#### FIRST WORDS

Peter Poulter, St Andrew's Churchwarden

I was reminded recently of one of the stories I love to read with my grandchildren. You may remember it, too. You see, we are going on a Vicar hunt. And in our hunt there are, like in the original story, a number of stages. Not sure I would call them obstacles exactly. But maybe that remains to be seen.

Firstly, we need to decide what we want a vicar for. You may think that is obvious, But recently all parishes in the diocese have been challenged to imagine what their church life will look like in a dozen or so years' time. Blue sky thinking and serious planning like that will point to what we need in the way of resources. And, as the story goes...We can't go over it, we can't go under it. Oh no! We've got to go through it!

The Church Councils have each made a start with this and produced a document called Vision 2030. So far so good.

But then, it is not just Gargrave and Coniston Cold involved. Discussion about the future of our two parishes is part of the work the diocese of Leeds is engaged in, planning strategy for the churches of our area – the Deanery of Ewecross and Bowland. This involves a rationalisation process about how to make best use of a limited number of clergy. This is usually described as a shortage of clergy. Actually, it is more a shortage of parishioners, the people able to sustain the costs involved in maintaining the life and work of the church. Fewer parishioners means less money, less money means fewer clergy. So part of the discussion is working out how we would share our new vicar with others in the area. We can't go over it, we can't go under it. Oh no! We've got to go through it

Our parishes are in the middle of that process – not quite sure where it is going.

When we have got that package put together, there will be the business of identifying the particular mix of gifts, skills and experience necessary to do the job with the variety of Christians of different backgrounds that makes up the Gargrave congregation, and that would constitute whatever partnership of parishes we were involved in. We can't go over it, we can't go under it. Oh no! We've got to go through it!

Then we will create our pastorate profile brochure, describing our scene, telling our story and trying to sell our situation – attractive but honest. Then on to advertising and interviewing to make an appointment.

When? We are not sure about that one - but we will keep you posted. Suffice it to say, we are in the process of putting together plans to make use of the willing band of visiting clergy, and the mixed bag of talents and experience in the parish, to keep the show on the road until the end of the year.

The original story found their bear. We look forward to a successful Vicar hunt.

#### A family screwed up!

**Hopeless#butGod** is the title of a new set of family services which address anxieties about our world, our community and our families.

The first of this series was on Sunday May 6th and it focussed on family life as told in the story of Joseph, "A family screwed up." This was beautifully illustrated by a very 'colourful' impromptu drama involving volunteers from the congregation. It was followed by an explanation of the Bible story and how it relates to us today. Indeed we heard several testimonies describing how God has been present in times of need and hopelessness.

Children had fun making Joseph's wonderful technicolour coat for peg doll figures and everyone, both young and old, enjoyed the praise and worship.

Do come along to the next service on **Sunday June 3rd** when the Hopeless#butGod series will be further explored through the story of Paul and Silas. The service starts at 10.45am but don't miss out on the delicious breakfast served from 10am onwards!

#### Be with you

The vicar at a local church experienced some technical problems with the sound system one Sunday. Instead of starting the service as usual with 'The Lord be with you', he said: 'There's something wrong with this microphone.'

Not hearing this, the congregation responded: 'And also with you.'

#### New train timetable

The headlines of the new train timetable, as far as it affects Gargrave, are that, in the Monday to Saturday timetable, the number of trains to and from Lancaster go up from 5 to 7, the number to Settle and Carlisle increase from 3 to 4 and the number in the Leeds direction go up from 9 to 12.

For commuting into Leeds there are now two trains arriving into Leeds before 9am, leaving Gargrave at 7-45 and 7-55 and coming back in the evening there is a much better choice as trains leave Leeds at 16-49, 17-25, 18-19, 19-18 and 19-49.

The later trains to and from Lancaster make it possible to go to an evening event in Lancaster leaving Gargrave at 18-14, having over 2 hours in Lancaster and arriving back at Gargrave at 22-45. The additional trains to and from Lancaster make it more practical to make long distance connections via Lancaster than previously as the choice of evening trains back makes the connections more reliable. In particular, connections to and from the Oxford, Reading, Winchester, Southampton and Bournemouth direction are likely to be easier via Lancaster than via Leeds.

I am told that the connections to and from the Arnside, Grange over Sands, Ulverston and Barrow direction changing at Carnforth are also much improved.

The current improvements are but the first step in the improvement "journey" which is taking place. Under the Northern franchise, there is a commitment to achieve the full improved service by December 2019. Crucial to these improvements is the introduction of new trains all over the country allowing the transfer of extra diesel units to Northern. Delays in electrification work by Network Rail have slowed down that process so the number of extra trains serving Gargrave is fewer than originally hoped. In particular the long gap in the service to Leeds in the morning remains. One of the extra services which is deferred until a later timetable change would have shortened that gap.

We have celebrated successful applications for funding, navigated and completed drainage management and ground works, and the installation of equipment using smaller stages.

This was halted so many times by losing out on major funding due to criteria changes.

We also found challenges along the way; the original fort design would have compromised all the drainage works. We have battled with the weather, too, which has delayed work and damaged planting and seed sowing we did.

However throughout we were, and still are, so overwhelmed by the help received from our contractors, our designers, and everyone's confidence in us that we could and would complete the project as promised to our community.



Our smaller plans are still continuing over the next few weeks. We are presently designing new signage for the playground which will set out the rules made by our local children in how to play safely in their new playground. We will also be attaching to the sign the logos of all those who have helped us raise the funding to complete the project.

There would have been a lot of disturbance to wildlife due to the building works, so now we hope we can encourage it back with our bird boxes, the building of bug hotels and possible hedgehog habitats.

We will be looking to see what is still naturally growing in the playground this spring/summer, as the wet weather has destroyed much of our previous planting efforts, including, sadly, the bulbs. The Parish Council have planted more flowering bushes which is a great start. There are still some areas that need working on, where old pieces of equipment were removed or still remain- there are plans to remove these.

For the Family Day we are suggesting that everyone brings a picnic, but we will also run a tasty cake and refreshment stall. We hope to have a variety of fun and games planned too. We hope to see you all there, but most importantly we hope the playground will bring fun and happiness to our village for everyone to enjoy.

#### Imbalanced Body? (part 2 of 3) ... Pilates News

In Part 1, we looked at the meaning of having a 'balanced body', particularly regarding the natural S-shaped posture of the spine. Now, we'll explore how various aspects of our lifestyle can actually change our bodies, causing imbalance and secondary health problems from pain to poor mobility!

#### SEDENTARY LIFESTYLE!

We just don't move around as much as previous generations. In general, we're less physically active in total hours per day, walking less (as car journeys dominate commuting to school and work and for shopping etc), have occupations that involve sitting for most of the day and have less physically-demanding chores in the house and garden. Electronic gadgets make them easier and quicker. Try mowing the lawn with a simple push-mower propelled by manpower alone, washing clothes by hand, mixing a cake without a food-processor etc. They're all surprisingly hard-work. No wonder our grandparents didn't bother much with the gym or exercise classes. Whether at work or play, we tend to spend much of the day sitting. It's not just adults either. Children spend most of the day sitting at school and are increasingly enticed away from 'playing out' by mobile phones, tablets and computer games and social media!

Healthy backs require movement as much as possible. They don't like any one position for too long. It all comes down to the discs, those clever shockabsorbers present between each vertebra (bone in your spine). They're like wet sponges! When you bend over, you squash the fluid out of them and then as you stand up the pressure is released and they suck the fluid back in again. They don't have their own blood supply to give them the oxygen and nutrients that they need to stay healthy, instead they can only get these through the fluid being squeezed out to get rid of waste products and then drawn back in full of new nutrients. Moving your spine not only helps the discs stay healthy, but also strengthens the muscles that move and support your spine. Using spinal muscles in a range of movements from bending to twisting, strengthens the vertebral bone that they are attached to and helps prevent osteoporosis (bone thinning) too.

#### SITTING!

Cultures around the world where they squat rather than use chairs to sit do not suffer from the degree of disc degeneration and back pain that we do in the developed world. Squatting is often regarded as primitive, but it's actually a beneficial posture for the lower back (as it doesn't load the lumbar discs in the way that sitting on a chair does) and it is the most natural position for opening your bowels and giving birth. So not so primitive after all!

Chairs aren't a problem as such, it's more the hours that we use them for without a break and in total, during the day. Sitting places a heavy load on the lowest (lumbar) discs, which is problematic when it is prolonged and they are not receiving vital nutrients through movement, as described above. Sitting doesn't just affect discs, it also has consequences for flexibility and muscle strength. Sitting unloads the tension on your hamstring muscles at the back of your thighs allowing them to shorten. They are attached at the bottom of your pelvis. Sit on



your hands and you'll feel two bonesyour ischial tuberosities or 'Sitz bones' in Pilates speak and this is where they attach to. If hamstrings are short, they tilt your pelvis backwards, flattening out the curve in your lower back. This squashes the lumbar discs at the front rather than spreading the load evenly across the whole disc. Can't touch your toes without bending your knees? You guessed it – tight hamstrings!

Sitting causes the opposite

problem with the muscles in your buttocks, the 'glutes'. They get stretched and lengthened and thus weakened. Weak glutes means we'll sub-consciously avoid using them and use our over-worked hamstrings instead, shortening the latter even more. Do you avoid using your glutes? Watch next time you walk or run up a steep hill! If you lean over and stick your bottom out, then you've just avoided using them. I can spot weak glutes just by observation - a flat rather than rounded derriere is a dead give-away!!

#### ELECTRONIC DEVICES!

Computers and mobile phones have changed our lives beyond recognition. They've brought huge benefits but also draw-backs. We tend to sit to use them, but this isn't the only issue. They also cause us to lean over, curling our shoulders forwards, resulting in tight chest muscles ('pecs') and lengthened, weak upper back muscles. We lose the ability to be able to move our shoulders back to their neutral position and shoulder problems can occur from this poor alignment. Doctors call the curling over of the thoracic spine, kyphosis, and it affects your ability to move your ribcage maximally i.e take a deep breathe. The kyphosis also moves your head to a downward gaze, so to counteract this you have to deepen the curve at the back of your neck, straining the posterior neck muscles and putting pressure on the cervical discs. It's not just electronic devices, many hobbies e.g. reading, sewing, baking, crafting etc involve leaning over too!

#### HEELS!

Any heel (I'm not just talking stilettos) will affect your posture, by tilting the body forward. To counteract this you have to lean backwards at the lumbar spine and deepen the curve there. The shorter the person and the higher the heel, the more pronounced the effect on your lumbar discs. It places abnormal pressures on the bones in your feet and ankles too. By effectively being on tiptoe, the Achilles tendons at the back of the ankle are not put under tension to keep them lengthened. Those that wear high heels all day, every day can get such shortened Achilles tendons, that walking barefoot or in flats becomes impossible!

#### **REBALANCE!**

Don't worry, it's not all doom and gloom for our bodies. Neck or back pain? Shoulder problems? Hunched-over posture? Aching feet? Stiff spine? Can't touch your toes? Yes, all of these can be improved with Pilates, but armed with an understanding of how our lifestyles can affect us, there are many small adjustments that we can all make, that don't involve exercise classes and don't have to cost us a penny!

I have always enjoyed lambing time. It has always been a joy to see new lambs with days lengthening and spring on its way. Not this year, as it has been the hardest lambing time I have known (I have seen quite a few). We had a very wet autumn with the grass trampled into the mud which caused the sheep to loose condition. As it was constantly wet, they had no chance to recover.

Fortunately, we were able to clear sheds to bring the majority inside. As they were in poor condition due to constant rain and cold, extra feed was required. With a lot of TLC and a dry and comfortable shed, they began to recover. Alas, the problems were not all solved. Normally, as the sheep lamb, they are turned out onto clean fields with new grass. But with continuous wind and wet, most had to be kept inside. Every pen became full, every emergency pen and trailer became full; feeding, bedding and watering became relentless. With no respite from the weather, life became a hard slog. Most farmers I have spoken to agree it has been the hardest known. Long hours, with little sleep can take the soul of the fittest.

What a relief when the sun shone, even if it was only two days. It was then "all hands to the wheel" to move them all outside. There is no respite in these circumstances, day or night, with little time for sleep. If anyone wants to lose weight, without trying, try a lambing time for a month!!!

After a few days of sunshine, everything becomes alive with spring bursting into life; it's amazing how quickly the grass can grow. One soon forgets all the strains and stresses of a long hard winter, and change to the joys of spring.

I am very pleased with the Lonks who had all live lambs at 150% (they look good). The Herdwicks 200%, (they normally have 1.) One had triplets, which is most unusual, (3 very good lambs).

There is no rest for the wicked, as all this spring- work of slurry out, fertiliser on, wall gaps to mend. Who would be a farmer? Or, put another way, 'What is a Bank Holiday?'

#### FINANCIAL EDUCATION IN PRIMARY SCHOOLS?

#### Make financial education compulsory in primary schools

So says the Archbishop of Canterbury's 'Just Finance Foundation'.

In a recent statement, it said: 'Primary school pupils should receive compulsory lessons on how to manage money as part of the response to growing levels of financial insecurity and problem debt in the UK.'

Learning where money comes from, when to spend and how to save is vital to children's ability to navigate adult life and should be a mandatory part of personal, social, health, and economic education (PSHE) in primary schools, the Foundation says.

In a written submission to a Department for Education consultation, the Foundation highlights figures that show 40% of UK adults have less than £100 in savings and that struggling to manage money is becoming a mainstream issue.

"Financial distress is on the rise in the UK. A recent report by the Financial Conduct Authority found that 50% of UK consumers show one or more characteristics of financial vulnerability and the Money Advice Service estimate that one in six individuals in the UK are over-indebted," the Foundation notes.

"Uncertain incomes, the impact of lifelong indebtedness, and high housing costs are compounding to make financial capability an issue of pressing importance for younger generations."

The call came as the Foundation published an interim report on the impact of its LifeSavers programme of financial education in 30 primary schools across the North East, Nottinghamshire, South East London and West Yorkshire.

The research shows that 70% of schools running the programme say financial education for primary school pupils should be compulsory.

Rowena Young, Executive Director of the Just Finance Foundation, said: 'Children growing up today face the most challenging and complex financial landscape of a generation. Education should reflect the times and there is a growing consensus that managing money should now form an essential part of setting children up for life.'

LifeSavers was designed to address a gap and is practically demonstrating how schools can weave financial education throughout the teaching and life of the school in a way they can sustain. The study showed that 90% of participating schools agreed LifeSavers had improved the quality of financial education.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, said: 'Research has shown that habits and attitudes to money are already being formed at the age of seven. LifeSavers helps primary schools and teachers embed financial education in ways that best meet the needs of pupils and local communities. The programme combines down-to-earth, practical experience and helping children explore what it means to be wise, generous, just and thankful with money.'
