

INTRODUCING OUR NEW PRIEST: DELIVERING BABIES TO DELIVERING SOULS

To be involved in the birth of a new life is the most beautiful and rewarding experience one could imagine. From conception to birth and beyond, a midwife is privileged to play a key role of trusted guide, supporter and teacher. In the same way, Christians believe that God wants to bring us all to new life, as His Spirit grows within us; just as with a pregnancy, we cannot begin to imagine how our lives will change. This is the story of how my life changed completely.

Brought up in the Heavy Woollen District of West Yorkshire, my formative years were spent in Heckmondwike, Dewsbury and Batley. An Alumnus of Heckmondwike Grammar School, I trained as a Registered Nurse and then Midwife at Leeds General Infirmary, working on Delivery Suite, wards, and the Homebirth Team before moving into Community Midwifery. I spent some time as Lecturer-Practitioner at Leeds University, and also enjoyed being a Supervisor of Midwives and Team Leader. Alongside my work I also studied for a BA in Accountancy, a PGCE and then a Masters in Midwifery.

From an early age faith played an important role in my life; Sunday School at the local URC, then I became a Christadelphian, before a time away from church. We moved house from Pudsey to Yeadon and planned to stay there for many years, so Jenny and I decided to look for a local church where we could be part of the community. Having tried a couple of churches which didn't quite suit, we finally came to the last (and least) on our list - the local Anglican Church...

"Church of England?" I moaned to Jenny. "Not likely - it'll be miserable, dull and boring!" Reluctantly, I walked through the doors of St John's, Yeadon, and was forced to eat my words as I experienced life, joy and love in all its fulness.

It started with the tea rota, then the welcoming and sidespersons duties, before we were asked to become Churchwardens (making tea is a dangerous thing in church). As time went on, I became more aware of an unsettling feeling as I watched the priest at communion each week. Was God calling me into this ministry? Surely not!

After lots of searching interviews and a long time trying to discern whether this was a whim, or if indeed it really was God calling me to the priesthood, I was accepted for training for ordination. We moved to Cambridge for two wonderful years where I studied at Ridley Hall (or as we call it, 'vicar factory'). Jenny says I spent most of my time in coffee shops, but we called it 'formation'. We made some beautiful friendships at Cambridge, and had some fantastic experiences, such as free entrance into King's College, punting on the Cam and refreshing walks to Grantchester.

After training, I was posted to Almondbury and Farnley Tyas for my curacy, which is where I have been for the last three years. One is now a suburb of Huddersfield, one still a rural village, but both still retain a strong sense of community and we will be very sad to leave behind our many friends there.

Married to Jenny, a State Registered Nurse, I have two grown up daughters. My varied interests include folk and world music, real ale, cooking, walking, cycling and running. I used to be a Scout Leader (ask me about the camp at

Goredale Scar) and I've always loved the outdoors, walking and cycling. I never dreamed, however, that I might end up being a parish priest in such a beautiful place as this. I am extremely thankful and excited to be a part of these communities and I look forward to being involved in what God is doing here.

I have been and will continue to pray for all the people of this area. In the meantime, I wonder what new things might God be bringing to birth in your life?



St. Andrews Family service report, 6 Oct

Lots to report this month! In time honoured fashion, we at St. Andrews, celebrated the bringing in of the harvest with a seedtime/harvest themed service.

There was a beautiful rendering of 'Look at the World' (John Rutter) by the Gargrave Village Choir, so good, in fact, that one lady was heard to say, – "I wish you [the choir] could come every week."

Mike Maiden, one of our churchwardens, reminded us that while most of us here in Gargrave are blessed with all we need, many of the people of the world are far less fortunate. Even in our own country, 20% of the population, including 4,000,000 children, live in poverty and in Skipton alone the food bank distributes several tons of food each year and supports 40 families as well as others.

Mike reminded us that God wants seeds of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, gentleness, goodness, faithfulness and self-control to take root in our lives and he challenged each one of us to commit to some practical action which would allow us to bear fruit for God.

Meanwhile the children had fun decorating plant pots and planting beans - which we hope will grow into huge beanstalks rivalling the massive one which somehow appeared in church that morning.

The service was followed by a really excellent lunch prepared by Norma and her team - and an auction of provisions kindly supplied by people from the village. This, together with donations kindly given, raised £250.20 for the Skipton foodbank, and profits from the lunch raised another £200 to go towards Christmas flowers for the church.

Thanks be to God for all his goodness towards us.

Changes and improvements continue to dominate the work at the Village Hall and they are keeping both Robert our Caretaker and the Village tradesmen extremely busy. We made the difficult but sensible decision some months ago to create an extra meeting room within the Snooker club . The club consisted of two adjoining rooms where there were three full sized Snooker tables , one table in one room and two in the larger room and the facilities were along the Annex corridor, near the Parish Council Offices. We felt that with a current membership of around thirty five members, it did not really warrant all the space and with the area next on our list for refurbishment we thought long and hard about the long term plan.

Therefore we are in the midst of making the larger room into a totally self contained Snooker club which will have its own toilet facilities, new lighting, flooring and a total re-decoration. New flooring will be laid and colour schemes for the re-decoration have been decided upon. Hirers will be using the new meeting room from the 1st January and reservations are already in place so we are confident that we have made the right decision.

BeeActive Nov: Pilates, Tai Chi Qigong, & Somatics: bone hoovers and steam

National Osteoporosis Day was on Sunday 20 October: The Royal Osteoporosis Society (https://theros.org.uk/) recommend doing what you can to keep your bones strong, coupled with working on your balance so that you're less likely to fall. There's a graphic visualisation on youtube of how our bones are being continuously remodelled. It shows how some cells rove our skeletons hoovering up parts of our bones, and how another type of cell simultaneously moves about depositing bone. The process is continuous and is influenced in part by how and how much we load our bones. Our skeletons are lighter after each night of lying down, as our mattresses support us while we sleep, not our skeletons. Similarly being an astronaut in space, or a couch potato on a sofa sends signals to our bodies that there's less need for us to have strong bones.

Being conscious of this process is a good motivator for being active – sitting without support, standing more, moving more - and for reminding us how important posture is, as how we align ourselves affects the renewal and reshaping of our bones. Pilates and Tai Chi Qigong are good low impact forms of exercise that use our bodyweight to help load our bones; awareness of alignment is an integral to them. Somatic movements are brilliant for improving alignment and letting go of habitually held muscle tension that can give rise to poor posture and muscular

pain. Tai Chi Qigong practised outdoors moves the experience into another realm through being in touch with the elements and the beauty of nature. Where we practice in Gargrave, it is watching the development of the autumnal look of the trees and the endlessly varying river. One cool morning last month we could see steam-like moisture vapour rising off the river under the bridge, highlighted by shafts of sunlight – stunning. From the archives

March 1937's parish magazine records an appeal for donations to a testimonial to Mr. Christopher Langstroth, who had notched up 62 years of bell ringing at Gargrave Church. He was also instrumental in setting up the team of handbell ringers. At the presentation of an illuminated address, Mr Langstroth replied to say that he recommended bellringing as an antidote to care and worry of all kinds, and recommended his audience to come and try it for themselves, saying that he would be only too glad to put them in the way of it.

Meanwhile, the "Wesleyans" from across the river had accepted an invitation to a united service in the Parish Church on the Sunday evening before the Coronation of George VI.

Some of the numbers in the magazine are striking in their contrast to our experience in 2019: 289 on the church electoral role, and 46 candidates at a confirmation service including 15 from Gargrave parish.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU...

A series of interviews with folk of interest in Gargrave. This month: Allison Wiffen, ceramist.

Can you please provide a pen sketch of yourself?

I like people; I like to talk to people, I even learned French and Spanish to be able to talk to more people, so Gargrave suits me down to the ground; it is quite simply the friendliest place on earth. Perhaps it's my Geordie heritage (I was born and lived my first 10 years in Newcastle) – Geordies do love to chat. I came to Gargrave four years ago via Darlington, Leeds, France, Spain and London. The latter I lived in for 30 years and even though I don't miss it in the slightest I did really love it when I was there. Having worked in sales and for an advertising agency, I went to Art College and did a degree in the visual arts specialising in ceramics. I set up a studio and have worked as a ceramist for



the last sixteen years. On my web site (www.awceramics.co.uk) you will see that I make cufflinks (that include my own photographic images) pendants earrings and brooches. I have done a lot of work for museum shops creating them bespoke ranges including The British Museum, The House of Lords, Shakespeare's Globe Theatre and St Paul's Cathedral. I (finally!) have my studio in the barn attached to my house. It is fabulous and I love it. I am enjoying spreading my wings and making bigger pieces again: pots on the wheel, pinch pots, tile pieces – I am doing a lot of playing and experimenting.

What brought you to Gargrave?

I left London because I wanted to live somewhere greener. I knew bits of Yorkshire from having lived in Darlington and Leeds, and in Yorkshire I would be nearer my aging father. THE LIFE AND TIMES OF ROBERT OF NEWMINSTER AND GARGRAVE – THE SAINT OF THE DALES

Captain Cuttle

Part eleven: Trouble at t'mill

At his monastery in 1146 and 1147 Robert had a problem of a different kind. In spite of the fact that he was highly regarded both as a man and an abbot, gossip and tittle-tattle began to circulate among the monks about his relationship with a woman, whom the Oxford Dictionary of National Biography (DNB) names as Edith of Hastings and describes as "devout". That was a reason for him to seek the help of Bernard of Clairvaux, although he may have travelled across the Channel anyway for a general council of the order, which was attended by the Pope, Eugenius the Third. Eugenius, according to another biographer "received him honourably" and he was also cleared of any wrongdoing by Bernard.

A number of stories about Robert were told many years later by an elderly monk at the abbey at Kirkstall, Leeds, which was another offshoot of Fountains, mostly concerning his encounters with the devil in which he always came off best. One was about a wedding in Newcastle where Satan intended to have the guests at each other's throats but was thwarted by Robert, who just happened to be passing by. This kind of embroidery of a holy man's life was the convention at the time, in much the same way that it might be of a contemporary celebrity in the twenty-first century. It is not to be taken too seriously.

Bede did much the same in his life of Cuthbert in 720 and other biographies show a similar pattern.

It should not detract from the character of someone who appears to have been an exceptionally outstanding figure in his time. That was certainly the view of Godric of Finchale, who listed the great and the good among the visitors to his hermitage. A priory was later built there and its ruins are in a striking location, quite difficult to find. Godric, another exceptional character, who may have been a pirate in the Mediterranean in his younger days, said that on the night Robert died, on June 7, 1159, he saw his soul ascending into heaven in the form of a fiery sphere.

The DNB states that miracles were recorded at the Newminster tomb.

Robert was never formally canonized - declared an official saint - by the Church, but his order formally recognised him in the seventeenth century. The fact that he carries the title of saint stresses that people of the era regarded him as being worthy of reverence. His own order still does. And dedication of churches as far apart as Wisconsin, Michigan, and Preston, Lancashire, as well as Newcastle, means that this feeling of admiration for a great man continues nearly a thousand years after he was born.

Footnote

The Roman Catholic Church, the Eastern Orthodox Church and other Orthodox communions such as the Copts, Ethiopians and Armenians, do not allow clerical marriage. They may allow married men to become clergymen, but they do not

permit clergy to marry after ordination, the setting apart for spiritual life. It was not until the First Lateran Council - one of a series of gatherings to decide Christian church policy in Western Europe, attended by nearly one thousand bishops and abbots - in 1123, that banning priests and some other religious from marriage became the official line. And it wasn't until the Second Lateran Council in 1139 that the then-assembled five hundred bishops went further and declared: "For since they should be and be called the temple of God, the vessel of the Lord, the abode of the Holy Spirit, it is unbecoming that they indulge in marriage and in impurities."

In England, the first decree was seized on by Henry the First. He saw this as a very convenient way to prevent hereditary priesthood, parishes being handed down from father to son, and the power that this brought. He probably couldn't have cared less whether they married or not for spiritual reasons. He wanted control, their inheritance and their money.

Monks were different. They and nuns took a vow of chastity, which meant they could never marry and had to abstain from any kind of love life.

Clergy in the Church of England after the Reformation were gradually given the right to marry, but bachelorhood was a condition for some posts for hundreds of years. This stipulation affected the career at Oxford of Charles Dodgson, better known as Lewis Carroll. In 1852 he was nominated for a life fellowship of Christ Church, whose dons were required to take clerical orders and remain unmarried. He was ordained deacon, but never took priest's orders, probably because he did not agree with church doctrine. In another connection, it will be recalled that Christ Church was originally Durham College. Carroll had strong family connections with Durham. It is thought that the setting for the Walrus and the Carpenter was the huge beach at Sunderland, while the legend of the Lambton Worm was the inspiration for Jabberwocky. Alice's grandfather was rector at Boldon, just a few miles away; her father, dean of Christ Church, was born there.

INTO THE DISTANT PAST

WE NOW FIND OURSELVES in the Medieval period and Gargrave has once again some signs of settlement.

There is the moated site, often flooded, alongside the Pennine Way footpath across from the church This is a scheduled ancient monument and as such is protected by legislation against damage. It is thought to be a homestead moat. No excavation has taken place. Many signs of water management can be seen in the field.



The other site is once again at Old Hall Croft. This multi-period site has now entered the Middle ages. The excavation prior to house building in 1998 by MAP Archaeology found evidence of a moated site. The report is in Gargrave library.

There has been an earlier excavation and the booklet covering the results are available from the Craven Museum. It is also in Gargrave library.

Evidence of the Medieval period has been found at Mickle Hill when an excavation took place prior to house building - this consisted of a post hole. A post hole was also found where the old Pennine bus garage was located on West Street - the post hole being found prior to house building and it fronted West Street.

Evidence of Medieval metalworking has been found at Old Hall Croft in the shape of hearth bottoms. This is the slag left behind after smelting. Hearth bottoms have also been found at Mill Hill next to the church.

Around Gargrave, the Medieval open strip field system can be seen consisting of long fields now bounded by hedgerows extending from the river towards Eshton Road and Old Hall farm.

Maps are so useful, as are aerial photographs and the satellite images on the Internet. Spend some time perusing these and all manner of things can be found from differing periods of our past.

FARMING ON SCALEBER HILL

With the geese flying round and joining the flyover at dusk no doubt preparing for migration, autumn has arrived. As we have had very few swallows nesting this year it was very pleasing to see a flock of them collecting on the telephone wires no doubt preparing for the long flight. Time to reflect on what has been a good farming year. A dry open winter followed by a good lambing time. We have never had grass as early and continue all year in abundance. We had showers when needed and sunshine in spells to make hay or silage. The silo is full to capacity and we have baled some meadows which grew too fast for the lambs.

All the local shows had good weather with attendances well up on previous years which bodes well for the future. According to the weather forecasts September only had a third of the normal rain. They must have been a little premature with that statement with downpours and floods in the last three days of September. Thunder storms caused several cattle and sheep to be struck with lightning in the area.

Autumn brings its own problems. As the quality of the grass reduces suckler cows feeding calves become subject to grass staggers which can cause sudden death. A sudden drop in temperature and heavy rain can do the damage. A magnesium feed in cattle nuts can help or feed blocks scattered around the fields can also help.

On the calendar August to October on farms are very special as you have the shows and the sales of sheep and cattle of all descriptions. A time to meet farmers from all over the country seeking to replace their flocks from the Dales rearing areas.

There is always something of interest to contemplate. Two broods of pheasants appeared in September which hatched in the garden. Along with a hare which the mother came to feed twice a day at least.

Not to be outdone, Lisa has a pet sheep which has produced many lambs over the years. She was retired (kept away from the ram) for the last three years and has spent an idyllic life, well-fed and with the freedom of the farm. Now sheep normally have lambs in spring. No one suspected anything but she produced a Herdwick lamb on September 16. My skills of shepherding seem to have waned!!! I might add four dairy heifers have had twin calves. Life is never dull. A trip to the Highland Cattle Show and Sale at Oban in the north west of Scotland will make a break before winter.

MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING

In this month's magazine, I'd like to look at the subject of stigma and mental illness. I've been prompted to reflect upon this, through reading a book called 'Voices from the Asylum. West Riding Pauper Lunatic Asylum' by Mark Davis. Within this book about Menston Asylum there is the case of Elizabeth Ann Beecroft who is described as 'a certified imbecile'. Despite this, whilst living with her parents in Gargrave she had managed to hold down a job. She ended up in the asylum in 1908, described as: 'A dirty, demented patient. She cannot be employed and requires a great deal of attention.' When she died, her parents were already both dead and her siblings failed to collect her remains. She died age 54 having spent ten years at Menston. She remains buried there today.

Both the fact that she had been local and the emptiness of her story caused me to consider how we deal with mental illness today. Thankfully we no longer have asylums and cruel treatments such as lobotomy. But I still feel that as a society we collectively hold certain ideas about mental illness. It is known for example that there are common myths held by the public such as: people with schizophrenia are dangerous, people with mental health issues are unemployable, and that people with mental health issues are attention seeking. It is also evident when we talk about mental illness, we use certain words such as crazy, bonkers and insane. The words themselves don't actually bother me, but I do think they are indicative of an underlying inability as a society to understand 'crazy' people and ultimately what to 'do' with them.

Today we have an interesting contradiction surrounding mental illness. On the one hand we know a lot about mental health. For example, we have celebrities talking and social media posts about personal experience, we have wellbeing and crystals and we're much more open about saying 'I feel sad'. Yet, on the other hand we pathologise normal emotions, we have stressful conditions in schools, stressed-out workers, and 1 in 6 people with a common psychological disorder. However, what we don't seem to have is accessibility to treatment. In Craven, it can be up to 2 years waiting to see a psychologist for complex issues.

And I think that this is the issue which says to me stigma is alive and well. That we acknowledge there are people struggling with their mental health, we encourage people to talk, but as a society we don't provide the means to address these issues.

It isn't all doom and gloom though. National charities like Mind are brilliant at providing support and locally we have amazing charities like The Cellar Project. All these charities actively work to tackle stigma. My advice would be that if you feel that you need help, tackle it as soon as possible. See your GP if you need free help just to get the ball rolling and if you need more support while you wait, look into charities such as Beat, Anxiety UK, Sane and Time to Change.






