

#### WARDEN'S WORDS

In the week that I am writing this we will be interviewing candidates for the position of parish priest so by the time you read the article we will have made an appointment, provided, of course, that there is a suitable candidate. The successful person will start in the autumn making almost two years that we have been without a priest. Many people have taken on duties to carry us through the vacancy and thanks go to them all. But the end of the vacancy period is not the end of sharing out the work of running our parish; far from it. Our priest will also be in charge of both Coniston Cold and Kirkby Malham so will be stretched more thinly than in the past. In addition we have deliberately signalled in our advert and other paperwork that we are looking for someone who will help us all to serve. We hope that St Andrew's will become a centre of learning and development for many who have the capacity and desire to be part of making real the prayer of Jesus, "Thy Kingdom Come."

So what are we looking for? First someone who has a sense of God's call on their lives, for whom the post is not just a job but also a real vocation. In Moses' day a leader was needed and God was asked about this. His response was "you need a leader and I know just the man! He's filled with my Spirit" That man was Joshua, one of the great spiritual leaders of the Old Testament. Some generations later the people became restless because all the other tribes around them had kings but they were ruled by a spiritual hierarchy of priests and judges. God warned them that a king would wield a double-edged sword. Whilst he would give leadership he would also exact a high price. King Saul was appointed and the history of the kings that followed showed how right God's word was. So, second, we don't want someone who lords it over us but one who works with us so that we share the load and the whole Christian community becomes greater than the sum of its parts.

In St Paul's letter to the Christians in Ephesus he sets out a range of leadership roles that we can expect to see; apostles, prophets, pastors, teachers, evangelists. All of the roles he describes are clearly said to be "for the equipping of the saints," i.e. all of us who seek to serve Christ. No doubt we will all be intrigued to meet our new leader but please pray with us that the person will be: filled with God's Spirit, called to serve here, skilled in releasing our gifts and talents, and effective in communicating the joy of living a Christian life to all around us. You could always come along and see for yourselves, of course! We'll keep you posted on the date.

#### St Andrew's Churchyard – Care of graves

The Parochial Church Council of St Andrew's feel it is necessary to remind everyone of the diocesan regulations regarding graveyards. A full copy can be provided on request, but the section we are immediately concerned about is as follows:

Prohibitions: For the avoidance of doubt, the following are not permitted:

- kerbs, railings, fencing, chippings, pebbles and similar materials, and free-standing vases. These create difficulty or danger when mowing;

- memorials in the shape of vases, hearts, open books; memorials incorporating photographs or portraits; mementoes, windmills, toys or little animals, solar lamps or similar; the use of 'pet names', artificial flowers.

A number of graves in the Gargrave churchyard do not comply with these. We understand the wish to personalise a grave and provide floral tributes from time to time, and we do not wish to be restrictive in this. However, the PCC would be grateful if all who care for graves could ensure that the location of vases and planters is kept to the immediate area of the headstone or temporary cross on the grave, and that other decorations reflect the diocesan regulations. I hope that you understand our situation in this matter. If you need any help or further information, please do not hesitate to contact Peter Poulter on 748944.

In addition, please note that the PCC will not give permission for use of artificial grass on graves. Moreover, please help the graveyard to look good all round by putting unwanted pots and vases, dead flowers and plants in the bins provided.

Opening gardens in Gargrave as a way of raising money for St Andrew's Church seems to have a long and distinguished history. The Parish Magazine for August 1936 details the accounts from the Garden Fete held at Gargrave House on 27 June. Sources of income included teas given by Mrs J.W. Coulthurst, a donation of £1 1s from Lady Nelson, competitions (sale of cake, peas in bottle) and games (Zanora the Fortune Teller, Bottle Fishing, Skittles, Ring Me Up, and a bran tub donated by Col. N A. England). The produce stall made the most money, over £10. The total proceeds from the day were £54 11s 6d. That's £3800 in today's money – funnily enough, the same as what Gargrave Open Gardens made in 2018.

A new series of interviews with folk with local interest. This month our MP, Julian Smith.

### Can you please provide a pen sketch of yourself, with particular reference to your involvement with Gargrave

I was born and grew up in Stirling in Scotland; I read History and English at the University of Birmingham, having been previously educated at a local comprehensive and later with a sixth form bursary at Millfield School, Somerset. My career began as an entrepreneur; in 1999, I set up Arq International, executive recruiting. My passion for politics led me to seek election to Parliament and I was first elected as MP for Skipton & Ripon in 2010. Since joining parliament, I have focused on rural issues, education, business and international development. Being concerned for a rural community I campaigned for a fairer funding formula for rural schools and for improvements in the way the Trans-Pennine route is configured. I have been closely involved in bringing the Tour de France Grand Depart to the UK. In May 2015 I joined the Government as a Minister in the Whips' Office; in July 2016 I became Government Whip and following the 2017 General Election, I was appointed Government Deputy Chief Whip and in November 2017 Government Chief Whip. I now divide my time between North Yorkshire and London, sharing my life with my wife Sarah.

#### What brought you to Gargrave?

The beautiful North Yorkshire landscape! My career allowed me to become involved in life here following my election as MP; my wife and I love Gargrave and its environs

#### What things do you like about Gargrave?

So many but I would identify friends we have made; stunning scenery; the canal; access to the Dales oh and we love the Dalesman cafe, Abbotts Harbour for its bacon butties and the Masons Arms for a good pint!

If you could change anything about Gargrave, what would it be? Gargrave is always lovely; I am aware that the churches of St Andrews and Coniston Cold as well as Kirkby Malham are currently without a priest and am hopeful of someone taking up the post soon

#### Part eight: Bread and water diet

THE ARRIVAL OF THE CISTERCIANS AT YORK on their way to Rievaulx caused a stir in religious life in Yorkshire. Robert, we are told, was reasonably happy at Whitby, but felt drawn to their more austere way of life. A group of seven monks at St Mary's Abbey in York felt the same way. These men - Richard, Ralph, Gamel, Gregory, Hannon, Thomas and Gaultier - wanted to leave the city, its noise and temptations. Soon, in the early summer of 1132, they were joined by another six and decided to leave York and become Cistercians.

This caused a row. Obviously their departure would be a significant blow to the strength and morale of St Mary's. Eventually the split had to be sorted out by the Archbishop of York, Thurstan. It is believed that Robert was present for some part of the arguments about whether they had the right to leave. One account says that Robert was one of the 13 dissenters. With the archbishop on their side the rebel monks went to stay in his palace until December, when the whole household went to celebrate Christmas at his manor at Ripon. At this point the archbishop gave the group some land in the valley of the Skell, to the west of the town, which was to be their home - a home with neither wall nor roof, in the middle of winter. The date was December 27. Presumably this gift of land was the reason why they did not do what might have seemed the logical thing and go to Rievaulx.

They made shelters as best they could, in what was described as a place more fit for wild animals than humans to inhabit, lived on bread given to them by the archbishop, and drank from the river.

According to one account Robert had returned to Whitby, but when he heard the other rebels had a settlement he got permission from his abbot to join them, and found them felling trees for their first building. If this is what happened his arrival must have been a boost to their spirits. If he joined, then surely others would.

In June of 1133 they applied to become part of the Cistercian order and were welcomed by Bernard of Clairvaux, who had taken over leadership because of the increasingly poor health of Stephen Harding, who died in 1134.

While this acceptance by Clairvaux may have satisfied their spiritual needs it did nothing for what they required to survive. At one point they were in such a bad way that they considered abandoning the place that became known as Fountains to head for France. They were rescued by the arrival of Hugh, who had been dean of York. Hugh was wealthy and provided the colony not only with food, but money to pay for proper accommodation. In spite of this they still had hard times until more recruits with a bit of money turned up.

The outcome was that Fountains over years became a huge operator in sheep farming, with much land in Yorkshire providing employment for many hundreds of people, transforming the region's economy and essentially laying the foundations for the great textile industries for which Yorkshire was to become world famous. Monasteries like Fountains, which aimed to be self-sufficient, became a breeding ground for developments in technology, as well as medicine, education and music.

Sixty years after its foundation it had the resources to mount a relief operation in the great famine that hit western Europe in 1194-96, saving many people from starvation. In spite of its being ravaged by Scots raids, as were other monasteries, by the time of its dissolution by Henry the Eighth in 1539 it was the richest Cistercian establishment in England and the twenty-fourth wealthiest of all monasteries. It wasn't all plain sailing, however, and like other institutions it had its share of problems over the years.

#### INTO THE DISTANT PAST

WELL WE HAVE ARRIVED in the time of the Romans and in Gargrave there is evidence of real settlement for the first time.

Many of you will know that a Roman villa is situated at Kirk Sink. There is information online about this villa at www.outofoblivion.org.uk. and within the scant dig reports from the early 1970's which are in Gargrave Library. This building was quite substantial by the 4th century with an associated field system. The air photographs taken by Cambridge University show extensive ditches and two unmentioned enclosures. One is circular and one is kite-shaped. The circular feature lies to the SE of the site by the river and the kite-shaped enclosure which is likely to be a Romano-British stock enclosure is near the villa.

The field system and enclosures remain unrecorded. Only a few of the ditches immediately by the main villa site have been recorded and there is much work still needed to be done. A community archaeological project?

There is another Roman site in the village and evidence of this was found whilst an archaeological dig was undertaken prior to the development at Old Hall Croft. The archaeological report resides in Gargrave Library. I was personally involved in this dig and Roman material was not expected but it did turn up in quite a reasonable quantities. Many Roman coins of the 3rd/4th century were found along with brooches of the 2nd/3rd century. The main concentration of these finds were just outside of the main dig towards the fencing of the lawn tennis club. This may indicate that the centre of Roman activity may be under the lawn tennis courts. Roman coins have been found in the field across Chew lane when a pipeline was put in and a solitary penannular brooch was found in a garden on Eshton road. This would seem to indicate a spread of unknown Roman activity centred upon the periphery of Old Hall Croft. As I was directly involved I would suggest that the site represents a market type of activity at a Roman crossroads.

The extensive Romano-British site at Grassington can be seen from Old Hall Croft and there must have been some connection by road to Gargrave villa which would entail a river crossing. A Roman road is likely to have come along the Aire valley and would most certainly have kept above the flood plain. You can see the Roman road from Ilkley dropping into Skipton from this location. So it would make the ideal spot for a temporary stop prior to crossing the river to head for the villa and Elslack where there was a Roman fort.

There would of course be flooding in the valley bottom which would need a location for a stopover at times and when you stand at Old Hall Croft you can just imagine that this would be that ideal location. Information on the Roman roads in the area have been researched by Mr Trevor Batchelor on behalf of the Gargrave Civic Society in 2004/06 in the document titled 'Ancient River Aire Crossings At Gargrave'. A copy of which resides in Gargrave Library.

The story of Roman Gargrave shows evidence for quite extensive activity on both sides of the river and hopefully further finds in the future will help to enhance our knowledge of this period.

#### FARMING ON SCALEBER HILL

The Gargrave Show sheepdog trials will have been held by the time you read this. It has become a very popular event in great surroundings.

The show in front of Eshton Hall is almost upon us. It is a credit to all who help. It has become an expensive event with all rules and regulations. The three local shows are great for the area. Each gives a good day out for their communities. Each needs support to keep them viable. With auction marts disappearing it would be sad to see local shows unable to continue.

#### **REDEEMING CHRISTIANITY!**

SALVATION, REDEMPTION, MERCY, righteousness, repentance, sin, heaven and hell are some of the "BIG" Christian words that frequently carry varying amounts of baggage for Christians and non-Christians alike. They and many other familiar words are the subject of the book 'Speaking Christian' by New Testament scholar and theologian Marcus Borg (1942 - 2015). He maintains that the contemporary meaning of many of these words is a serious distortion or diminishment of their original biblical and traditional meanings! The misunderstandings flow from two major causes that have shaped the way Christian language is now heard in the West. First is the "literalization" of language arising out of the Enlightenment and the modern period. The second is their interpretation within a common framework that he calls a "heaven and hell" Christianity that emphasizes an afterlife, sin and forgiveness, Jesus dying for our sins, and the beliefs that go with that. The main purpose of the book is to reclaim the more ancient and authentic meaning of words in all their richness and wisdom in order to reconnect their reinvigorated meanings to the challenges of the twenty-first century.

Let's look at just three of those big Christian words:

- Repentance is most commonly associated by Christians with sin and forgiveness. We are to repent of our sins so that we can be forgiven. Repentance is about remorse for our sins and resolving to live a better life. The biblical meanings are quite different and much richer. One flows from the Hebrew word in the Old Testament where it means to turn, to return. It directly relates to returning to the homeland, the Holy Land, Jerusalem, Zion, the temple all symbols for the presence of God. The other stems from the New Testament and the Greek meaning "to go beyond the mind we have" That is the mind acquired through being socialised in a particular culture at a particular time. Repentance then is turning or returning to God, going beyond the mind we have. It is the path that leads to transformation.
- Salvation and its siblings saved and saviour are, perhaps, amongst some of the most highly charged Christian words. For many people they are about "going to heaven" with implication of the opposite, hell. Because the obstacle to going to heaven is sin, to be saved means being saved from our sins. Saviour refers to Jesus dying for our sins in our place in order to make salvation possible. So salvation now refers to life after death; it is about going to heaven. But in the Bible it is seldom about an afterlife, rather , it is about personal and political transformation this side of death. Saved now means to be saved from our sins. But in the Bible it is much more than this, and often not about sin at all. Saviour now refers to Jesus as the one who saves us from our sins. But in the Bible, saviour is used long before Jesus and most often has nothing to do with sin.

• Similarly redeemer, redeem and redemption now refer to Jesus as the redeemer who redeems us from our sins and brings about our redemption. But the more ancient biblical meaning is about being set free from slavery, bondage, captivity; it is not about being saved from our sins.

While the book is a critique of contemporary Christian language he readily acknowledges that despite this, it has been an effective path for goodness and transformation for millions. At the same time he recognises that it has often created a fear-based Christianity where it has been used in an emotionally abusive and manipulative ways to maintain power and control behaviour, particularly among children.

Another problem has been exclusiveness and the "one way" interpretation of John 14:6 and "..... no one comes to the Father except through me". Only Christians can be saved and go to heaven. Righteousness and smugness can too easily go hand-in-hand with salvation!

Not surprisingly these sort of beliefs have become unpersuasive to increasing numbers within the Christian Church let alone outside it! Is its central dynamic about sin, guilt, threat of punishment and the offer of a pardon if we believe that Jesus died to pay the price for our sins? Unfortunately heaven-and hell Christianity is not simply a residue from the past but continues to pervade much of Christianity and is often central to its understanding throughout our wider culture.

So if Christianity is not about "going to Heaven" what does Marcus Borg think it is about? To be continued ......!
