I wanted to say, which anybody can use to track my exact position on this river and follow my progress live on Google Maps 24 hours a day, seven days a week. At the push of a button I can summon the emergency services myself — even this close to Bradford.

A man in a brown leather hat then appeared beside Janet, but their whispered conversation was lost on the wind.

"Be prepared." she said. "Lovely to have met you. Remember the weir."

Her husband was clearly a man of fewer words, and simply said, as a kind of farewell:

"People go missing in there."

"People go missing in there." The man's words re-circulated in my thoughts as I drifted towards the weir's dark lips, bullied on by a brisk wind, pushing me

ever closer to the brink. I slashed at the water with my paddle. The raft span around and I pulled hard. I kept pulling, and paddled faster. My hand grabbed at a rock, then a rope, and I scrambled ashore.

There was not a sea trout in sight.

My journey began an hour earlier at the railway station in Shipley, one of Bradford's better eastern suburbs. The waiting room on the eastbound platform – where trains run to Leeds – is three times larger than the one on the westbound, where the trains leave for Skipton, Morecambe and my destination, Gargrave. This small village on the verge of the Yorkshire Dales, close to the Lancashire border, was clearly a little visited and remote place.

Through the train window, the hilly country swelled, darkened and became the Dales. We scampered between stations at Keighley and Skipton, where it seemed every waiting commuter was engaged in a private staring battle with the iPhone or Samsung cupped in their palm, or the tablet held at face height like a clapperboard, only occasionally glancing up along the tracks or at the departures screen.

But while computers and smartphones continue to suck our attention from the real world, they can, in the right hands, empower the explorer. To them, the ability to reconnoitre almost anywhere on earth – using online maps – is perhaps the greatest benefit of the internet age. Street-level photography can pinpoint exactly where that crucial footpath leaves the main road, while satellite imagery shows up the permanent hazards on a river, like weirs. To preserve the mystique of the never-visited place, the balance of information and ignorance, readiness and recklessness, must be carefully considered. But as temporary dangers – like fallen trees and barbed wire fences – still mostly elude the technology, common sense and a careful attitude remain very much a necessity.

BEYOND BELIEF: FAITH

Faith and belief

For many "faith" and "belief" mean much the same thing. Christianity is usually thought of in terms of a certain set of ideas, or beliefs, that must be held about God, Jesus and the Bible. Faith is then a matter of holding onto those beliefs. These can be to do with, say, death, the resurrection, the virgin birth or the holy trinity. Many people's introduction to religion has come in this form: the various things you have to believe in order to call yourself a Christian, Muslim or Jew. At its worst faith gets reduced to a package of theological propositions which you either accept, reject or debate. It becomes primarily cerebral rather than an experience or a relationship. Some Christians may even think they are losing their faith when they are no longer comfortable with some of the beliefs and teachings they took on board earlier in life, particularly to do with sexuality and Christian exclusivism. In fact, the opposite is probably true; to critically evaluate one's beliefs is often a sign that faith is actually maturing!

So how did this come about? Here is what three contemporary Christian writers have to say about belief.

Alan Billings, Anglican priest and author (1)

Alan Billings considers this obsession with beliefs to be a contemporary aberration arising from our most recent history. He says it is a mistaken idea due to three factors.

Firstly, up until the 1950's when there was a resurgence of church attendance after the war, the UK was essentially mono-ethic, mono-cultural and mono-faith. Since then we have become increasingly multi-cultural and multi-faith. The crucial difference between religions was in what they believed so the difference in beliefs came to the fore.

Second, New Atheists like Richard Dawkins came to prominence at the turn of the new century. Most of their attacks on Christianity were conducted in print by those for whom words and ideas were important than experience - academics, journalists and commentators. Much of the debate centred on defining Christians primarily on the basis of their belief in various defined doctrines.

In the third place, from the 1970s universities and colleges shifted their focus from traditional Christian theological subjects to the study of all religions, and more recently the religious narratives that might motivate Islamic terrorists. All these factors have created an unconscious tendency across our culture to assume religion is mainly about what people believe - what they hold in their heads and recite in their creeds. Yet for many ordinary worshippers Christian faith is primarily about the heart, the will and a relationship with God; it is an emotional and practical matter well before it is something cerebral - if ever it is?

Marcus Borg, Professor in Religion and Culture. Oregon State University (2)

Marcus Borg sees two much earlier developments as accounting for the current misunderstanding of faith and religion. The first is the Protestant Reformation which produced several new denominations. Each defined themselves by what they "believed", that is, by their distinctive doctrines and confessions. Roman Catholics followed suit, distinguishing themselves by what they believed compared to what Protestants believed. Christian faith began to mean having the "right" beliefs instead of the "wrong" beliefs.

The second development was the birth of modern science and scientific ways of knowing, in the Enlightenment of the seventeenth century. This identified truth as being verified by fact. It redefined "faith" as being what you turn to when knowledge runs out. A "belief" became an assertion which you could not prove.

Both these developments helped turn Christian faith and belief into matters primarily of the "head". Up until then, faith was a matter of the heart. The heart was a metaphor not simply for the centre of our emotions but the deepest level of the self, the essence of who we are. Faith was the way of the heart, not the head.

Several ideas that are often considered to be Christian tradition only arose during this period, shaped by the reaction to Enlightenment thinking. Among these was the notion of biblical infallibility and inerrancy and an emphasis upon the literal-factual interpretation of the Bible. Prior to that, what mattered most was its meaning rather than whether it was factually true.

Harvey Cox, Harvard Professor of Divinity (3)

Cox goes back as early as the year 313 AD as the turning point when faith was eclipsed by belief. During the early church, a wide range of different theologies thrived, there was no single pattern of governance, no uniform liturgy and no commonly accepted scripture. Yet these widely dispersed congregations felt a strong sense of unity. What bound them together was not an organisation or a hierarchy and not a creed. Rather it was a powerful confidence they shared in the same Spirit and the common objective of making the message of Jesus about the coming of God's reign known to the world.

When Emperor Constantine "converted" to Christianity, while still revering the sun god Helios!, he triggered a titanic makeover. The crumbling Roman Empire became "Christianised" but Christianity became imperialised. From an energetic movement of faith it coagulated into a phalanx of required beliefs. Bishops assumed quasi-imperial powers, and began living like imperial elites.

During the Constantine era, an official version of Christianity emerged with a system of beliefs and creeds strictly monitored by a powerful hierarchy and imperial decrees. One historian estimates that within the next two and a half centuries Christian imperial authorities executed twenty-five thousand followers for their lack of creedal correctness. It succeeded in turning Jesus "meek and humble of heart" into the Righteous Judge seen in the Sistine Chapel while the Holy Spirit for all practical purposes was forgotten.

The identification of faith with believing a set of statements is thus a serious impoverishment of the word "faith". To see faith primarily as belief, not only obscures the other meanings, but also seriously distorts the reality of faith itself. Discovering the heart of Christianity requires recovering the rich meanings of faith, a recovery that leads to a relational understanding of faith and to an understanding of Christianity as a "way". A way of the heart and a faith that is about the relationship of the self to God at its deepest level.
