

The best-laid plans of mice and men

TURN BACK THE CLOCKS TO DECEMBER 2019, New Year's Eve. Many of us will have made firm resolutions and exciting plans for 2020. A new career, plans to travel, new hobbies, a change of lifestyle or even just to carry on as normal. Little could we have understood then how an emerging virus in China would shape the lives of the entire human race. All of our dreams shattered, plans thwarted or at least put on long-term hold.

One of the things that clergy spend a lot of time doing, as you might expect, is thinking about Christmas! We usually start thinking about it around January, reflecting on what went well the previous year and what we might change for the year to come.

It then drops off the radar for a few months as we prepare for Easter, but when things calm down again over the summer we spend our idle moments trying to remember what we had decided back in January and coming up with wildly creative and completely impractical ideas for things we could do in the winter to come.

Generally those wildly creative ideas never make it off the drawing board, and we end up doing more or less the same as usual – even (and I'll let you in on a trade secret here) re-using the odd sermon if we're confident that the congregation had indulged in enough pre-service sherry or mulled wine to have forgotten our deeply profound and meaningful reflections the previous year.

This year, however, has been completely different. Planning ahead for Christmas this year has felt more like a game of Snakes and Ladders where one roll of the dice can send you sliding back down a completely different path and you have to start all over again!

So we have made some plans for holding services both in Church and online, and we are excited about what we're hoping to offer to help our communities celebrate Christmas this year. But we also know that a word from the Prime Minister, or an upturn in local cases, could scupper some of these plans and send us back to the drawing board.

All this uncertainty leads us to a new perspective on the Christmas story itself, because the more we reflect on it this in this year of disruption, the more we realise how disrupting the events of the first Christmas were for those involved.


Mary and Joseph were engaged to be married, they no doubt had exciting plans for what their lives would look like. Then the angel Gabriel turns up and reveals that Mary is pregnant out of wedlock, sending all of their plans out the window. Then, just as they are getting used to the idea of having a baby, the emperor orders a census so they have to set off away from home on the long journey to Bethlehem. Not what they were planning at all.

Or what about the shepherds, sat happily in their fields minding their own business when the angels appear and send them running into the village to find

the newborn baby Jesus. And then there's the wise men, sent out on a perilous, crazy adventure to a far off land just because of the appearance of a new star in the sky. None of these people could have predicted or planned what was happening to them, but when the disruption came they went with it and in doing so they met God face to face.

We all approach Christmas with our own sets of expectations and hopes, rituals and traditions, and after all we've been through this year it may feel heart-breaking that we won't be able to celebrate in the ways that we usually do. But perhaps this Christmas, this strange and disrupted Christmas, gives us an opportunity to learn anew from Mary and Joseph, the wise men and the shepherds, and to allow the strange turn our lives have taken to lead us closer to the God who is always with us.

In all of the uncertainty, disappointment and glimmers of hope, may you know that God is still with us, and as Jeremiah says, working out His 'plans to prosper us and not harm us, plans to give us hope and a future.' However your Christmas and New Year work out, may you know God's presence and His peace, His power and His love as a constant in your lives.

Hello, I'm Rob Berry and I'm new to the PCC. I have a young family and so I would like to see the church sharing Jesus's message in a way that is open to all ages.


Richard Pocock

Contractors are working on the tower to repair the pinnacles and other features that were showing serious deterioration and could have become dangerous. The pinnacles were held in place by reinforcing rods that had corroded and some of the adjacent stonework had also become worn. We were keen that a pinnacle did not fall on the head of a passing bride!

The work is going well, although, perhaps inevitably, some snags have been encountered extending the scope of the project and the length of time it will take to complete. We are very blessed to be able to cover the cost of this project, some £50k, through the generous legacy left to us by Ruth Abbott, to whom we are incredibly grateful.

Village Hall news

Normally at this time of the year I would be getting ready to compile my Chairman's report for the Annual General Meeting of Gargrave Village Hall. The meeting is held annually at the end of December and is attended by committee members, trustees and members of the public. However this year can certainly not be classed as normal. Therefore my full report will have to go on the back burner for now as we have had no alternative but to cancel the Annual General Meeting and it will be re-scheduled for a suitable time in 2021 when there are no restrictions on numbers able to physically attend.

The majority of our monthly meetings since the first lockdown began have gone ahead using Zoom which was an alternative when we were not allowed to meet in person. The option does come with its own restrictions as it needs the user to have access to a computer, iPad or other modern device which then enables you to connect with others over the internet. If all goes according to plan and the devices you use have a built in camera and microphone each participant attending the online meeting should be able to see and hear each other on the screen. Our first time meetings did come with some hilarity until we got used to which buttons to press; "press the mute button, press the video button, can you hear me now, I can hear you, tilt your screen I've got a good view of your ceiling, is there an echo at your end?" were the cries!!

Apparently if you are technically savvy you can create your own virtual background to the online Zoom calls/meetings, even adjusting the shades in the background. There is also a facility called " touch up your appearance " where you use a filter to subtly smooth out your fine lines but it still makes you look natural. We haven't mastered any of these techniques yet!

We did return to the main Hall for a couple of meetings as restrictions were lifted in midsummer, still taking along a couple of devices so we could

connect via Zoom with others who were still isolating at home. These latter meetings seemed so much more normal and they did not exclude those not having modern devices which does concern me but fortunately we are still able to keep all our committee members up to date with matters discussed at the meetings through the powers of the good old telephone and Royal Mail. These members remain just as important on our committee as those who are Zoomers (if that's the correct term)!

Despite not been able to present my yearly report, this would seem to be an appropriate time to thank all our Committee members for their support over such a difficult year, special thanks to Phil who has helped to oversee the building improvements whilst still working long and difficult hours maintaining law and order over the border. Thanks to our employees Robert, Simon and Lynn who have done sterling work throughout the past months. It has been a pleasure to work with them.

Best wishes to our Assistant Caretaker Steve who is currently trialling a new drug as part of his recovery programme. Good wishes are also extended to our President, Michael Fenwick who sadly had a stroke a few months ago.

I feel very proud of how we have dealt with everything that has been thrown at us throughout the Covid period. We have created an extremely safe and clean environment. The risk assessments we have been duty bound to create have been comprehensive and compliant. I applaud the small group of Hirers who have returned to the Hall (at the time of writing this piece, we are still in the

second phase of lockdown, so hopefully they will be given the green light to return again very soon). They have been very responsible and aware that they too have a duty of care to their clients. I thank them for making our job as a committee easier in the knowledge that they too are ensuring safety is paramount.

Suffice to say I am confident to report that the Village Hall is in good hands and we shall endeavour to keep up the good work in the future - Covid or no Covid.

A quick trip back now to the sixties, last month we heard about the mystery of the disappearing net underskirt at the tail end of 1965.

In March 1966 a letter was received from a solicitor to

state that proceedings against the Village Hall would begin as a coat had been taken from the cloakroom. It was stressed by those attending the monthly meeting that there were witnesses who could confirm that the coat had been taken from the Grouse Hotel and not the Village Hall.

The Dance section had purchased a revolving sphere and permission was requested to break into a roof panel so the sphere could be fitted and could then be hired out for use at a £1.00 per dance. One member said he wanted to offer fair criticism and hoped it would be taken in the right spirit. He felt that the dances were making a nice profit but less dancers were attending than when more classy bands had been booked. He felt that Kenny Ball and his Jazz band and Acker Bilk should be contacted. Gerry and the Pacemakers were also mentioned. At a later meeting it was confirmed that these bands would be asking for a fee of around £250.00 so it seems the idea was then dismissed. (It seems that a calculation for the value of £250.00 in 1967 would equate to £3,824.08 in today's money, so the bands were a bit on the pricey side).


In September 1967 it was reported that four boys, non-members, had entered the hall and set off fire extinguishers. One unlucky lad was named and his parents informed. The boy to his credit had offered to pay for the damage estimated at £5.00, with weekly payments of ten shillings. The secretary appears to have pleaded his case but to no avail as the committee decided he must pay for all the damage even if the others did not come forward.

In December 1967, it wasn't Covid causing problems but Foot and Mouth disease. The committee appeared to have little empathy with the farming community as a Young Farmers club had cancelled their booking, after a discussion it was decided that any cancellations due to the epidemic should still pay a charge of £7.00.

From the belfry

Traditionally for more sombre occasion the bells are half-muffled. This means that one side of the clapper (the part of the bell that hits the metal and makes the sound) is covered to dampen the sound and it gives a kind of echo effect, which is more mournful. Muffles are usually put on for funerals and for the annual Remembrance service. Sadly the second lockdown occurred before we were able to apply the muffles this year, and of course we were not allowed as a group up into the tower after 4th November. At least we were able to toll a single bell in advance of the 11am commemorations at the war memorial.

However, technology saved us once again this year. The clever people that devised our virtual tower in RingingRoom found a way for us to 'muffle' the bells on line. So on the morning of Sunday 8th November we gathered on Zoom

to ring some stately half-muffled changes, ending with some moving tolling to mark the occasion and remember those that have lost their lives in conflict.

Moving to celebration rather than commemoration, one of our ringers recently celebrated 55 years of marriage. When special occasions such as this arise it is common for ringers to compose a special piece which is in some way linked to the event. Change ringing is so called because each time the bells are rung the order in which they are rung changes at the next stroke. We have two strokes, handstroke and backstroke, as the bell swings. Because there are two strokes it is tricky to get an odd number of changes. So for this occasion we are ringing 110 (55 changes each) for Eileen and David Hoskin.

Then at the end of this month it will be St Andrew's day. Sometimes rather than the number of changes we can use the name of a method to celebrate. There is a special method (the change ringers name for a tune) in existence called St Andrews Place Doubles, which we are now practicing hard with a view to ringing at our practice on 30th November.

At the time of writing it is unknown whether or not we will be able to return to the tower to ring for our next big celebration of Christmas. It seems inconceivable to not have bells at this time, but I guess we shall need to wait patiently to see how things develop. Rest assured, if we are unable to ring out across the village we shall certainly be ringing virtually, and sending the whole village our very best wishes for a happy peaceful Christmas, and looking forward immensely to ringing out loud and clear sometime soon in 2021.

BeeActive Pilates and Qigong ... and Walking



FARMING ON SCALEBER HILL

IT IS SEVERAL YEARS AGO THAT A RESIDENT OF SCALE HILL who worked on the council was greatly respected for the sterling work he did for Gargrave. On his retirement a whip round was conducted as a respect for his efforts. He used his donation to provide a seat for the village on Scaleber Hill with a view of Gargrave and the church. It is positioned in his favourite place and is a very popular choice for people walking up the hill to have a rest or picnic before returning to Gargrave. Pennine way walkers stop to have their snacks and it is also handy for sitting to treat blisters on their feet as it is often the third day walking North on the Pennine Way. The seat has been greatly appreciated by many.

However, it is at this point a problem can arise for walkers going South. One of the maps does have a fault. At this point it states bear slightly right at the cattle grid, it should read slightly left at the cattle grid. The problem is that in the interest of safety for the livestock we removed the cattle grid and replaced it with a system of gates and fencing. We do have the odd walker arriving in the farmyard looking for the said cattle grid! It is at this point we inform them the cattle grid has been removed and the map is outdated. At this point one can have that withering look doubting my sanity, then reality kicks in and good humour takes over.

As far as the farm is concerned, changes are taking place as Lisa's father, Charlie, passed away quite suddenly. Since his retirement several years ago he spent a lot of time on the farm doing all kinds of maintenance. He will be sadly missed, especially at lambing time and for his help with various projects including bird boxes and hedge planting and all the odd jobs he so enjoyed doing.

The last few weeks have been extremely busy. Firstly the cattle were all brought in to be housed for winter. It is at this point that we clip the thick winter coats on their backs to avoid them overheating and sweating which can lead to pneumonia when the weather is as warm and damp as it has been recently. The calves are given a vaccine, similar to our flu jab, as an extra precaution. Fingers crossed the weather will soon turn cooler and drier! We have also been busy with the sheep. The last of this year's lambs have been sold and it is now time to prepare for next year's crop. The Ewes have been treated for fluke, given a vitamin booster and sorted into groups to run with the rams.

An "extra" job this week has been the birth of a calf by caesarean section. Normally our heifers (first time mums) would give birth naturally but it this case the calf was overdue by 10 days and as such quite large. It was decided that to avoid possible distress and problems to both calf and mother the caesarean would be carried out and the vet was duly called out. Due to the fact that the birth wasn't natural, the heifer was unaware that she had given birth and as such bonding with her calf took a little longer than usual. However, we are pleased to report that both are now well acquainted.

A walk in the woods...

WALKING UP MARK HOUSE LANE from the village, I hear songbirds foraging high in the treetops of the spinney that's within the park walls of Gargrave House. I pause to watch a Treecreeper spiral his way up the trunk of a Sycamore, his slender down-curved beak probing for insects.

Another Sycamore, by the edge of the field opposite, has velvety-green moss covering the trunk and this is home to a myriad of tiny cream toadstools that appear to be in ascension too.

A little further on, I enter the wood and I'm immediately entranced by a group of welcoming golden Beeches and beneath my feet, a thick carpet of leaves of all shapes and sizes, giving me clues to the tree species to be found here.

Within the wood are several groups of Yew trees (Taxus baccata) their dark, evergreen needles creating a dense canopy that shades the ground below. There is a cluster of large, cream, wavy-edged mushrooms growing beneath them, which are likely to be a type of Funnel fungus. These grow in lines known as 'troops' and can eventually form large fairy rings.

I stop for a while to watch a scurry of Grey squirrels climb down from the trees and begin foraging in the leaf litter. I haven't seen any beech mast or acorns so I wonder what they will find there to eat.

Growing on a dead Elder branch, I come across the Jelly Ear or Wood Ear fungus (Auricularia auricula-judae). This rubbery-looking, ear-shaped bracket fungus has a tan-brown, gelatinous, jelly-like flesh, which is cup-shaped and velvety on the outside but wrinkly and shiny on the inside. As it matures it develops lobes, making it even more ear-shaped. Its original name of Judas's Ear was a reference to Judas Iscariot who it's believed hanged himself from an Elder tree. This is reflected in its proper name, auricula meaning ear and judae, judas.

A beacon of golden light draws me deeper into the wood. It is another Beech tree, glowing amongst its drabber, now leafless companions. Beneath it, there is a mantle of rich gingery-orange leaves. On the ground nearby, I find the beautiful red, pink and yellow, toothed and palmate leaves of the Norway Maple. This tree was introduced to Britain in the seventeenth century and has now become naturalised. Its leaves provide a food source for caterpillars and the seeds are enjoyed by birds and small mammals.

Rising up from a rotten, moss-covered log are short, spindly club-like fruiting bodies of the Candlesnuff fungus (Xylaria hypoxylon). It has a black base, grey mid-section and white tip, giving the appearance of a snuffed candle wick, hence its name. It is quite short, growing to a height of only six centimetres. As it grows, it may become flattened and forked much like an antler, giving it the alternative name of Stag's Horn. This species is very common and can be found all year round. It has the unusual property of bioluminescence, as phosphorus in the mycelium reacts with oxygen and other chemicals within, to produce a

continual glow. Sadly, this is difficult to witness, as the light produced is very weak and often there is too much light pollution around. Although inedible, it has medicinal properties being both anti-viral and active against tumours.

I discover, above me, hiding under a leaf of the Wych Elm, two pale orange ladybirds with sixteen cream spots. These are Orange Ladybirds also known as the 16-spot ladybird (Halyzia sedecimguttata) and they feed on mildew (and occasionally aphids) in deciduous trees. As autumn turns to winter they will hibernate in cracks in the wood or in leaf litter on the woodland floor.

In stark contrast to the old and rotting tree trunk from which it emerges, the bright yellow prongs of the Yellow Stagshorn (Calocera viscosa) stand out and are hard to miss. Despite the similarity in common names, this fungus is not related to the Candlesnuff fungus. Its prongs can grow into tuning fork or antler shapes and may also be orange or very occasionally white. It is another jelly



fungus, which can grow up to ten centimetres tall, although the ones I have found are quite small and single-pronged.

At the top of the wood there is a tree with the most beautiful and tactile bark (see the photo). The deep diamond-shaped fissures are separated by smooth silvery-grey plateaus which are decorated with tiny inset crosses. It is an old Sallow also known as the Goat or Pussy Willow (Salix caprea). It is well-known



for its soft and furry male catkins that first appear in January. This tree attracts bees and many other insects and is also the food plant for the larvae of the magnificent Purple Emperor butterfly.

Walking back along the lane towards home, I admire the fractal-like patterns of the Sycamore's branches against the darkening sky and consider just how wondrous nature is.

A MAN OF MANY PARTS: WALTER MORRISON

To mark the centenary of the death of local MP and landowner Walter Morrison on 18 December 2021 and to celebrate his contribution to Malhamdale, Craven and beyond, a group has been formed to plan a series of events, including talks and exhibitions, throughout Craven in 2021. Led by the Museum of North Craven Life at The Folly in Settle, the committee includes representatives of Malhamdale Local History Group, Kirkby Malham Church, School, and Parish Hall, the Field Studies Council at Malham Tarn House, Giggleswick School, the National Park and other local organisations.



Born in 1836, Walter Morrison inherited Malham Tarn Estate at the age of 21 in 1857. He was a very

generous benefactor and had a great interest in education. One of his best known local gifts is Giggleswick School Chapel – its distinctive dome reflects his interest in the archaeology of the Bible lands and he was Treasurer of the Palestine Exploration Fund for over fifty years. He also paid for the new Kirkby Malham School and a school at Malham Tarn. Other local donations were made for the restoration of Kirkby Malham Parish Church and part of the cost of the new Kirkby Malham Parish Hall. In Settle, he paid for the Drill Hall and equipped the Territorials.

As an MP, Walter Morrison won Parliamentary elections for Skipton in 1886 and in 1895. He had many business interests and locally he was Chairman of the Yorkshire Dales Railway, which hoped to connect Skipton with Hawes. He was a director and subsequently Chairman of the Craven Bank. In the Skipton Head Office, he was noted for often using the office glue to messily stick envelopes, as he disliked licking them.

Malham Tarn House was his "mountain home" and he stayed there for long periods each year, spending the winter months in sunnier climes for the sake of his health. He loved walking and regularly walked to and from Settle, Bell Busk Station and Kirkby Malham Church, whilst his staff used his carriage. He would often visit his tenants and enjoy a cup of tea in their farmhouse kitchens, with an infant on his knee. Later in life, he was affectionately known as "The Grand Old Man of Craven".

More exciting news about the events in the 2021 Walter Morrison Festival will follow soon.

A Saviour from Stateside?

It dominated every front page and conversation last month. It had people glued to their phones, constantly refreshing feeds to find out any updates. It sidelined all other news, such that a vote in Parliament about a national lockdown barely got mentioned.

But why, in a country over 3,500 miles away from where the action was unfolding, did Britons seem to care so much about the US presidential election?

Joe Biden won't be our president, and though a post-Brexit trade deal will be important, his victory probably won't dramatically change our lives. We don't normally take an interest in elections in foreign countries, even when we have a 'special relationship' with them, so why the exception now?

Perhaps an answer lies in an unlikely place: the book of Judges. Here, we find a nation who is oppressed, fearful, facing uncertainty. In desperation, Israel cries out for a leader who can deliver them.

Fast forward to 2020, and our world feels in a similar place. We're under oppressive restrictions, fearful of the future, and facing an uncertain journey back to normality. Who, we may wonder, will deliver us? The hope for a political saviour can loom large.

But judges fail. Israel's corruption continued. 'The time when the judges ruled' (Ruth 1:1) served as a byword for moral and spiritual decline.

No human leader, Trump and Biden included, can save us, and we shouldn't expect them to. That would amount to political idolatry, to looking for a saviour in the wrong place. Whichever side of the Atlantic we're on, and no matter how good our leaders are, this winter will probably be tough, division will likely course through our cultural veins, and COVID will continue to dominate our lives and newsfeeds.

About a millennium after the time of the judges, Israel once again found themselves oppressed by foreign forces and crying out for a charismatic political leader. Yet the saviour didn't come in the form of some general or revolutionary, but as a baby. In Bethlehem's dark streets shone an everlasting light.

That baby grew up to be the only man ever to walk the earth who could sustain the weight of our hopes and fears — even in 2020 — and never leave us disappointed. There is light in our darkness. Though we misplace our trust and misdirect our cries, the truth remains 2000 years later: we all need a king like Jesus.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

BY DECEMBER 1939 THE WAR had established itself as an ever-present reality in the pages of the Parochial Magazine. The vicar's letter started with a description of a "new terror" in the form of mines which were sinking ships indiscriminately. Rev Arthur Blunt reports on a practice air raid drill for Gargrave, with members of the ARP, First Aid Post and Special Constabulary called out in force. Two "motor ambulances" and a field hospital attended to the pretend casualties in the pouring rain.

A practical impact of the war was on the timing of services. Evening services moved to 3.15pm due to the lighting regulations. The midnight communion was replaced with an 8am service. The ladies of the parish rallied round, forming a "large and representative committee" to arrange knitting parties, whist drives and "buying cigarettes etc. for our men". It seems they had identified the "key workers" of their era.

It's interesting to read the vicar's final paragraph in light of our present circumstances. Try swapping the word "war" for "virus"...

"The war is bound to cast rather a gloom over Christmas this year; but I wish that yours may be as happy as possible under the circumstances, and that your New Year will bring to you and all of us the peace that we desire and an end to this horrible war".

Let's hope that in our time the end comes sooner than it did back then.


